Introduction: Health and Health Care in Rural and Frontier Nevada

The *Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book* – Seventh Edition contains a wide range of current county-level information on the resident population, economy, social environment, population health, health workforce, and the health care delivery system. It includes important data for public policy makers, health care professionals and administrators, rural health care advocates, and equally important, the residents of rural and frontier Nevada. The primary purpose of this data book is to provide the most current and accurate data for these audiences, as well as for those interested in learning more about health and health care in Nevada.

Utilizing over 50 sources of public and private data, most tables also provide data aggregated at the regional level highlighting important, general distinctions between rural and urban regions of the state. In some cases, the only available data is regional in nature (e.g., HIV/AIDS prevalence rates). In other instances, the data counts for individual rural and frontier counties are suppressed by the data-collecting agency for confidentiality or other reasons (e.g., teen pregnancy and birth rates). Regardless, the expressed intent of this publication is to highlight important differences among the urban, rural, and frontier areas of the state.

It should also be noted that, with the state's ever-changing demography, economy, and health care delivery system, some of the data are in flux and, thus, must be approached with caution. In some cases, the information is not updated on a regular basis. Consequently, the "most current" available data likely understates county and regional trends (e.g., unemployment rates, uninsured estimates). Nonetheless, all of the information presented in this volume is, to our best knowledge, the most currently available.

The *Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book* – Seventh Edition is divided into five major sections containing the most current data on:

- Demographic characteristics of rural and frontier Nevada, including recent population estimates and projections;
- The social and economic characteristics of rural and frontier Nevada, including data on income, economic indicators, poverty, and educational attainment;
- Health insurance coverage, population health status, and vital statistics in rural and frontier Nevada;
- The health care workforce in rural and frontier Nevada, including estimates and projections for many licensed health care occupations across the major regions of the state; and
- Health care resources and the economics of health care in rural and frontier Nevada.

The majority of tables contained in the data book are organized into two broad categories: (1) rural and frontier counties and (2) urban counties. Rural and frontier counties include Churchill, Douglas, Elko, Esmeralda, Eureka, Humboldt, Lander, Lincoln, Lyon, Mineral, Nye, Pershing, Storey, and White Pine Counties. Urban counties include Carson City, and Clark and Washoe Counties.

Provider-to-population ratios, insurance enrollment rates, and other population-based ratios and calculations utilize county- and state-level population estimates certified by the Nevada State Demographer’s Office for any given year. Some of the population estimates presented in this data book and utilized in the aforementioned denominators vary slightly from those published later in the same year. Numbers and percentages presented throughout the data book may not add up due to rounding. All dollar figures and estimates are in current U.S. dollars and have not been adjusted for inflation. A complete list of data sources is contained at the end of this report, as well as endnotes providing additional information on data and data sources.

Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book – Seventh Edition details important differences among rural, frontier, and urban areas of Nevada. These differences impact population health, the availability of hospital and other health care resources, and access to health care services between rural and frontier and urban areas. For example, the age distribution of a county has a significant influence on the health status and health care needs of a population. The population age distribution within a county may affect available resources for local residents (e.g., number and percent of Medicare-eligible residents, proportion of county income from Social Security and other transfer payments).

All things being equal, rural counties tend to have an older population than urban counties. An older population, in turn, is typically at a greater risk of death and disability than a younger population, and uses a disproportionately larger share of health care resources. In general, urban, rural and frontier areas possess important differences in demographics, economics, and social characteristics, which produce differences in health priorities, population health, health-related behaviors, the delivery of health services, and access to health care. For example, research has consistently documented higher levels of obesity and smoking prevalence, lower levels of health insurance coverage, and greater barriers to accessing health care services in non-metropolitan versus metropolitan areas. Thus, it is not surprising that non-metropolitan areas have significantly higher age-adjusted all-cause mortality rates and cause-specific mortality rates than metropolitan areas.

Defining Rural and Frontier

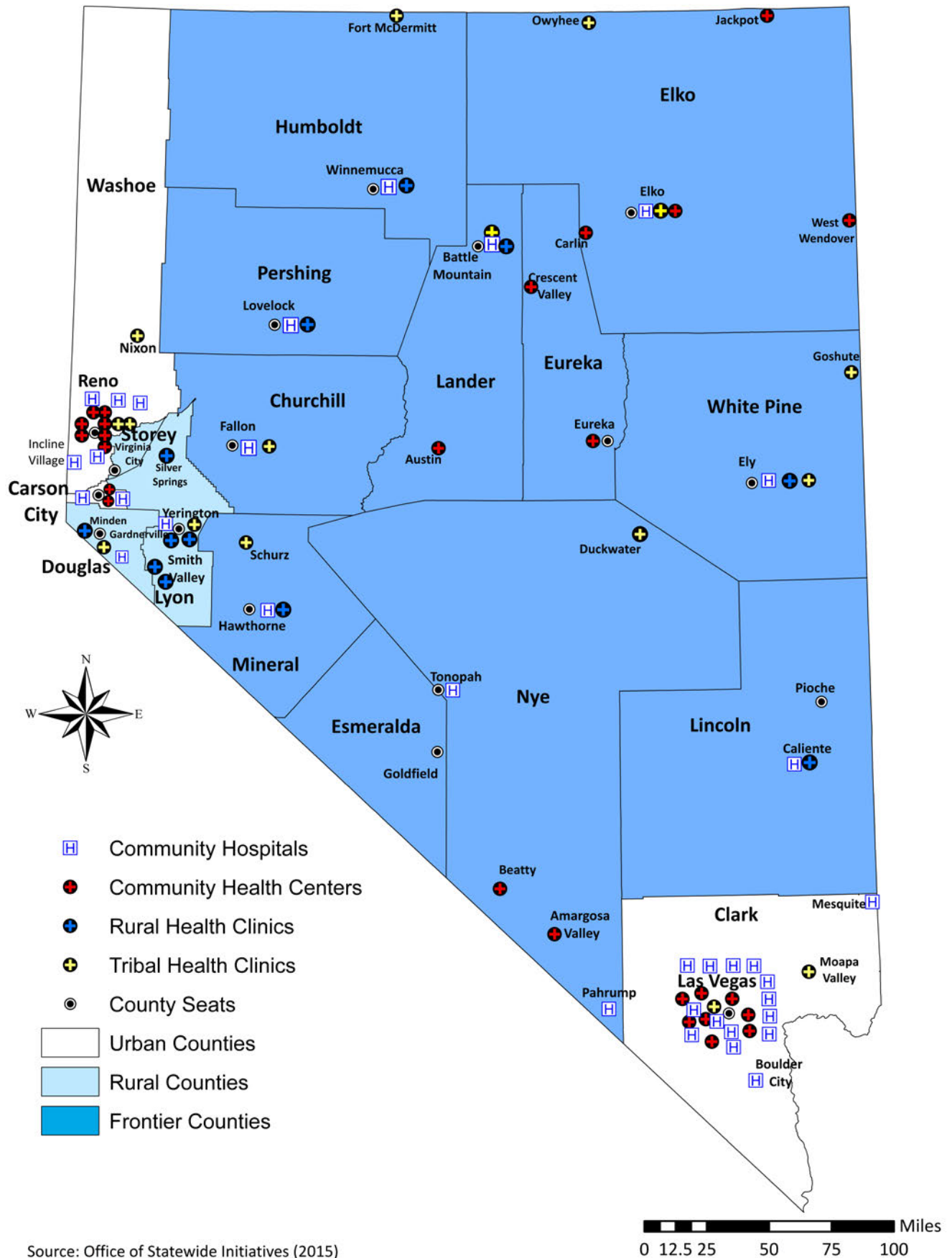
The definition of what is and is not a “rural” area is no mere academic matter. Indeed, policy makers utilize different, and in some cases competing, classification schemes to target programs, services, and projects to populations in Nevada and the United States. The classification scheme adopted by the Nevada Office of Rural Health and utilized in this edition of the *Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book* emphasizes the important distinctions between “rural” and “frontier” regions of the state. This classification scheme was developed by the National Center for Frontier Communities (NCFC) with input from state health planners and rural health professionals throughout the country.

The Center's classification scheme distinguishes certain areas of the country as being more remote than rural areas. The Center's classification scheme represents an improvement over previous schemes that defined "frontier" simply in terms of population density, where counties with a population density of six or less persons per square mile were defined as "frontier." Frontier counties are different from rural counties by being more remote in terms of travel time and distance from the nearest population centers with more specialized medical care and facilities. Additional information on the Center's classification scheme and methodology can be found at www.frontierus.org.

Map 1 highlights the three urban counties (Carson City, and Clark and Washoe County), three rural counties (Douglas, Lyon, and Storey Counties), and the remaining eleven frontier counties. It also indicates the location of Nevada's major towns, cities, and county seats. According to 2014 population estimates prepared by the Nevada State Demographer's Office, 2.5 million Nevadans or 89.9% of the state's population resides in the state's three urban counties. Approximately 72.5% of the state's population resides in Clark County (Las Vegas metropolitan area) alone and 15.5% in Washoe County (Reno-Sparks metropolitan area). In comparison, an estimated 284,496 Nevadans or 10.1% of Nevada's population resides in the state's rural and frontier counties. The rural and frontier population spreads over 95,431 square miles or 86.9% of the state's land mass.

Map 1 also provides a current snapshot of the major health care services available to rural and frontier residents of Nevada. This map excludes the offices of physicians, emergency medical services agencies, or other individual health providers. While most of the state's tertiary care centers are concentrated in the state's three urban counties, a diverse range of acute care hospital services, outpatient clinics and medical services are scattered across twelve of the state's fourteen rural and frontier counties (exceptions are Storey and Esmeralda counties where there are no health care facilities). These facilities and services – highlighted in greater detail throughout this data book – provide most of the basic health care received by our state's rural and frontier populations.

Maps 2 through 4 illustrate different ways that rural and urban areas are defined by federal agencies and researchers. Map 2 provides a visual depiction of the Census Bureau’s classification of urban and rural counties in Nevada. In general, urban counties possess a population greater than 50,000. In Map 2, the state’s three urban counties are shaded white and the state’s fourteen rural counties are shaded in blue. In these terms, Nevada’s three urban counties currently have a combined population of 2,544,298 (89.1%) and its fourteen rural counties have a combined population of 284,496. 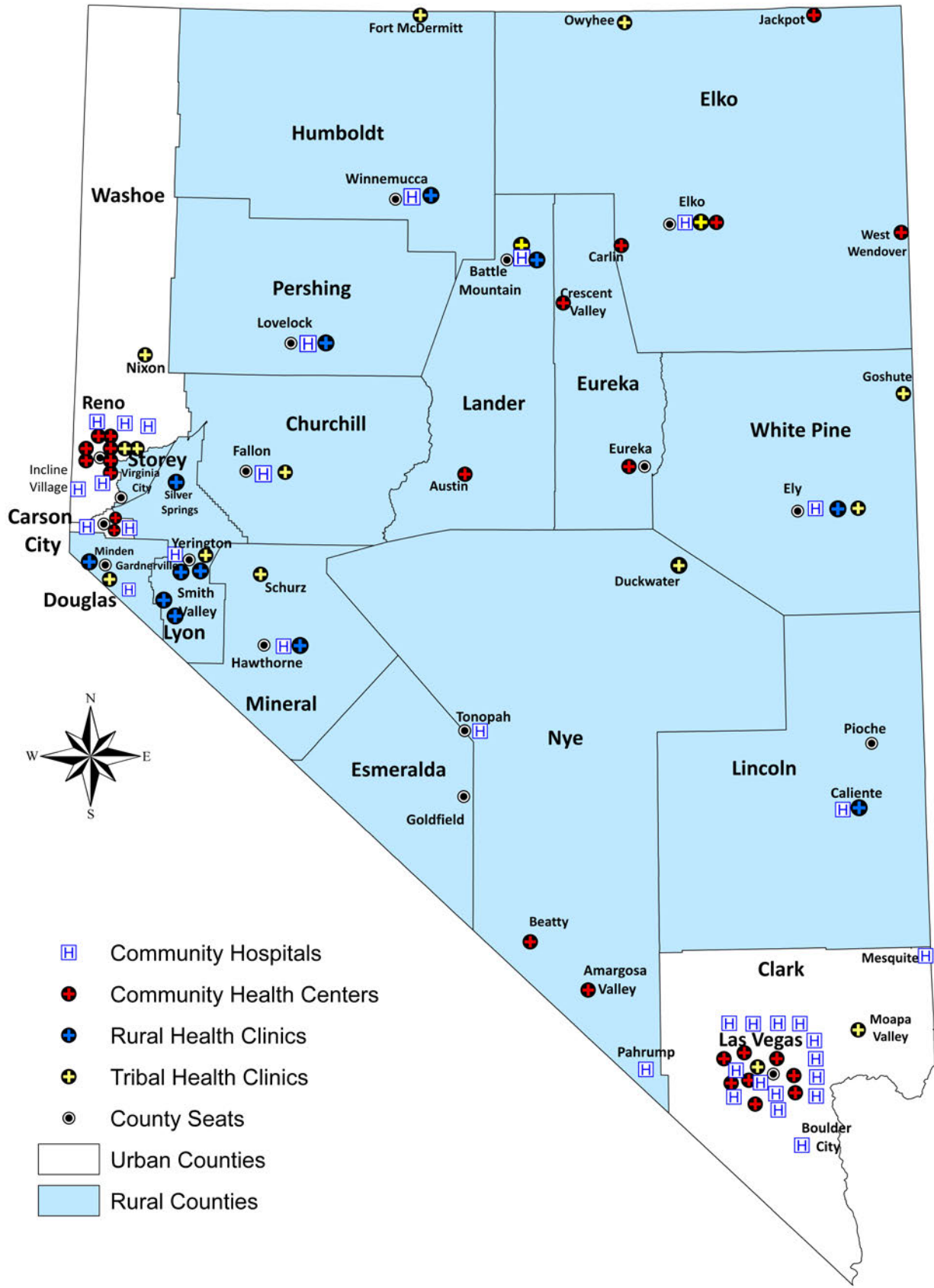
Map 3 illustrates the distribution of metropolitan, micropolitan, and non-metropolitan counties in Nevada utilizing a classification scheme developed by the White House’s Office of Management and Budget (OMB) and used by the Economic Research Service (ERS) of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The original OMB system distinguished two broad types of areas: metropolitan (shaded white in Map 3) and non-metropolitan (shaded light and dark blue). Basically, metropolitan areas have at least one city of more than 50,000 residents and non-metropolitan areas typically have less than 50,000 residents.

