## 4-H Provides a Training Roadmap to Positive Youth Development

4-H prides itself on being one the country's premiere youth programs. But how does 4-H keep volunteer leaders up to date with the latest research on positive youth development and out of school education? One way is for volunteers to utilize an online service provided by 4-H.org.

4-H.org is an on-line service of National 4-H that offers educational updates and support for 4-H volunteers. This article will look at one aspect of this on-line service: Volunteer Research, Knowledge and Competency (VRKC) which is designed to advance volunteer knowledge. It asks the important question: "What skills or competencies will volunteers need in order to effectively deliver 4-H programs and projects in the next decade?" VRKC answers this question by identifying the skills and knowledge volunteers themselves have outlined as needed to be competent in their 4-H service.

The VRKC outlines six domains that volunteers should understand and master in order to deliver a successful 4-H project and program:

- Communications
- Organization
- 4-H Program Management
- Educational Design and Delivery
- Positive Youth Development
- Interpersonal Characteristics

**Communications:** The ability to create, deliver and interpret information effectively through formal and non-formal means. This will include: speaking skills, listening skills, writing skills, non-verbal skills, information delivery and dissemination, marketing and public relations, and use of technology.


**Organization:** The ability to engage others in planning, providing and delivering positive 4-H Youth development programming in a community. This will include: planning and organizing, time management, parent recruitment and involvement, delegating tasks to parents, service to community, and marketing and publicity.

**4-H Program Management:** Understanding and following appropriate policies, procedures and safety guidelines when acting on behalf of Cooperative Extension. This

includes: organization and structure of Cooperative Extension, risk management/risk reduction, liability awareness and reduction, club management, behavior management, record keeping, financial management, and computer skills.

**Educational Design and Delivery:** The ability to plan and evaluate research-based learning opportunities that effectively promote positive personal development. This includes: use of age-appropriate activities, utilization of multiple teaching strategies, understanding of differences in learning styles, knowledge of subject matter, team building skills, application of experiential learning, and program evaluation methods.

**Positive Youth Development:** The ability to intentionally and appropriately apply the principles and best practices that result in the positive development of youth. This includes: developing life skills, leadership skills, understanding ages and stages of youth development, empowerment of others, practicing youth-adult partnerships, ability to motivate and encourage youth, and appreciating diversity.



**Interpersonal Characteristics:** The ability to develop effective relationships, work competently with individuals and groups and express empathy and understanding for others. This includes: caring for others, a compassionate nature, acceptance of others, honesty, ethics and morality, patience, ability to develop and strengthen relationships, and flexibility.

The framework for the VRKC may seem vast and overwhelming, but taken in small bits, the domains can be tamed and managed. Your county 4-H staff is always here to support volunteers and their training. Do not hesitate to take a look at the VRKC or to reach out to staff to request further training. You as a volunteer, can access the VRKC by searching 4-H.org/VRKC.


## Leave Your Horse at Home


## Learn How to Reduce the Radon Health Risk

January is National Radon Action Month, and University of Nevada Cooperative Extension's Radon Education Program is offering educational presentations at various Reno locations. Free test kits will also be available at the presentations.

Radon is a naturally occurring, radioactive gas that is colorless, odorless and tasteless. It comes from the ground and can accumulate in homes, raising the risk of lung cancer. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) estimates 21,000 Americans die each year from radon-caused lung cancer, killing more people than secondhand smoke, drunk driving, falls in the home, drowning or house fires.

In Nevada, one in four homes tested show radon concentrations at or above the EPA action level. In Washoe County, 21.8 percent of tested homes had elevated radon concentrations above the action level. According to experts, living in a home with radon concentrations at the action level poses as much risk of developing lung cancer as smoking about half a pack of cigarettes a day.

The risk of radon-caused lung cancer can be reduced. A simple three-day test can determine if a house has a radon problem, and winter is an ideal time to test a home for radon. If radon problems are found, they can be fixed. Find out more and get a free test kit at a presentation in your community.

For those who cannot attend a presentation, free radon test kits are also available through Feb. 29 at the Washoe County Cooperative Extension office, 4955 Energy Way, in Reno.

The Nevada Radon Education Program is a program of University of Nevada Cooperative Extension and is funded by the Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health. Since the program began in 2007, more than 21,000 homes have been tested in Nevada.

Cooperative Extension, the EPA and the Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health urge all Nevadans to get their homes tested for radon.
