
Smaller Fish to Fry

Time to start a new chapter. After 16 years at NSM and 35 years in museums, I've decided to retire the first of July.

I'm leaving some big challenges. Staffing is insufficient for exhibits, education programs, collections, and custodial work. Six positions were lost during the recession. Funding was never restored. A new building is needed at the Indian Hills Curatorial Center to secure collections. Some collections remain at risk in substandard storage areas. Future collecting is in jeopardy.

But overall, the museum is in good shape. Foremost, it has a strong team of collaborative and committed staff, Friends, and volunteers to keep the museum moving forward and help the next director get up to

speed. The museum's reputation and public relations are positive. Residents and tourists love this place. A strong community base positions the museum for more private-sector fundraising, necessary for development. General care and security of collections are up to standard. The museum is ready for accreditation review in 2018. This will continue the tradition of

accreditation since 1972. Plans are in motion to expand the Indian Hills Curatorial Center, critical for assuring the long-term care and security of Nevada's state and federal collections. Programs and services are well established. Facilities are enhanced. Infrastructure is in place for a major changing exhibits program. The museum's traveling exhibit, Finding Frémont: Pathfinder of the West is poised to begin a national tour, a first for state museums. Revenues are strong.

Membership is increasing.

I see a new chapter for the museum. A new director will bring fresh energy and perspective. The museum will continue to lead heritage preservation and education in the state. I'm hopeful leadership will find ways to remove barriers holding the museum back. The museum has so much more to offer Nevada residents, students, and tourists. It can contribute more to diversifying tourism and the economy. The museum has a proven track record of success. A little investment will reap big returns.

I'm honored to serve as a temporary steward of such a special place. I will hold dear the memory of working with committed and collaborative people, driven by our educational mission and public service. Thank you and farewell.

Glenn Lucky rode this custom built 18-speed tricycle across the United States in a 100 day endurance test from Nevada's Capital to the Nation's Capital to raise awareness and funding for cerebral palsy research. Along the way, he visited children's

hospitals and collected donations to help patients. During his life, Lucky has raised tens of thousands of dollars to benefit multiple charities. "Still riding at 63, Glenn is an inspiration to so many. We are grateful to have his historic tricycle in our collection and for the opportunity to help tell his story," said Bob Nylen, the museum's curator of history.

Gold Dredges: The Land Leviathans by Rick Martin.

An in depth presentation of the origin, operations and economics of giant land based gold dredges from the turn of the 20th century to their decline mid-century, and limited operations in the 1980-1990s. Photographs, early films, and personal experiences will offer unique insight into these massive mechanical marvels and the men who built and operated them. Rick Martin is the Senior Health and Safety consultant at the Tesla Gigafactory construction site, and his 40 + year career includes Law Enforcement, Fire Service, Emergency Medical Services, and Mining Safety Management. He is working on three books for publication, on the history of the Carson River mills, on early logging and deforestation of the Sierras, and on the history of giant gold dredges of the 19th century.

The Fort Churchill eBay Collection by Gene Hattori, PhD.

September 22, 2016

Nevada State Museum curators are frequently asked to identify rocks, animal bones, antiques, and artifacts. In 2015, Fort Churchill State Park staff brought in a small collection of historic artifacts that was privately purchased on eBay and then immediately donated to the park. This collection was advertised as being recovered from Fort Churchill sometime prior to its 1957 entry into the Nevada State Park System. Gene Hattori, Curator of Anthropology, will discuss what this collection was comprised of and how he evaluated the artifacts and collection to verify their association with this Civil War era fort occupied between 1860 and 1869. Gene Hattori has served as Curator of Anthropology at the Nevada State Museum in Carson City since 1999. He earned his master's degree (1975) and his Ph.D. in anthropology from Washington State University, Pullman (1982), and a Bachelor of Science degree in zoology from the University of Nevada, Reno (1971).

Cancellation of Carson City Mint Coin Show

The Nevada State Museum in Carson City will no longer present the Carson City Mint Coin Show. The event will not take place August 19 and 20, 2016. The situation is not expected to change in the foreseeable future.

Historically, the coin show was held at the museum. This required use of three galleries. The museum began hosting major changing exhibits to give visitors a way to experience more stories and collections about Nevada's heritage. During the state's sesquicentennial, the museum opened the very successful Finding Fremont exhibit. The exhibit overlapped coin show dates. Galleries were needed for this important exhibit and statewide celebration. As a result, the show was moved to the Carson City Nugget across the street. The Nugget was a very generous sponsor. Although this allowed continuation of the show, most coin dealers were not happy with the move. They preferred having the show at the museum. The show continued at the Nugget for two more years.

The coin show will not return to the museum. After the Fremont exhibit closed, galleries were needed to store collections transferred from an off-site warehouse. This was necessary to improve the care and security of artifacts and to maintain accreditation. In the future, when galleries are no longer need for collections, the museum will resume hosting major changing exhibits. Such exhibits are critical for visitor engagement and developing revenue and attendance. The museum can no longer commit to clearing out galleries for a two-day event.

Historically, a small part of the coin show was held outside. Coin dealers were located in the museum's parking lot under canopies. This is no longer a feasible option. An outdoor setup alone accommodates only a small number of dealers, not enough for a worthwhile show. Logistics and security for an outdoor event

require considerable staff time. All coin displays are moved into the museum at night and then reassembled the next day. The museum has fewer staff now.

Priorities have changed.
Less staff time is
available to manage the
show. The museum
holds responsibility for
major collections. Most
are in storage. The
museum is focusing more
resources on improving
the care and security of
collections to make sure
they are conserved for future
generations.

The Downtown Coin Club stepped up to help the museum the past few years when the show was held at the Carson City Nugget. We've enjoyed a wonderful partnership. But, they are not in the position to take over the show on an ongoing basis.

The Carson City Mint Coin Show was successful for many years. Audiences enjoyed enhancing their coin collections. They learned about numismatics, the mint, and the Comstock. The museum thanks coin dealers for their support. But, the time has come to explore new ways to engage audiences in understanding and celebrating these important parts of our state's history.