The OMB classification scheme was recently updated to include “micropolitan” areas (shaded light blue in Map 3) that are distinguished by closer economic ties to metropolitan areas, yet possessing population less than 50,000. Utilizing the current OMB classifications scheme, Nevada possesses four metropolitan counties with a combined population of 2.5 million, seven micropolitan counties with a population of 250,215, and six non-metropolitan counties with a combined population of 34,281. 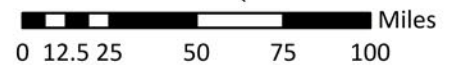
Map 4 illustrates the considerable heterogeneity of Nevada’s population and geography utilizing “Rural-Urban Commuting Areas” or “RUCA” codes ranging from 1 (the red shaded or core areas of urbanized areas) to 10 (the blue shaded, mostly frontier, isolated areas of the state). The RUCA methodology provides a more fine-grained classification of rural areas applicable at both the county and sub-county units of analysis. Map 4 underscores the concentration of most of the state’s population in zip code areas located in the northwestern and southern counties of the state (RUCAs 1-2), and the dispersion of the remaining 10 percent of the population is scattered across a vast geographic expanse of rural and frontier regions of the state (RUCAs 4-10).

Map 4 also highlights the considerable variation within counties. For example, the urban counties of Washoe County and Clark County contain substantial areas that are rural or frontier in nature; conversely rural and frontier counties such as Lyon and Nye Counties possess comparatively small urban areas or zip codes that are economically integrated with urban centers in the state. 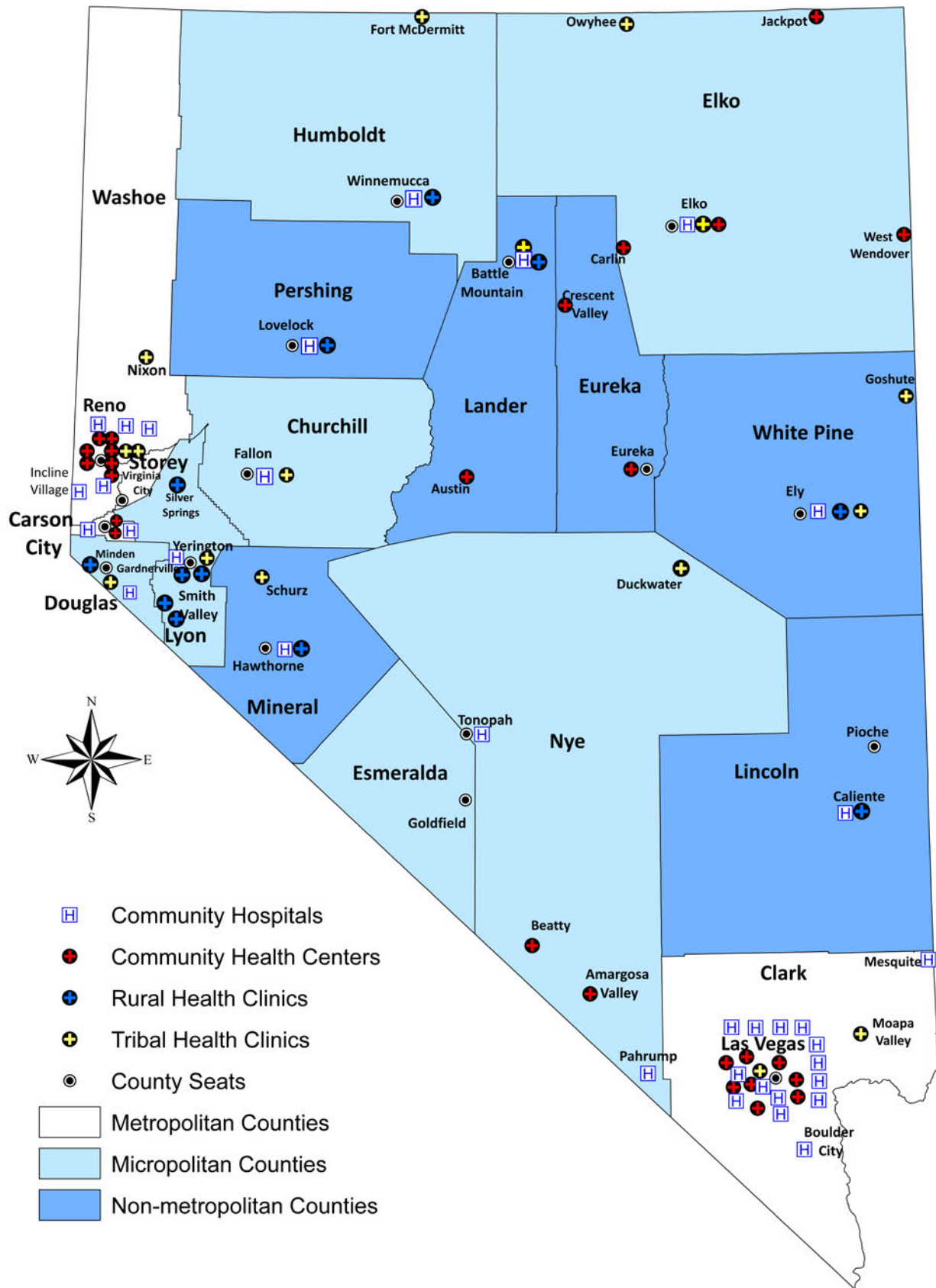
Map 2: Census Bureau Designation of Urban and Rural Areas in Nevada - 2015



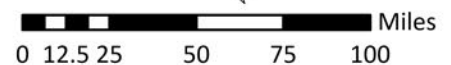

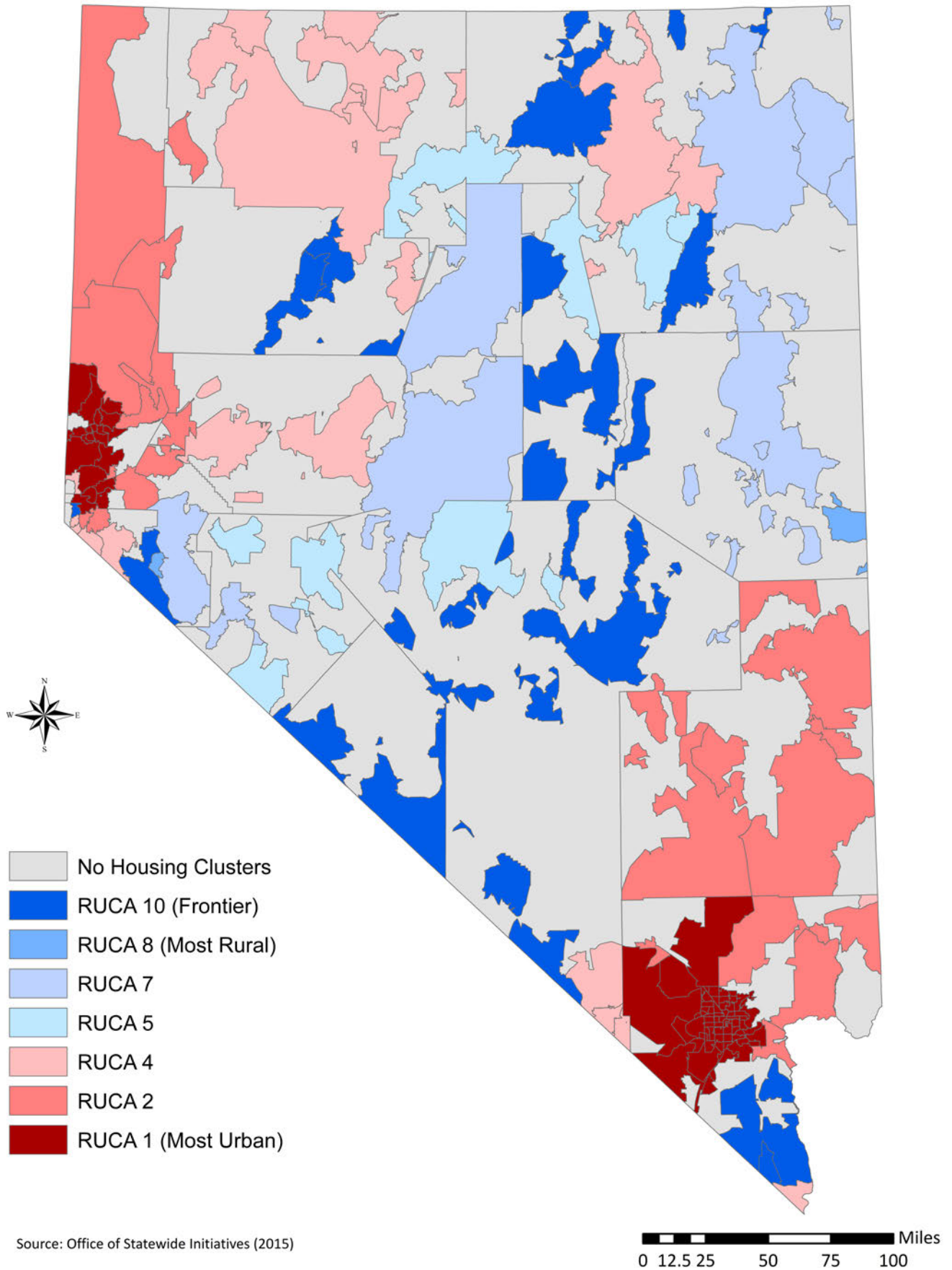
Map 3: Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Designation of Metropolitan, Micropolitan, and Non-metropolitan Areas in Nevada - 2015

Map 4: Nevada Population by Rural-Urban Commuting Areas (RUCA)



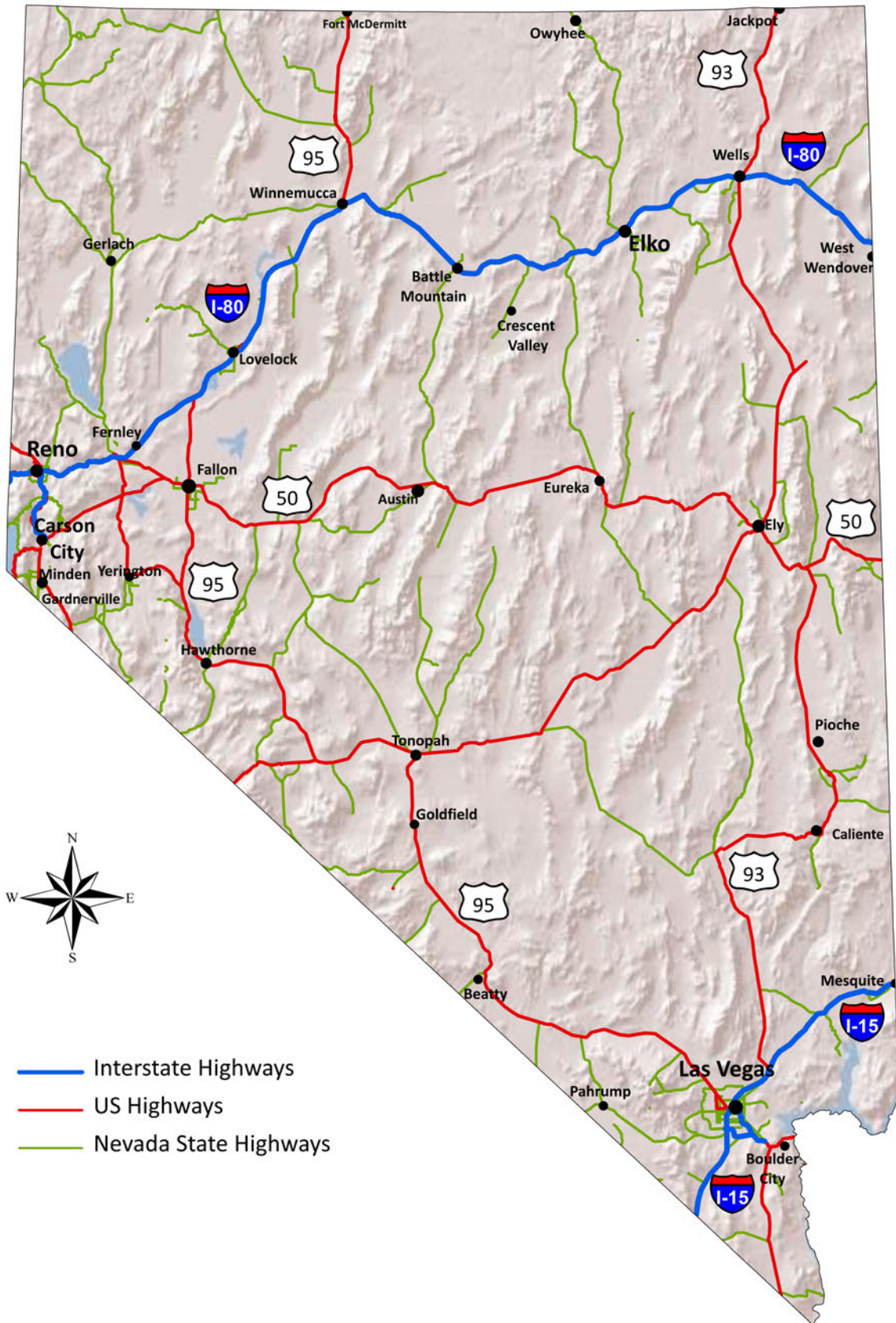
Map 5 highlights the unique topography and vast distances separating the state's rural communities from the urban centers. Most rural and frontier communities are located in sparsely populated counties that are considerable distances from the state's urban and tertiary health care centers. The average distance between acute care hospitals in rural Nevada and the next level of care or tertiary care hospital is 114.7 miles and the average distance to the nearest incorporated town is 46.5 miles. Consequently, the primary health care delivery issue for rural and frontier residents and communities in Nevada is how best to overcome the spatial isolation and enormous geographic distances that characterize most of rural and frontier Nevada.

Nevada comprises the western half of our nation's Great Basin. Ridge after ridge of rugged, brown mountains are broken up with flat sage covered valleys. The Great Basin is a high desert defined by 150 mountain ranges running north to south and earthquake activity second only to Hawai'i. Most mountain passes are subject to very difficult seasonal weather conditions. Most major roads follow the north to south pattern with two major exceptions. U.S. Highway 50 – "the loneliest highway in America" – across the middle of the state winds through numerous mountain summits. Interstate 80 curves northeastwards across the state largely following the railroad tracks built in the 1870's. Travel time from most county hospitals to regional medical centers is thus measured in hours not minutes. Driving long distances is a very daunting task to obtain emergency health care in winter conditions. Helicopter pads are located at all rural hospitals for emergency transport to/from either Reno, Las Vegas, or other emergency care centers.

Map 6 details public and private land ownership in Nevada. Approximately 10 percent of land is privately owned (shaded black). The remaining 90 percent is publicly owned and administered by a wide range of federal, state, and tribal entities. The major administrators of public lands in Nevada are the Bureau of Land Management, Departments of Defense and Energy, and the U.S. Forest Service. The checkerboard pattern along Interstate 80 and the Humboldt River in Northern Nevada highlights a large swath of land owned between the Bureau of Land Management and the railroad company's land grants.

Map 7 highlights the enormous geographic expanse of the state – Nevada is the 7th largest state in the U.S. – by comparing it with selected northeastern states. Nevada's land mass is approximately 110,000 square miles. By comparison, seven northeastern states with a combined land mass of 47,820 square miles would easily fit within Nevada's borders.

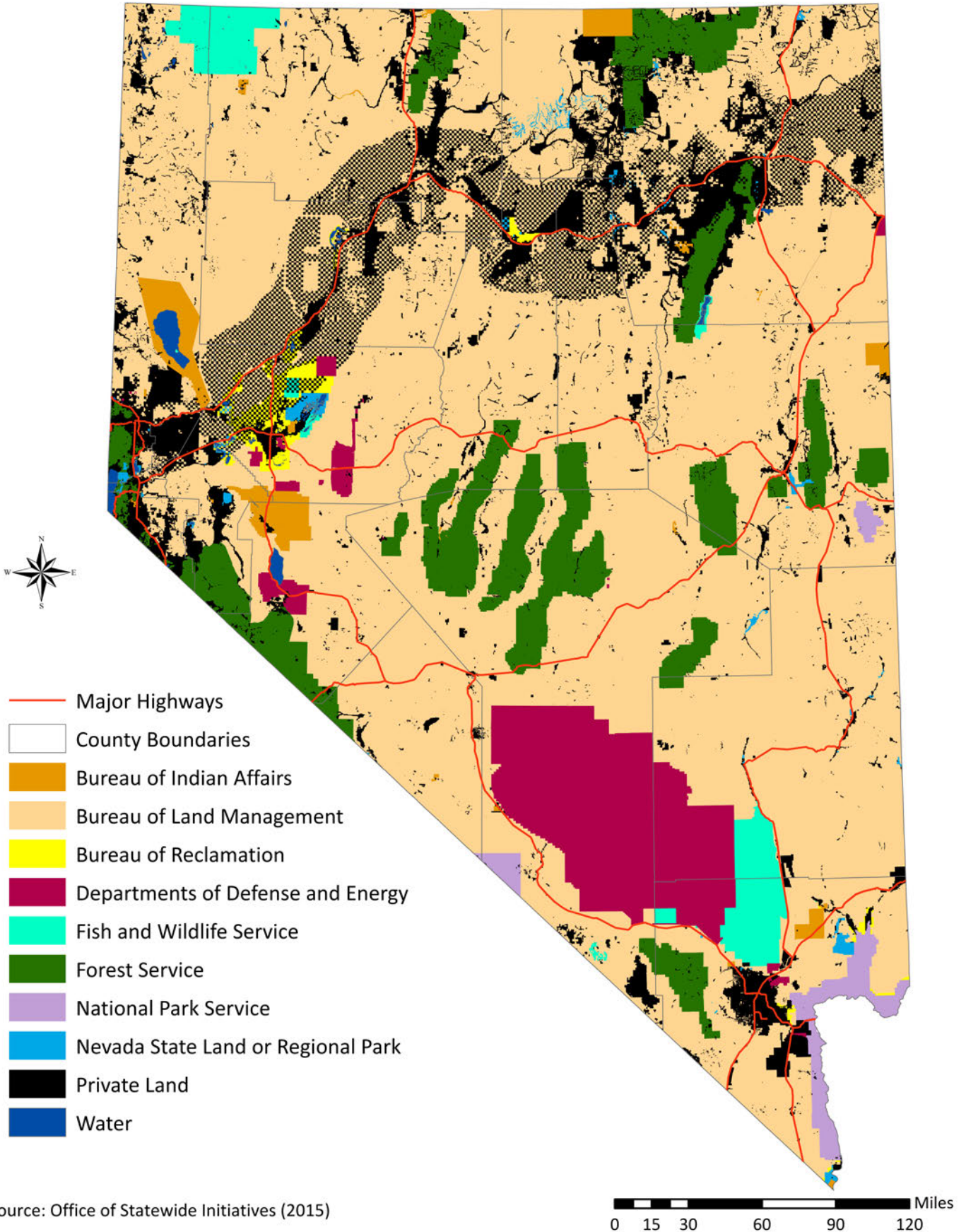
Map 5: Nevada Geography



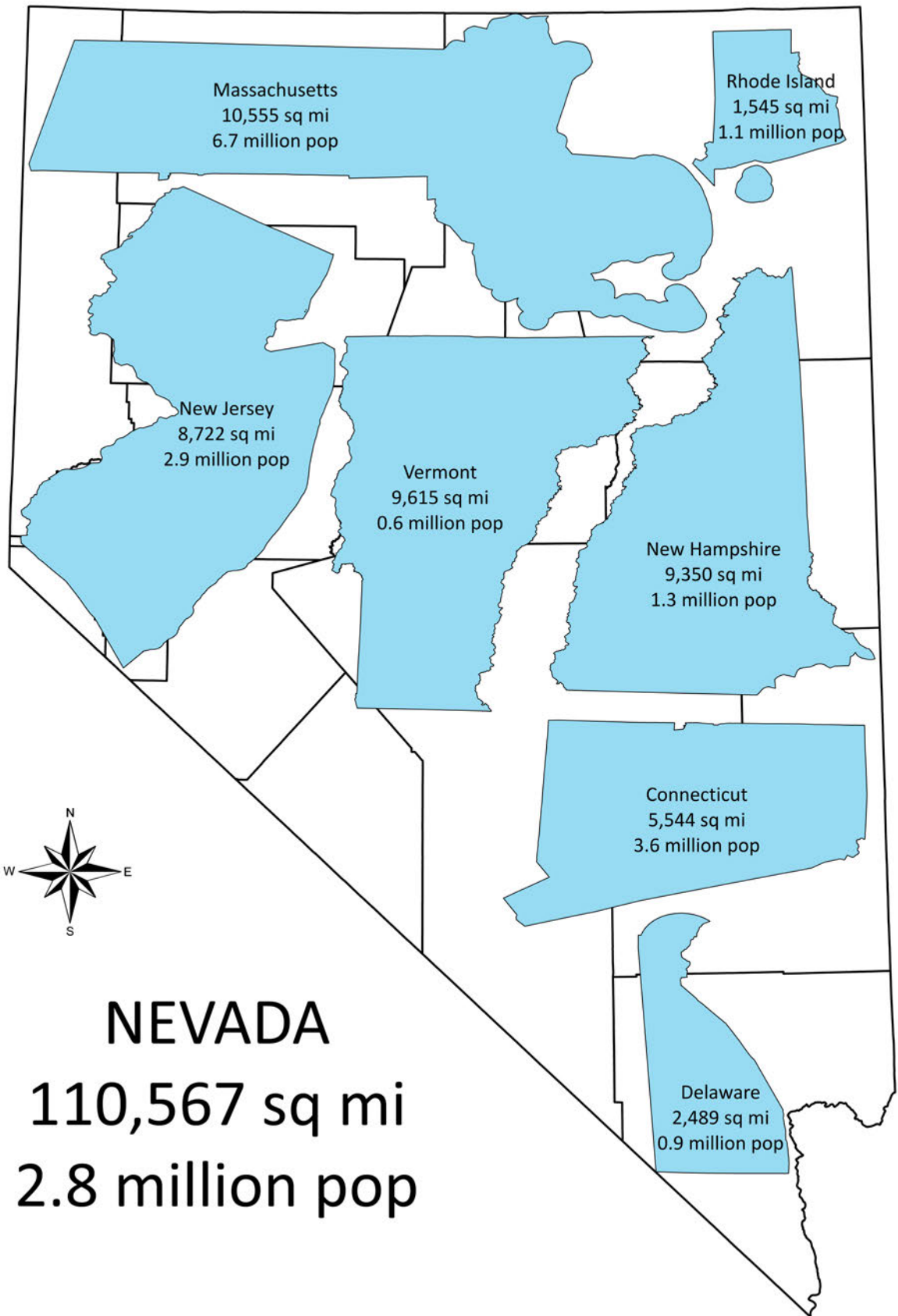

Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book

Section One: Demographic Profile of Rural and Frontier Nevada

Highlights and Key Findings

- The current population of Nevada is 2,855,061, including 286,251 residents in the state's fourteen rural and frontier counties (Table 1.1).
- Over the past four years, the state's population has grown by 128,243 or 4.5%. During the same period, the rural population has grown by 11,895 or 4.2% (Table 1.2).
- Population growth between 2010 and 2014 in rural and frontier counties ranged from a loss of 286 or -6.0% in Mineral County to a gain of 5,483 or 11.2% in Elko County (Table 1.2).
- The population in Nevada is projected to grow from 2,828,794 in 2014 to 3,096,503 in 2024 (9.5%) (Table 1.3).
- Over the next decade, the population of rural and frontier Nevada is projected to grow by 19,948 or 7.0% – 11 rural and frontier counties are projected to increase population, while only three counties are projected to lose population (Table 1.3).
- In both urban and rural Nevada, the population is projected to grow at a slower rate, as compared to the previous two decades. From 1990 to 2010, the state's population increased by 1.5 million residents or 124.7%. During the same period, the rural and frontier population grew by 107,404 or 65.0% (Table 1.4).
- Currently, 10.1% of the state's population resides in rural and frontier areas, as compared to 89.9% residing in the state's three urban counties – 2.1 million residents or 72.5% of the state's population resides in Clark County alone (Table 1.5).
- While rural and frontier counties represent only 10.1% of the state's population, these counties cover 86.9% of the state's land mass or 95,431 square miles (Table 1.5).
- Currently, there are 25.8 people per square mile in Nevada. Population density ranges from 0.3 persons per square mile in Esmeralda County to 383.0 persons per square mile in Carson City (Table 1.6).
- In 2014, there were 10.8 housing units per square mile in Nevada. Housing density ranges from 0.2 housing units per square mile in Esmeralda County and Eureka County to 163.6 housing units per square mile in Carson City (Table 1.6).
- Since 2000, the total number of housing units has increased in both rural and urban regions of the state; rural counties included an increase of 54.3% or 7,819 houses in Lyon County and 35.9% or 5,727 units in Nye County – in urban Clark County, the number of housing units increased by 288,002 or 50.9% (Table 1.7).

- Between 2000 and 2013, the population of rural and frontier Nevada has grown by 27,804 or 10.9% – seven rural and frontier counties increased population, while seven lost population (Table 1.8).
- Between 2000 and 2013, three of the five fastest growing counties in Nevada were rural and frontier: Clark County (42.5%) (urban), Lyon County (41.6%) (rural), Washoe County (29.6) (urban), Nye County (24.6%) (frontier), and Lincoln County (13.6%) (frontier) (Table 1.8).
- In 2013, 1,586,272 (56.6%) Nevadans were residents of an incorporated city, as compared to 1,214,694 (43.4%) who lived in an unincorporated town or rural area (Table 1.9).
- Only 26.8% of the rural and frontier population in Nevada reside in an incorporated area, as compared to 60.0% of urban residents (Table 1.9).
- Currently, 24.1% of the state’s population is 17 and under, 62.2% are between 18 and 64 years of age, and 13.7% are 65 and over (Table 1.10).
- In general, rural counties possess older populations versus urban counties – for example, five rural and frontier counties have more people aged 65 and over than people 17 years of age and under (Table 1.10).
- Between 2000 and 2010, the number of residents aged 65 and over increased in every county in Nevada (Table 1.11).
- Between 2000 and 2010, the number of Nevada residents aged 65 and over grew by 97,930 or 44.1%, including an increase of 15,328 residents aged 65 and over in rural and frontier counties (52.2%) (Table 1.11).
- The number of residents aged 65 and over in Nevada is projected to increase from 385,994 in 2014 to 449,428 in 2019 – an increase of 63,434 or 16.4% (Table 1.12).
- The population aged 65 and over is expected to increase in 12 of 14 rural and frontier counties over the next five years – overall, the number of residents aged 65 and over in rural and frontier Nevada is projected to increase by 7,272 or 13.7% through 2019 (Table 1.12).
- Between 1990 and 2010, the number of residents aged 65 and over in Nevada increased by 192,576 or 150.9%, including an increase of 26,925 in rural and frontier counties (151.5%) (Table 1.13).
- From 1990 to 2012, the median age has increased in every county of Nevada – the state average increased from 33.3 years in 1990 to 36.3 years in 2012 (Table 1.14).
- In 2012, among rural and frontier counties, the median age ranged from 33.4 years in Elko County to 52.8 years in Storey County; by comparison, among urban counties, the median age ranged from 35.5 years in Clark County to 41.6 in Carson City (Table 1.14).
- Between 2000 and 2010, the number of residents aged 17 and under decreased in 10 of 14 rural and frontier counties in Nevada (Table 1.15).

- From 2000 to 2010, the population aged 17 and under in urban counties grew by 156,410 or 30.8% (Table 1.15).
- The number of residents aged 17 and under in Nevada is projected to increase from 676,377 in 2014 to 692,501 in 2019 – an increase of 16,124 or 2.4% (Table 1.16).
- For the next five years, the growth rate in the population aged 17 and under in rural and frontier counties (-1.2%) is projected to be lower than urban counties (2.4%) (Table 1.16).
- From 2000 to 2010, the population aged 18 to 64 in urban counties grew by 428,642 or 38.0%, as compared to rural and frontier counties that grew by 23,898 or 17.2% (Table 1.17).
- The number of residents between the ages of 18 and 64 in Nevada is projected to increase from 1,747,427 in 2014 to 1,804,466 in 2019 – an increase of 57,039 or 3.3% (Table 1.18).
- For the next five years, the growth rate in the population aged 18 to 64 in rural and frontier counties (2.4%) is projected to be similar to that of urban counties (3.4%) (Table 1.18).
- In general, urban areas of Nevada are more racially and ethnically diverse than rural and frontier regions – for example, 78.5% of rural and frontier residents are white, as compared to 51.3% in urban counties (Tables 1.19 and 1.20).
- Hispanic residents represent 15.2% of the population in rural and frontier counties and 29.2% in urban counties of Nevada (Tables 1.19 and 1.20).
- Hispanic residents are a growing segment of the population in every county of Nevada – the percent of the population claiming Hispanic ancestry ranges from 5.5% in Storey County to 21.5% in Humboldt County in rural and frontier areas, as compared to a range of 20.8% in Carson City to 30.6% in Clark County in urban areas (Table 1.21).
- The Hispanic population in Nevada has increased from 124,419 in 1990 to 781,886 in 2014 – an increase of 657,467 or 528.4% (Table 1.22).
- While the growth rate of the Hispanic population has been greater in urban areas (578.3%) of Nevada, the number of Hispanic residents in rural and frontier counties has increased by 27,244 or 176.4% in the past twenty-five years (Table 1.22).
- Between 2014 and 2019, the Hispanic population in Nevada is projected to increase by 81,991 or 10.5% – the growth rate in urban counties (10.6%) is projected to exceed that of rural counties (8.3%) (Table 1.23).
- Currently, there are 223,504 military veterans in Nevada, representing 7.9% of the state’s population (Table 1.24).
- There are 32,575 veterans residing in rural and frontier counties of Nevada – rural veterans represent 14.6% of all veterans in Nevada and 11.5% of the total population of rural and frontier Nevada (Table 1.24).

- The percent of the population who are military veterans ranges from 7.6% in Elko County to 21.7% in Esmeralda and Mineral Counties in rural and frontier areas, as compared to a range of 7.4% in Clark County to 10.4% in Carson City in urban areas (Table 1.24).
- According to the Veterans Health Administration, the veteran population is projected to decline in every county of Nevada between 2014 and 2024 – over the next ten years, the number of veterans in Nevada is expected to decline from 223,504 in 2014 to 197,850 in 2024 (Table 1.25).
- In 2012, an estimated 657,108 residents of Nevada were born in Nevada (24.7% of the population), 1.5 million residents were born in the U.S. outside of Nevada (55.8%), and 518,944 were born in another country (19.5%) (Table 1.26).
- In general, rural areas possess slightly greater percentages of native-born residents than urban regions of Nevada – 27.6% of rural and frontier residents are native-born, as compared to 24.4% in urban counties (Table 1.26).
- A much greater proportion of foreign-born residents are in the urban counties of Nevada than in rural and frontier counties; the foreign-born population ranges from 2.1% of the total population in Eureka and Lincoln Counties to 16.8% in Esmeralda County in rural and frontier areas; from 12.0% in Carson City to 22.3% in Clark County in urban areas of the state (Table 1.26).
- Currently, there are 12,743 prisoners in State of Nevada correctional facilities – 27.0% of the prison population or 3,441 prisoners are incarcerated in rural and frontier facilities (Table 1.27).
- Since 2006, the prison population in Nevada has increased by 706 inmates or 5.9% (Table 1.28).

Section Two: Social and Economic Profile of Rural and Frontier Nevada

Highlights and Key Findings

- From 2002 to 2012, total personal income in Nevada has grown from \$69.3 billion to \$105.5 billion – during the same period; total personal income in rural and frontier counties grew from \$6.7 billion to \$11.1 billion (Table 2.1).
- Most counties in Nevada experienced a decline in total personal income at some point during the 2006 to 2012 period – the exceptions were rural and frontier counties with strong mining sectors (Elko, Eureka, Humboldt, Lander, and Pershing Counties) (Tables 2.1 and 2.2).
- From 2002 to 2012, per capita personal income in Nevada grew from \$31,878 to \$38,221 – during the same decade, per capita income in rural and frontier counties grew from \$28,391 to \$40,676 (Table 2.3).
- In 2012, county-level per capita income in rural and frontier Nevada ranged from \$25,507 in Lincoln County to \$54,199 in Douglas County – the average per capita income for all rural and frontier counties (\$40,676) was above the urban average of \$37,956, yet below the U.S. average of \$43,735 (Table 2.3).
- During the period 2002 to 2007, all Nevada counties experienced a positive change in per capita personal income – 13 of 17 Nevada counties had a rate of growth that exceeded the national average of 25.2% (Table 2.4).
- During the period 2007 to 2012, all urban counties in Nevada experienced a negative change in per capita personal income – in contrast, 12 of 14 rural and frontier counties experienced a positive change in per capita personal income and nine of 14 rural and frontier counties possessed a growth rate exceeding the national average of 9.9% (Table 2.4).
- The average per capita personal income in Nevada of \$38,221 is 87.4% of the U.S. average per capita personal income of \$43,735 – the average per capita personal income in rural and frontier Nevada of \$40,676 is 95.7% of the U.S. average (Table 2.5).
- In 2012, county-level per capita personal income in rural and frontier areas as a percent of the Nevada average per capita personal income ranged from 66.7% in Lincoln County to 141.8% in Douglas County (Table 2.5).

- Nevada’s 14 rural and frontier counties had a combined total of \$11.1 billion in personal income in 2012 from three principal sources: net earnings of \$6.9 billion (61.7%); \$2.3 billion from dividends, interest, rent, and pensions (20.3%); and \$2.0 billion from transfer payments (18.0%) (Tables 2.6 and 2.7).
- Rural and frontier counties vary considerably in terms of the percent of personal income by source. For example, net earnings as a percent of total personal income ranged from 42.1% in Mineral County to 77.5% in Lander County; dividends, interest, rent, and pensions as a percent of total personal income ranged from 11.6% in Lander County to 33.1% in Douglas County; and transfer payments as a percent of total personal income ranged from 10.1% in Eureka County to 40.8% in Mineral County (Table 2.7).
- Nevada rural and frontier counties had a combined total of \$2.0 billion in transfer payments from the following sources: retirement and disability insurance payments of \$831.7 million; medical benefits (Medicare, Medicaid, and VA health care) of \$723.2 million; income maintenance benefits of \$148.3 million; unemployment benefits of \$97.9 million; and other sources of \$118.1 million (Table 2.8).
- In 2013, median family income in Nevada was \$61,359 or 94.8% of the U.S. average of \$64,719 (Tables 2.9 and 2.10).
- Median family income in 2013 among rural and frontier counties of Nevada ranged from \$45,798 in Nye County to \$94,648 in Eureka County (Table 2.9).
- In 2013, 7 of 14 rural and frontier counties had a median family income above the state average of \$61,359 and 5 of 14 rural and frontier counties were above the U.S. average of \$64,719 (Table 2.10).
- In 2013, median household income in Nevada was \$51,250 or 98.1% of the U.S. average of \$52,250 (Table 2.11 and 2.12).
- Median household income among rural and frontier counties in Nevada ranged from \$40,496 in Mineral County to \$71,354 in Elko County in 2013 (Table 2.11).
- In 2013, 8 of 14 rural and frontier counties had a median household income above the state average of \$51,250 and 7 of 14 were above the U.S. average of \$52,250 (Table 2.11).
- In 2013, there were 4.8 personal bankruptcy filings per 1,000 population in Nevada – 45.5% higher than the U.S. rate of 3.3 filings per 1,000 population (Table 2.13).
- Over the past eight years, personal bankruptcy filing rates have declined in every county of Nevada – statewide, the number of filings per 1,000 population has dropped from 9.4 in 2005 to 4.8 in 2013 (Table 2.13).
- From 2003 to 2008, the number of new building permits issued annually in Nevada declined by 77.8% – during the same period, the number of new building permits issued in rural and frontier counties dropped by 74.6% (Table 2.14).

- During the period 2008 to 2013, the number of new building permits issued annually in Nevada increased by 21.5% – the number of new building permits issued in rural and frontier counties increased by 93.9%, as compared to 18.0% in urban counties of the state (Table 2.14).
- In 2012, there were 441,374 Nevadans or 16.2% of the state’s population in poverty, including 34,119 individuals or 12.8% of the population residing in rural and frontier counties (Table 2.15).
- Between 2002 and 2012, the percent of population in poverty increased in 14 of 17 Nevada counties – in rural and frontier Nevada the poverty rate increased from 9.7% in 2002 to 12.8% in 2012 (Table 2.15).
- From the onset of the 2007 to 2012 recession, the number of Nevadans in poverty increased by 173,542 or 64.8% – during the same period, the number of rural and frontier residents in poverty increased by 7,413 or 27.8% (Table 2.16).
- In 2012, 101,584 or 21.7% of the children aged 5 to 17 years were in poverty, including 8,052 or 17.9% of children 5 to 17 years old in rural and frontier areas (Table 2.17).
- In 2012, 152,663 or 23.4% of the children aged 18 and under were in poverty, including 11,596 or 18.9% of children 18 years old and under in rural and frontier areas (Table 2.17).
- In 2012, the rate of childhood poverty in rural and frontier Nevada ranged from 9.4% in Eureka County to 29.0% in Nye County (Table 2.17).
- In 2014, 410,529 Nevadans or 14.5% of the state’s population participated in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), including 30,469 or 10.7% of rural and frontier residents (Table 2.18).
- Between 2006 and 2014, the percent of population participating in the SNAP program increased in 16 of 17 counties in Nevada – among rural and frontier counties, SNAP participation rates currently range from 1.8% in Esmeralda County to 19.7% in Nye County (Table 2.18).
- In 2013, 233,493 students qualified for the Free and Reduced Lunch Program in Nevada (54.7% of the total student population), including 17,367 or 42.1% of the rural and frontier student population (Table 2.19).
- Among rural and frontier counties of Nevada, student participation rates in the Free and Reduced Lunch Program ranged from 20.4% of the student population in Eureka County to 64.0% in Pershing County (Table 2.19).
- In 2013, the average public expenditure on education in Nevada was \$8,274 per pupil – the average expenditure per pupil in rural and frontier counties was \$10,368, as compared to \$8,100 in urban counties (Table 2.20).
- Among Nevada counties in 2013, average public expenditures on education ranged from \$8,006 per pupil in Clark County to \$31,980 per pupil in Esmeralda County (Table 2.20).
- In 2012, there were 461,323 students enrolled in K-12 schools in Nevada (public and private), including 42,313 students enrolled in schools in rural and frontier areas of the state (Table 2.21).

- In 2012, 441,040 students or 95.6% of the total student population were enrolled in public K-12 schools as well as 20,283 or 4.4% were enrolled in private K-12 schools in Nevada – in rural and frontier counties, 98.6% were enrolled in public K-12 schools and 1.4% were enrolled in private K-12 schools (Table 2.21).
- In 2012, students enrolled in K-12 public and private schools represented 16.8% of the state’s population – students represented a slightly higher percentage of the total population in urban counties (16.4%), as compared to rural and frontier counties (14.9%) (Table 2.22).
- In 2012, there were 441,040 students enrolled in public primary and secondary schools in Nevada, including 41,706 in rural and frontier counties of which 22,111 were students enrolled in public primary schools and 19,541 were students enrolled in public secondary schools in rural and frontier counties (Table 2.24).
- In 2013, the average high school graduation rate in Nevada was 70.7% – among Nevada’s 17 counties, the graduation rate ranged from 51.5% in Mineral County to 95.0% in Eureka County (Table 2.25).
- On average, the high school graduation rate in Nevada for females is 74.0%, as compared to 67.3% for males (Table 2.25).
- In 2013, graduation rates in Nevada varied considerably by race and ethnicity – for example, the graduate rate for whites was 77.2%, Hispanics was 64.4%, American Indians was 58.7%, Asians was 82.0%, Pacific Islanders was 74.8%, and Blacks was 56.7% (Table 2.26).
- In 2012, there were 9,708 graduating high school students in Nevada who were eligible for Millennium Scholarships, including 939 students in rural and frontier counties (Table 2.27).
- In 2012, there were 21,648 public high school graduates that enrolled in a Nevada System of Higher Education (NSHE) institution, including 2,374 graduates from public high schools in rural and frontier counties (Table 2.28).
- Between 2006 and 2012, the number of public high school graduates in Nevada increased by 5,305 – however, the percent of graduates enrolled in NSHE institutions declined from 46.7% in 2006 to 41.4% in 2012 (Table 2.28).
- Between 2009 and 2011, the percent of Nevada high school graduates enrolled in NSHE institutions increased from 49.2% to 51.6% – however, during the same time period, the percent of students who finished one year of higher education courses decreased from 72.7% to 64.3% (Table 2.29).
- In 2012, 84.4% of Nevadans aged 25 and older graduated from high school, 22.2% had a bachelor’s degree or higher, and 7.1% had a master’s degree or higher – the percentages in all three categories have increased since 2000 (Table 2.30).
- Urban and rural areas of Nevada, in 2012, have similar high school graduation rates – however, the percent of population aged 25 and over with a bachelor’s degree is lower in rural and frontier areas of the state (16.5%) when compared to urban areas (22.9%), and the percent with a master’s degree or higher is lower in rural areas (5.6%) versus urban areas (7.7%) (Table 2.30).

- In 2014, there were 1,475,969 registered voters out of an eligible voting population of 2,090,830 (70.6%), including 155,439 registered voters in rural and frontier counties out of an eligible population of 221,230 (70.3%) (Table 2.31).
- County-level voter registration rates in Nevada range from 52.8% in Lander County to 85.3% in Douglas County (Table 2.31).
- Currently, registered Republicans outnumber registered Democrats in 15 of 17 counties in Nevada – however, there are 490,496 registered Republicans (33.2%), as compared to 597,989 registered Democrats (40.5%) in Nevada, with an additional 387,484 Nevadans registered as Independents or another party affiliation (26.3%) (Tables 2.32 and 2.33).
- There are 1,271 community organizations in Nevada or 46.2 community organizations per 100,000 population – the number of community organizations per 100,000 population ranges from 36.2 in Clark County to 112.5 in Lander County (there are no reported community organizations in Esmeralda County) (Table 2.34).
- In 2010, the percent of population participating in the U.S. Decennial Census was 71%, in Nevada, which is lower than the U.S. average of 74% – county-level participation rates ranged from 32% in Esmeralda County to 85% in Storey County (Table 2.35).
- In 2012, there were 77,833 reported property crimes and 16,743 reported violent crimes in Nevada, including 5,774 property crimes and 1,039 violent crimes reported in rural and frontier counties (Tables 2.36 and 2.37).
- In 2012, the rate of reported violent crimes per 100,000 population in Nevada was 608.8 – county-level rates ranged from 39.2 in Lincoln County to 1,169.9 in Storey County (Table 2.38).
- In 2012, the rate of reported property crimes per 100,000 population in Nevada was 2,830.1 – county-level rates ranged from 930.2 in Esmeralda County to 2,999.6 in Clark County (Table 2.38).

Section Three: Population Health Profile of Rural and Frontier Nevada

Highlights and Key Findings

- In 2012, there were 580,573 uninsured Nevadans under the age of 65 (24.5%), including 50,533 uninsured rural and frontier residents (22.9%) (Table 3.1).
- In 2012, 590,607 Nevadans under the age of 65 were below 138% of the federal poverty level – 237,690 or 40.2% of this group were uninsured, including 19,566 rural and frontier residents (40.9%) (Table 3.2).
- In 2012, 1.1 million Nevadans under the age of 65 were below 250% of the federal poverty level – 410,153 or 37.3% of this group were uninsured, including 34,551 rural and frontier residents (36.9%) (Table 3.3).
- In 2012, 1.6 million Nevadans under the age of 65 were below 400% of the federal poverty level – 520,190 or 31.6% of this group were uninsured, including 44,564 rural and frontier residents (30.2%) (Table 3.4).
- There were 114,866 uninsured Nevadans under the age of 19 (16.7%) in 2012, including 11,306 uninsured rural and frontier children (17.4%) (Table 3.6).
- In 2012, 229,037 Nevadans under the age of 19 were below 138% of the federal poverty level – 52,111 or 22.8% of this group were uninsured, including 4,421 rural and frontier children (24.5%) (Table 3.7).
- There were 475,714 uninsured Nevadans between the ages of 18 and 64 (27.8%) in 2012, including 40,277 uninsured rural and frontier residents (25.4%) (Table 3.8).
- In 2012, 372,112 Nevadans between the ages of 18 and 64 were below 138% of the federal poverty level – 189,937 or 51.0% of this group were uninsured, including 15,573 rural and frontier residents (50.5%) (Table 3.9).
- There were 204,428 uninsured Nevadans between the ages of 40 and 64 (22.8%) in 2012, including 19,690 uninsured rural and frontier residents (20.8%) (Table 3.10).
- In 2012, 159,924 Nevadans between the ages of 40 and 64 were below 138% of the federal poverty level – 77,585 or 48.5% of this group were uninsured, including 7,089 rural and frontier residents (48.1%) (Table 3.11).
- Currently, 573,874 Nevadans or 20.3% of the population are enrolled in Nevada Medicaid, including 47,638 rural and frontier residents (16.7%) (Table 3.12).
- Between 2004 and 2014, Nevada Medicaid enrollment has increased by 374,388 or 187.7%, including enrollment growth of 26,879 (129.5%) in rural and frontier counties (Table 3.13).

- Between 2004 and 2014, Nevada Check Up (Nevada’s Children’s Health Insurance Program) enrollment has increased by 5,778 or 21.4% – Nevada Check Up enrollment declined in 12 of 14 rural and frontier counties over the past decade (Table 3.14).
- Currently, 215 Nevada Check Up enrollees are under the age of 1 (0.7%), 7,825 are between the ages of 1 and 6 (23.8%), 16,164 are between the ages of 7 and 13 (49.2%), and 8,185 are between the ages of 14 and 18 (24.9%) (Table 3.15).
- In 2012, there were 429,566 Nevadans eligible for Medicare benefits, including 358,347 residents aged 65 and over (83.4%) and 71,219 disabled Nevadans (16.6%) (Table 3.16).
- In 2012, there were 60,046 rural and frontier resident of Nevada eligible for Medicare benefits, including 50,463 residents aged 65 and over (84.0%) and 9,583 disabled residents (16.0%) (Table 3.16).
- In 2012, 435,196 Nevadans were enrolled in Medicare Part A (100.0% of the Medicare-eligible population), 386,998 were enrolled in Medicare Part B (88.9%), 141,389 were enrolled Medicare Part C (32.5%), and 145,496 were enrolled in Medicare Part D (33.4%) (Tables 3.17 and 3.18).
- In 2012, 58,512 Nevadans residing in rural and frontier counties were enrolled in Medicare Part A (100.0% of the Medicare-eligible population), 55,221 were enrolled in Medicare Part B (94.4%), 10,684 were enrolled Medicare Part C (18.3%), and 24,097 were enrolled in Medicare Part D (41.2%) (Tables 3.17 and 3.18).
- Between 2000 and 2012, the Medicare-eligible population in Nevada has grown by 195,625 or 81.6% – the rate of growth of this population was greater in rural and frontier areas (95.1%) than urban areas of the state (80.4%) (Table 3.19).
- In 2013, there were 102,495 Nevadans enrolled in the Veterans Health Administration – this figure represents 45.4% of all veterans in Nevada (Tables 3.20 and 3.22).
- During 2013, 65,854 veterans in Nevada used health care services delivered by the Veterans Health Administration – this figure represents 29.2% of all veterans in Nevada (Table 3.21 and 3.22).
- In 2013, there were 14,617 rural and frontier veterans enrolled in the Veterans Health Administration – this figure represents 44.8% of all veterans residing in rural and frontier counties in Nevada (Tables 3.20 and 3.22).
- During 2013, 10,100 rural and frontier veterans in Nevada who used health care services delivered by the Veterans Health Administration – this figure represents 30.9% of all veterans living in rural and frontier areas in Nevada (Tables 3.21 and 3.22).
- Over the past decade, the number of Native Americans using tribal health services in Nevada grew from 15,579 in 2003 to 19,152 – an increase of 3,573 or 22.9% (Table 3.23).

- In 2013, 9,081 patients (47.4% of all users) received health care services from tribal facilities located in rural and frontier counties of Nevada (Table 3.23).
- In terms of self-reported health status, risk factors to health, and utilization of preventive health services, there are substantial differences between rural and urban areas of Nevada. For example, residents of rural and frontier areas of the state report higher rates of obesity and higher levels of hypertension than do residents of urban areas (Tables 3.24 to 3.26).
- New data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) provide information on county-level trends in diabetes incidence, obesity prevalence, and leisure-time physical inactivity prevalence in Nevada. For example, while obesity rates are generally lower in most Nevada counties compared to the U.S. rate of 28.7% of adults who are obese, county-level obesity prevalence ranges from 21.6% in Douglas County to 31.6% in Churchill County in 2011 (Tables 3.27 to 3.29).
- The National Survey on Drug Use and Health administered by the U.S. Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) yields current data on a wide-range of self-reported mental health and substance abuse indicators by region in Nevada. For example, rural and frontier counties report higher levels of cigarette and tobacco product use than urban counties (Table 3.30).
- The Nevada Office of Public Health Informatics and Epidemiology collects current data on indicators of infectious disease incidence (new cases) and prevalence (total cases) by region in Nevada. For example, in 2013, the number of new cases of chlamydia per 100,000 population is considerably lower in rural and frontier counties (218.9), as compared to Washoe County (391.2) and Clark County (428.9) (Tables 3.31 to 3.36).
- The Nevada Office of Public Health Informatics and Epidemiology collects a wide-range of data on indicators of maternal and child health by county and region in Nevada. For example, over the past three years, all but one county in Nevada reported a decline in teen pregnancy rates and 12 of 16 counties reported a decline in teen birth rates (Tables 3.37 to 3.45).
- The Nevada Department of Education (NDOE) collects data on childhood disabilities by county of residence, including data on autism spectrum disorders, learning disabilities, and speech/language/hearing impairment. In 2013, there were 50,332 total cases of childhood disability in Nevada, including 5,541 cases in rural and frontier Nevada (Table 3.46).
- The Nevada Office of Public Health Informatics and Epidemiology collects a wide-range of data on mortality and leading causes of death by county and region in Nevada (Tables 3.47 to 3.56).
- In 2013, the age-adjusted mortality rate for all causes of death in Nevada was 777.4 deaths per 100,000 population – rates declined in 10 of 17 counties since 2009 and currently range from 561.4 in Storey County to 1,272.9 in Esmeralda County (Table 3.47).
- In 2013, the age-adjusted mortality rate for heart disease in Nevada was 199.2 deaths per 100,000 population – rates declined in 9 of 16 counties with available data since 2009 and currently range from 78.2 in Pershing County to 582.8 in Eureka County (Table 3.48).

- In 2013, the age-adjusted mortality rate for malignant neoplasms (cancer) in Nevada was 166.9 deaths per 100,000 population – rates declined in 9 of 15 counties with available data since 2009 and currently range from 62.7 in Storey County to 262.8 in Mineral County (Table 3.49).
- In 2013, the ten leading causes of death in Nevada were: (1) heart disease; (2) cancer; (3) chronic lower respiratory disease; (4) lung, trachea, and bronchus cancer; (5) cerebrovascular disease (stroke); (6) non-transport (pedestrian) accidents; (7) prostate cancer; (8) breast cancer; (9) influenza and pneumonia; and (10) Alzheimer’s disease (Table 3.55).
- In 2013, the ten leading causes of death in rural and frontier Nevada were: (1) heart disease; (2) cancer; (3) chronic lower respiratory disease; (4) lung, trachea, and bronchus cancer; (5) cerebrovascular disease (stroke); (6) prostate cancer; (7) non-transport (pedestrian) accidents; (8) diabetes mellitus; (9) Alzheimer’s disease; and (10) breast cancer (Table 3.55).
- For the past five years, the University of Wisconsin and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation have ranked all U.S. counties in terms of health determinants (health behaviors, clinical care, social and economic factors, and physical environment) and health outcomes (length of life and quality of life). Among Nevada counties, Lincoln County is currently the healthiest county in Nevada and Nye County is the least healthy (Tables 3.57 and 3.58).

Section Four: Health Care Workforce in Rural and Frontier Nevada

Highlights and Key Findings

- Currently, there are 1.37 million Nevadans in the state's labor force, including 1.26 million who are employed and 112,617 who are unemployed – the annualized unemployment rate for 2014 is 8.2% (Table 4.1).
- In 2014, the average annual unemployment rate ranged from 3.1% in Esmeralda County to 11.5% in Lyon County – across most rural counties, unemployment rates increased between 2004 and 2010, and have declined between 2010 and 2014 (Table 4.2).
- In 2013, there were an estimated 96,484 Nevadans employed in the health sector, including 6,276 in rural and frontier counties – 7.0% of the state's workforce is employed in hospitals, outpatient settings, nursing homes, pharmacies, and other industries in the health sector (Table 4.3).
- In 2013, Nevadans employed in the health sector earned \$5.5 billion in payroll, including \$287.8 million by rural Nevadans (Table 4.4).
- In 2014, there were an estimated 105,692 Nevadans employed in the health care and social services sector, including 44,259 employed in ambulatory health care services (41.9%), 32,148 employed in hospitals (30.4%), and 12,198 employed in nursing and residential care facilities (11.5%) (Table 4.5).
- In 2014, there were an estimated 6,064 individuals employed in the health care and social services sector in rural and frontier counties of Nevada, including 2,305 employed in ambulatory health care services (38.0%), 2,154 employed in hospitals (35.5%), and 1,006 employed in nursing and residential care facilities (16.6%) (Table 4.5).
- In 2024, there will be a projected 121,132 Nevadans employed in the health care and social services sector, including 50,441 employed in ambulatory health care services (41.6%), 35,243 employed in hospitals (29.1%), and 13,958 employed in nursing and residential care facilities (11.5%) (Table 4.6).
- In 2024, there were an estimated 7,487 individuals employed in the health care and social services sector in rural and frontier counties of Nevada, including 2,843 employed in ambulatory health care services (38.0%), 2,179 employed in hospitals (29.1%), and 1,223 employed in nursing and residential care facilities (16.3%) (Table 4.6).
- In 2014, there were 4,874 licensed allopathic physicians (MDs) in Nevada or 172.3 MDs per 100,000 population, including 207 licensed MDs in rural and frontier counties or 72.8 MDs per 100,000 population (Table 4.7).

- Over the past decade, the number of licensed MDs in Nevada increased from 3,616 in 2004 to 4,874 in 2014 – an increase of 1,258 or 34.8% (Table 4.7).
- Since 2004, the number of licensed MDs per 100,000 population in Nevada increased from 150.0 in 2004 to 172.3 in 2014 – an increase of 14.9%; however, the number of MDs per capita in rural and frontier counties declined by 9.6% during the same period (Table 4.7).
- In 2014, 11.1% of licensed MDs in Nevada completed their undergraduate medical education (UME) at the University of Nevada School of Medicine (UNSOM) – 14.5% of rural and frontier MDs completed their UME at UNSOM (Table 4.8).
- In 2014, 10.9% of licensed MDs in Nevada completed their graduate medical education (GME) at the University of Nevada School of Medicine (UNSOM) – only 5.3% of rural and frontier MDs completed their GME at UNSOM (Table 4.8).
- In 2014, there were 595 licensed osteopathic physicians (DOs) in Nevada, including 45 DOs in rural and frontier counties – since 2006, the number of DOs in Nevada has increased by 147 or 32.8% and the per capita number of DOs has grown from 17.1 to 21.0 per 100,000 population (22.8%) (Table 4.9).
- In 2014, there were 2,442 licensed primary care physicians in Nevada (2,127 MDs and 315 DOs), including 141 primary care physicians (111 MDs and 30 DOs) in rural and frontier counties – the per capita number of primary care physicians in rural and frontier counties is 49.6 per 100,000 population, as compared to 90.4 per 100,000 population in urban areas (Table 4.10).
- In 2014, there were 901 advanced practitioners of nursing (APNs) in Nevada, including 56 APNs in rural and frontier counties – the per capita number of APNs in rural and frontier counties is 19.7 per 100,000 population, as compared to 33.2 per 100,000 population in urban areas (Table 4.11).
- Over the past decade, the number of APNs in Nevada has increased from 382 in 2004 to 901 in 2014 (135.9%) and the per capita number of APNs in Nevada has increased by 101.9% during the same period (Table 4.11).
- In 2014, there were 571 physician assistants (PAs) in Nevada, including 40 PAs in rural and frontier counties – the per capita number of PAs in rural and frontier counties is 14.1 per 100,000 population, as compared to 20.9 per 100,000 population in urban areas (Table 4.12).
- Over the past decade, the number of physician assistants (PAs) in Nevada has increased from 302 in 2004 to 571 in 2014 (89.1%) and the per capita number of PAs in Nevada has increased by 61.6% during the same period (Table 4.12).
- Currently, there are 21,563 licensed registered nurses (RNs) who reside in Nevada, including 1,475 RNs in rural and frontier counties (8,445 RNs licensed by the State of Nevada reside out of state) (Table 4.13).
- Over the past decade, the number of licensed registered nurses (RNs) has increased from 14,825 in 2004 to 21,563 in 2014 (45.5%) and the per capita number of RNs in Nevada has increased 24.0% during the same period (Table 4.13).

- At the county level, the number of RNs per 100,000 population currently ranges from 48.6 in Eureka County to 967.4 in Washoe County – the average for rural and frontier counties is 518.5 RNs per 100,000 population, as compared to 789.5 in urban counties (Table 4.13).
- In 2014, there were 2,977 licensed practical nurses (LPNs) in Nevada, including 219 LPNs in rural and frontier counties – since 2004, the number of LPNs in Nevada has increased by 392 or 15.2%, yet the per capita number of LPNs has declined from 107.2 to 105.2 per 100,000 population during the same period (-1.9%) (Table 4.14).
- In 2014, there were 86 certified registered nurses anesthetists (CRNAs) in Nevada, including 15 CRNAs in rural and frontier counties – since 2004, the number of CRNAs in Nevada has increased by 27 or 45.8% and the per capita number of CRNAs has grown from 2.4 to 3.0 per 100,000 population (25.0%) (Table 4.15).
- In 2014, there were 124 registered nurses with emergency medical services certification (EMS/RNs) in Nevada, including 23 EMS/RNs in rural and frontier counties – since 2004, the number of EMS/RNs in Nevada has decreased by 9 or -6.8% and the per capita number of EMS/RNs has declined from 5.5 to 4.4 per 100,000 population (-20.0%) (Table 4.16).
- In 2014, there were 7,863 certified nursing assistants (CNAs) in Nevada, including 930 CNAs in rural and frontier counties – since 2004, the number of CNAs in Nevada has increased by 2,217 or 39.3% and the per capita number of CNAs has grown from 234.2 to 278.0 per 100,000 population (18.7%) (Table 4.17).
- Currently, there are 1,553 licensed dentists in Nevada, including 108 dentists in rural and frontier counties (Table 4.18).
- Over the past decade, the number of licensed dentists has increased from 1,091 in 2004 to 1,553 in 2014 (42.3%) and the per capita number of dentists in Nevada has increased 21.2% during the same period (Table 4.18).
- At the county level, the number of dentists per 100,000 population currently ranges from 15.2 in Lander County to 63.9 in Carson City (Esmeralda and Storey counties have no dentists) – the average for rural and frontier counties is 38.0 dentists per 100,000 population, as compared to 56.8 in urban counties (Table 4.18).
- In 2014, there were 1,047 licensed dental hygienists in Nevada, including 104 dental hygienists in rural and frontier counties – since 2004, the number of dental hygienists in Nevada has increased by 56 or 5.7%, yet the per capita number of dental hygienists has declined from 41.1 to 37.0 per 100,000 population (-10.0%) (Table 4.19).
- In 2014, there were 1,227 licensed alcohol, drug, and gambling counselors in Nevada, including 158 licensed alcohol, drug, and gambling counselors in rural and frontier counties – since 2004, the number of licensed alcohol, drug, and gambling counselors in Nevada has decreased by 6 or -0.5% and the per capita number of licensed alcohol, drug, and gambling counselors has declined from 45.0 to 43.4 per 100,000 population (-3.6%) (Table 4.20).

- In 2012, there were 669 licensed marriage and family therapists (MFTs) in Nevada, including 49 MFTs in rural and frontier counties – since 2010, the number of MFTs in Nevada has increased by 34 or 5.4% and the per capita number of MFTs has increased from 23.5 to 24.3 MFTs per 100,000 population (3.4%) (Table 4.21).
- In 2012, there were 47 licensed clinical professional counselors (LCPCs) in Nevada, including 8 LCPCs in rural and frontier counties – since 2010, the number of LCPCs in Nevada has increased by 19 or 67.9% and the per capita number of LCPCs has increased from 12.7 to 20.4 LCPCs per 100,000 population (60.6%) (Table 4.22).
- In 2014, there were 602 licensed clinical social workers (LCSWs) in Nevada, including 42 LCSWs in rural and frontier counties – the average for rural and frontier counties is 14.8 LCSWs per 100,000 population, as compared to 22.0 in urban counties (Tables 4.25 and 4.26).
- Currently, there are 2,217 licensed pharmacists in Nevada, including 127 pharmacists in rural and frontier counties (Table 4.27).
- Over the past decade, the number of licensed pharmacists has increased from 1,530 in 2004 to 2,217 in 2014 (44.9%) and the per capita number of pharmacists in Nevada has increased 23.5% during the same period (Table 4.27).
- In 2014, there were 5,463 licensed pharmaceutical technicians in Nevada, including 420 pharmaceutical technicians in rural and frontier counties – since 2004, the number of pharmaceutical technicians in Nevada has increased by 2,768 or 102.7% and the per capita number of pharmaceutical technicians as grown from 111.8 to 193.1 per 100,000 population (72.7%) (Table 4.28).
- In 2014, there were 593 licensed chiropractors in Nevada, including 35 chiropractors in rural and frontier counties – since 2004, the number of chiropractors in Nevada has increased by 78 or 15.1%, however, the per capita number of chiropractors has decreased from 21.4 to 21.0 chiropractors per 100,000 population (-1.9%) (Table 4.29).
- In 2014, there were 400 registered dietitians (RDs) in Nevada, including 19 RDs in rural and frontier counties (Table 4.30).
- In 2014, there were 287 licensed dispensing opticians in Nevada, including 11 opticians in rural and frontier counties – since 2004, the number of licensed dispensing opticians in Nevada has increased by 92 or 47.2% and the per capita number of opticians has grown from 8.1 to 10.1 per 100,000 population (24.7%) (Table 4.31).
- In 2014, there were 150 licensed dispensing optician apprentices in Nevada, including eight optician apprentices in rural and frontier counties (Table 4.32).
- In 2012, there were 6,425 emergency medical technicians (EMTs) in Nevada, including 601 first responders, 1,865 basic EMTs, 2,431 intermediate EMTs, and 1,528 paramedics (Table 4.33).
- In 2012, there were 1,715 emergency medical technicians (EMTs) in rural and frontier Nevada, including 439 first responders, 643 basic EMTs, 474 intermediate EMTs, and 159 paramedics (Table 4.33).

- In 2012, there were 233.6 emergency medical technicians (EMTs) per 100,000 population in Nevada – at the county level, the per capita number of EMTs ranged from 165 EMTs per 100,000 population in Clark County to 3,321 EMTs per 100,000 population in Esmeralda County (Table 4.34).
- Between 2006 and 2012, the number of emergency medical technicians (EMTs) in Nevada declined from 7,176 to 6,425 or -10.5% – during the same period, in rural and frontier areas, the number of EMTs declined by 458 or -21.1% (Table 4.35).
- In 2014, there were 3,696 licensed massage therapists in Nevada, including 184 licensed massage therapists in rural and frontier counties (Table 4.36).
- In 2014, there were 1,812 licensed medical laboratory technologists and technicians in Nevada, including 85 laboratory technologists and technicians in rural and frontier counties – currently, there are 64.1 licensed medical laboratory technologists and technicians per 100,000 population in Nevada, including 29.9 per 100,000 population in rural and frontier counties (Tables 4.37 and 4.38).
- Currently, there are 570 occupational therapists (OTs) in Nevada, including 34 OTs in rural and frontier counties – since 2004, the number of OTs in Nevada has increased by 205 or 56.2% and the per capita number of OTs has grown from 15.1 to 20.1 per 100,000 population (33.1%) (Table 4.40).
- In 2014, there were 171 occupational therapy assistants (OTAs) in Nevada, including 8 OTAs in rural and frontier counties – since 2004, the number of OTAs in Nevada has increased by 31 or 22.1% and the per capita number of OTAs has grown from 5.8 to 6.0 per 100,000 population (3.4%) (Table 4.41).
- In 2014, there were 386 licensed optometrists in Nevada, including 37 optometrists in rural and frontier counties – since 2004, the number of licensed optometrists in Nevada has increased by 145 or 60.2% and the per capita number of optometrists has grown from 10.0 to 13.6 per 100,000 population (36.0%) (Table 4.42).
- Currently, there are 1,074 physical therapists (PTs) in Nevada, including 82 PTs in rural and frontier counties – since 2004, the number of PTs in Nevada has increased by 360 or 50.4% and the per capita number of PTs has grown from 31.1 to 38.0 per 100,000 population (22.2%) (Table 4.43).
- In 2014, there were 302 physical therapy assistants (PTAs) in Nevada, including 17 PTAs in rural and frontier counties – since 2004, the number of PTAs in Nevada has increased by 148 or 96.1% and the per capita number of PTAs has grown from 6.7 to 10.7 per 100,000 population (59.7%) (Table 4.44).
- In 2014, there were 743 licensed podiatrists in Nevada or 26.3 licensed podiatrists per 100,000 population, including 43 licensed podiatrists in rural and frontier counties (Table 4.45).
- Currently, there are 1,314 licensed respiratory therapists (RTs) in Nevada, including 76 RTs in rural and frontier counties – since 2004, the number of RTs in Nevada has increased by 595 or 82.8% and the per capita number of RTs has grown from 29.8 to 46.5 per 100,000 population (56.0%) (Table 4.46).

- In 2014, there were 744 licensed speech-language pathologists (SLPs) in Nevada, including 43 SLPs in rural and frontier counties – since 2004, the number of SLPs in Nevada has increased by 504 or 210.0% and the per capita number of SLPs has grown from 9.1 to 26.3 per 100,000 population (189.0%) (Table 4.47).
- In general, the number of licensed health professionals per 100,000 population is lower in rural and frontier counties of Nevada versus urban areas of the state – important exceptions include registered nurses with EMS certification, registered nurse anesthetists, and emergency medical technicians (Table 4.48).
- Currently, an estimated 911,684 Nevadans or 33.7% of the state’s population reside in a federally-designated primary medical care health professional shortage area (HPSA) – 9 of 17 counties in Nevada are single-county primary medical care HPSAs (Table 4.49 and Maps 4.1 through 4.3).
- In 2015, an estimated 142,476 residents of rural and frontier Nevada (50.6% of the population) live in a primary medical care health professional shortage area (HPSA) – 9 of 14 rural and frontier counties in Nevada are single-county primary medical care HPSAs (Table 4.49 and Maps 4.1 through 4.3).
- Currently, an estimated 903,241 Nevadans or 31.7% of the state’s population reside in a federally designated dental health professional shortage area (HPSA) – eight of 17 counties in Nevada are single-county dental HPSAs (Table 4.49 and Maps 4.4 through 4.6).
- In 2015, an estimated 145,426 residents of rural and frontier Nevada (51.4% of the population) live in a dental health professional shortage area (HPSA) – 8 of 14 rural and frontier counties in Nevada are single-county dental HPSAs (Table 4.49 and Maps 4.4 through 4.6).
- Currently, 1.5 million Nevadans or 53.3% of the state’s population reside in a federally designated mental health professional shortage area (HPSA) – 16 of 17 counties in Nevada are single-county mental HPSAs (Table 4.49 and Maps 4.7 through 4.9).
- In 2015, an estimated 286,251 residents of rural and frontier Nevada (100% of the population) live in a mental health professional shortage area (HPSA) – 14 of 14 rural and frontier counties in Nevada are single-county mental HPSAs (Table 4.49 and Maps 4.7 through 4.9).

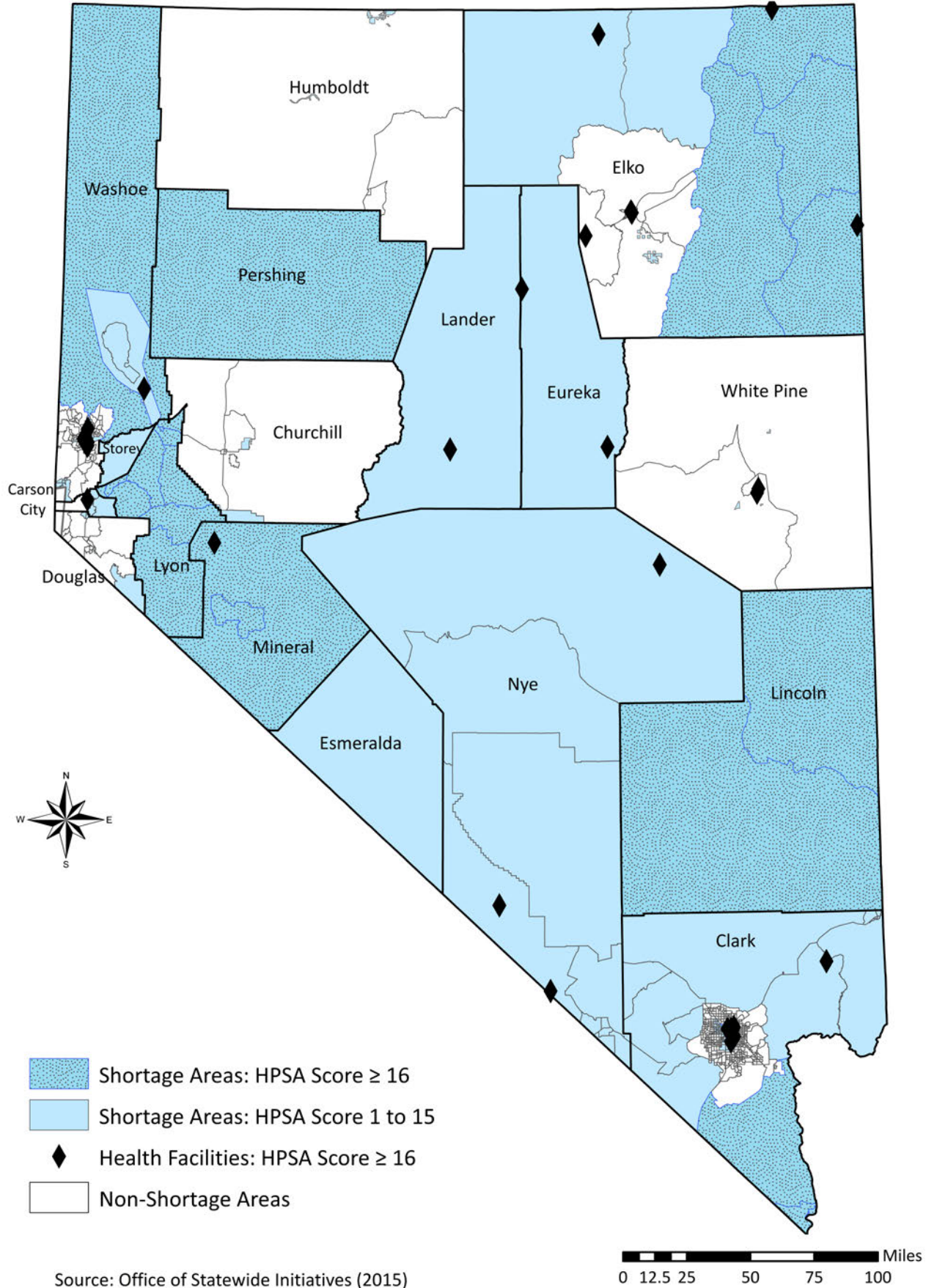

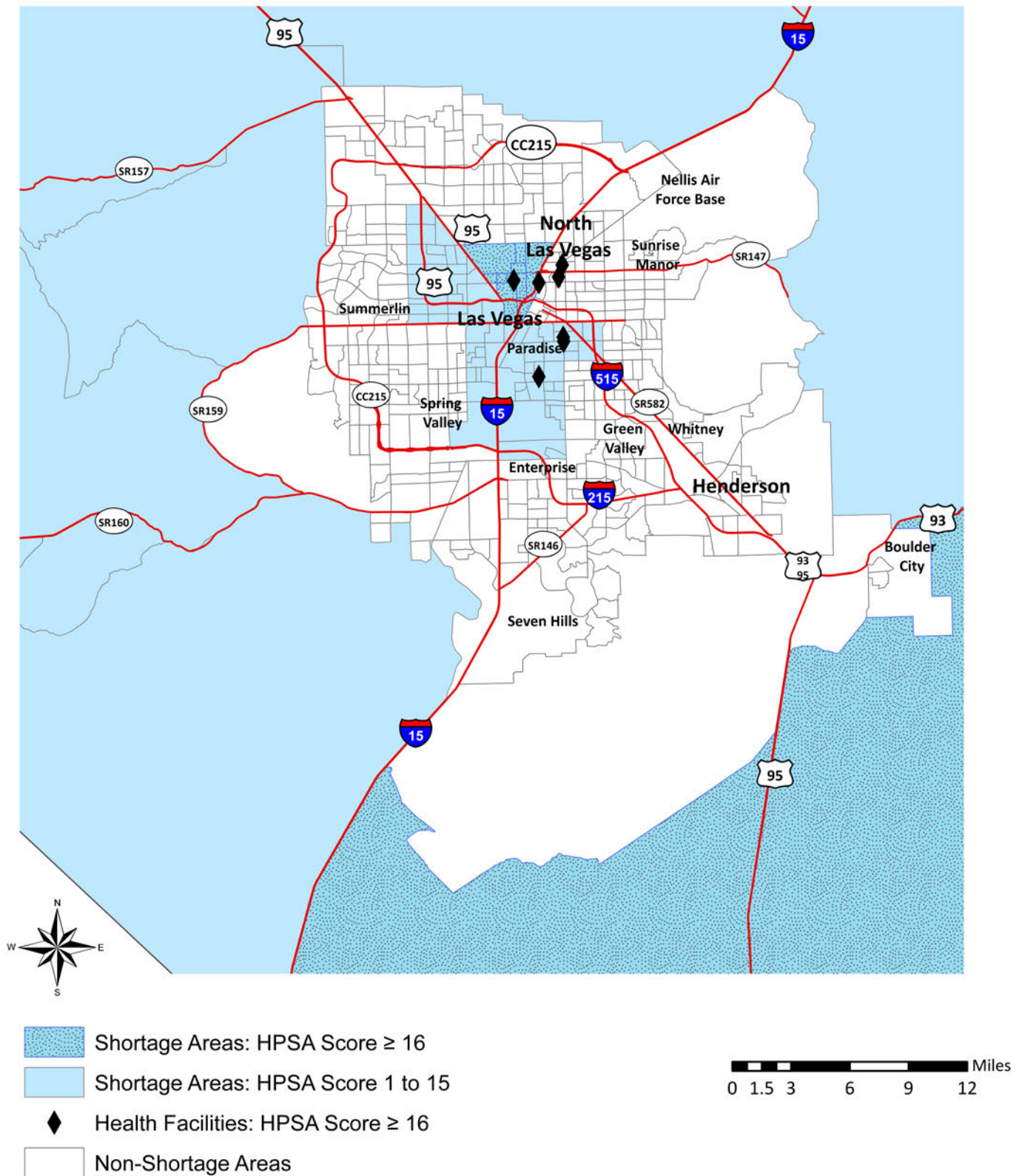

Map 4.1: Primary Medical Care Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs) in Nevada – 2015

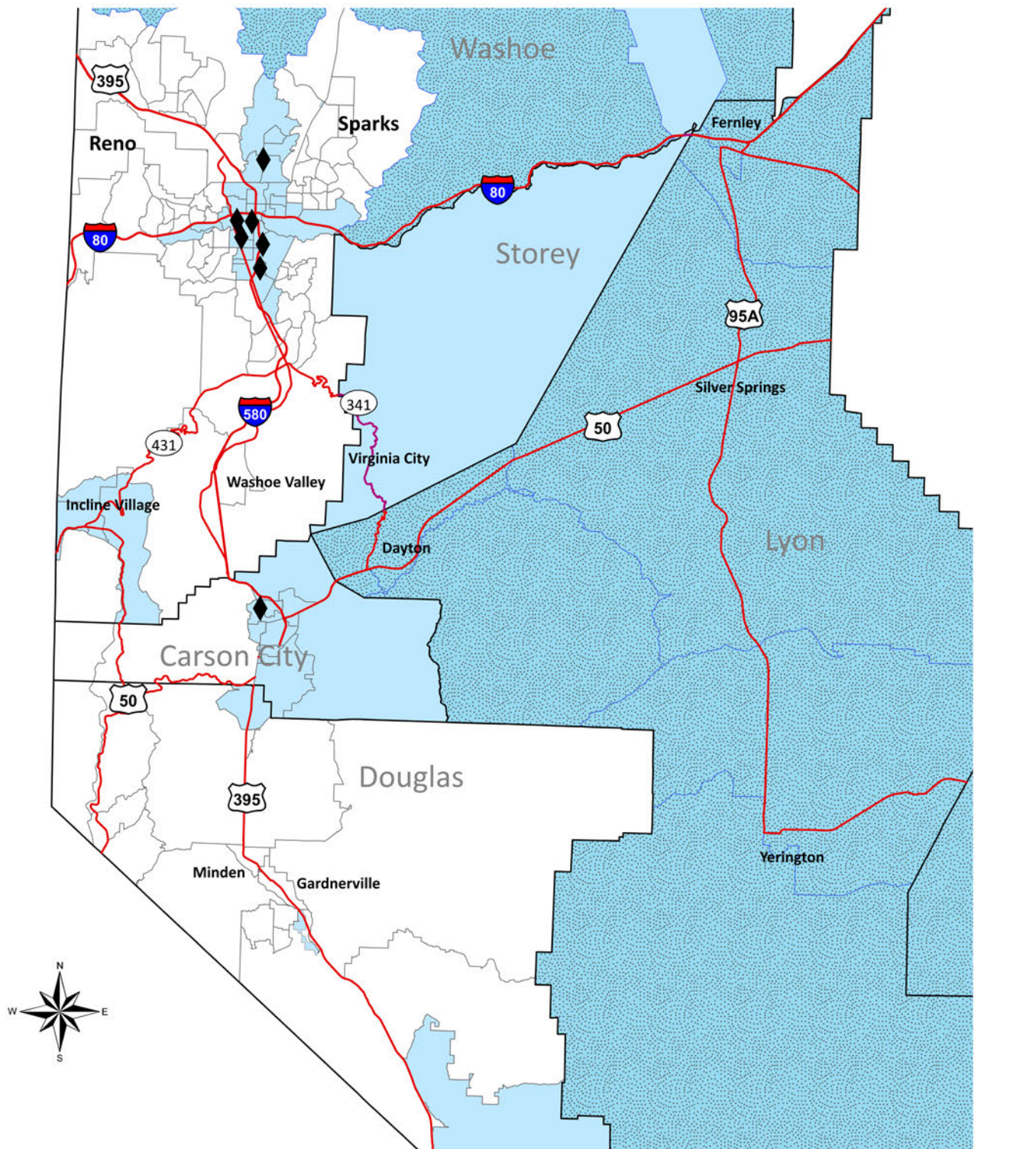


Map 4.2: Primary Medical Care Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs) in Metropolitan Clark County - 2015

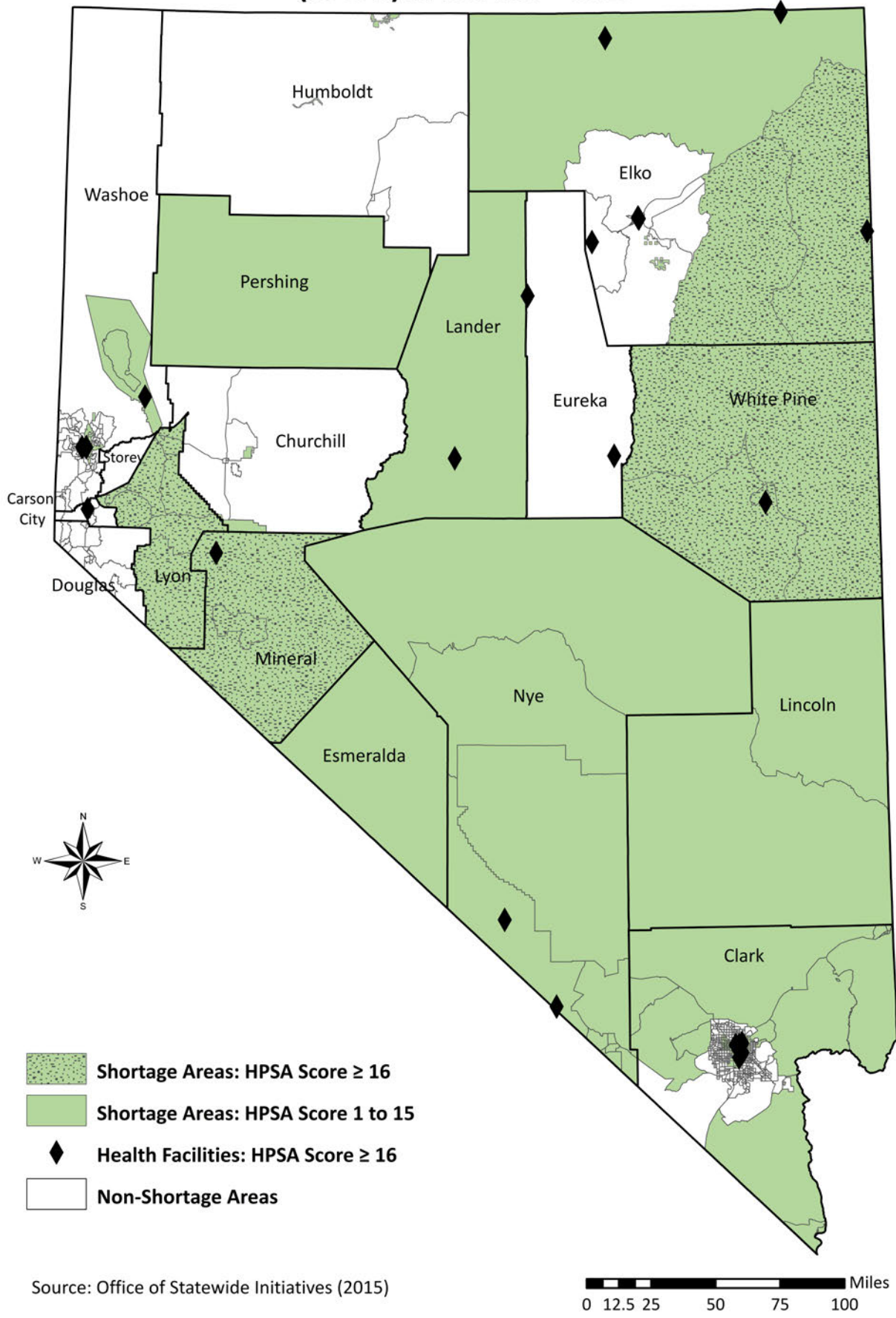
Map 4.3: Primary Medical Care Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs) in Metropolitan Northern Nevada - 2015

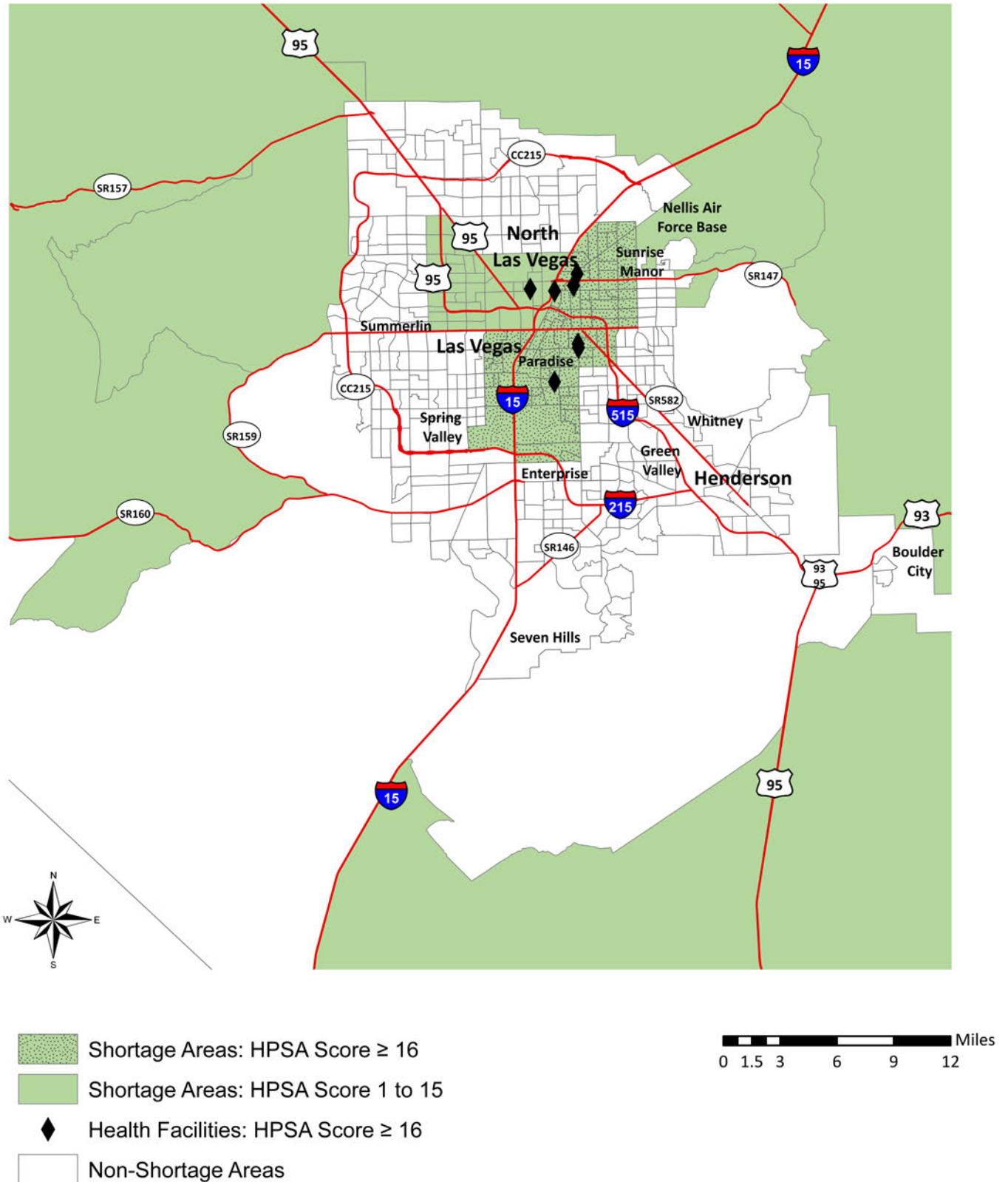

Map 4.4: Dental Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs) in Nevada – 2015



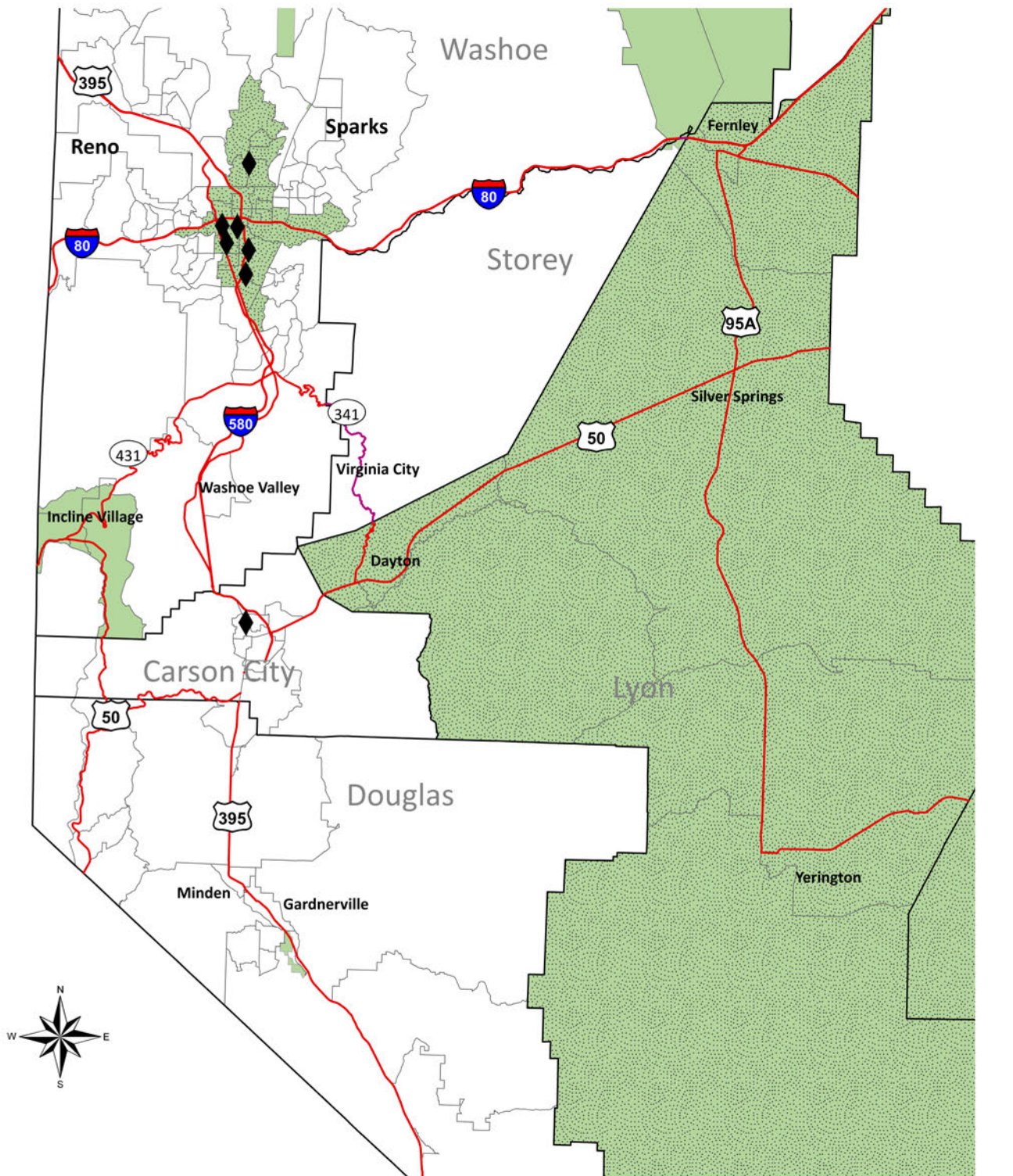

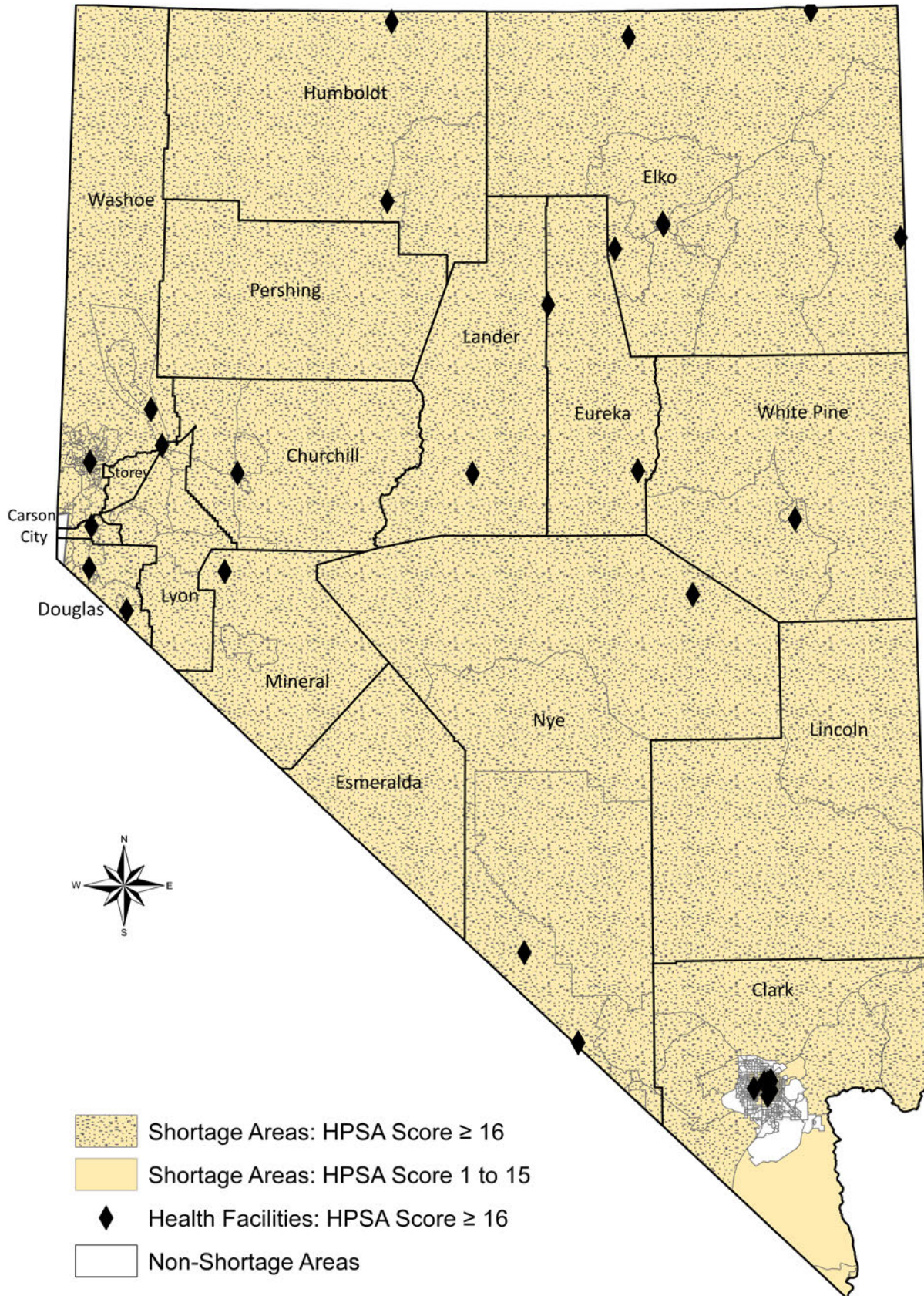
Map 4.6: Dental Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs) in Metropolitan Northern Nevada - 2015

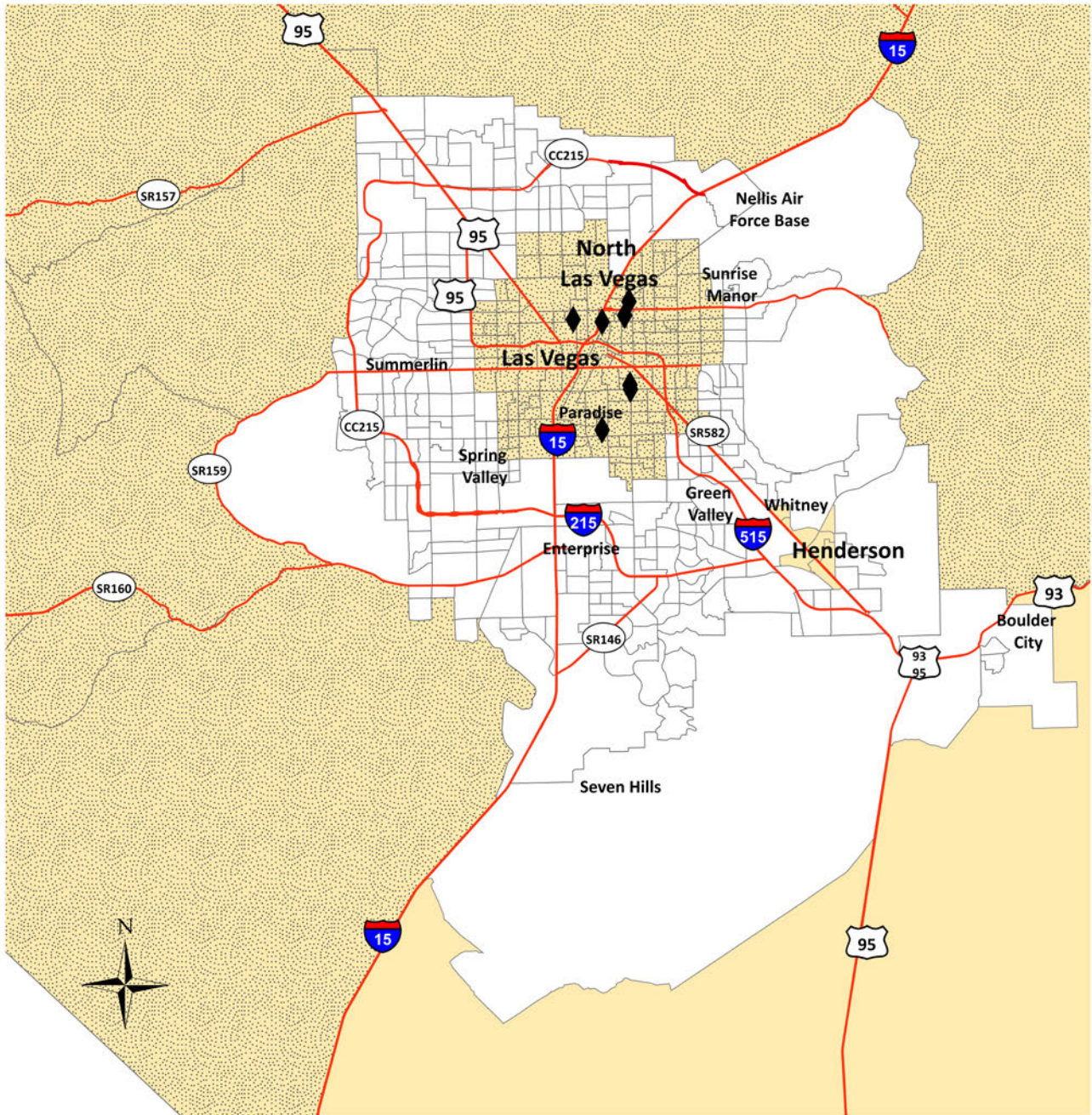
Map 4.7: Mental Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs) in Nevada – 2015

Map 4.8: Mental Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs) in Metropolitan Clark County - 2015

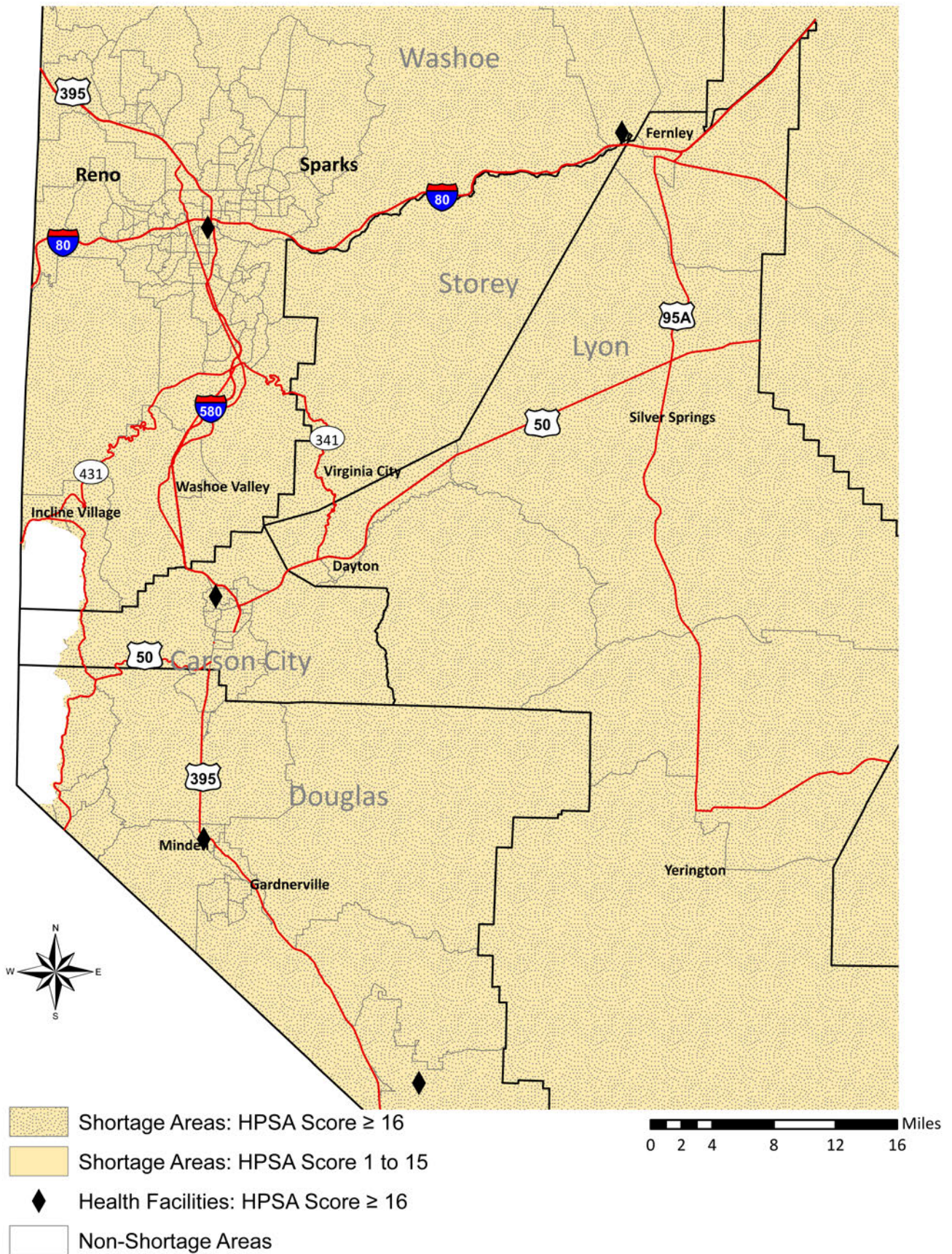

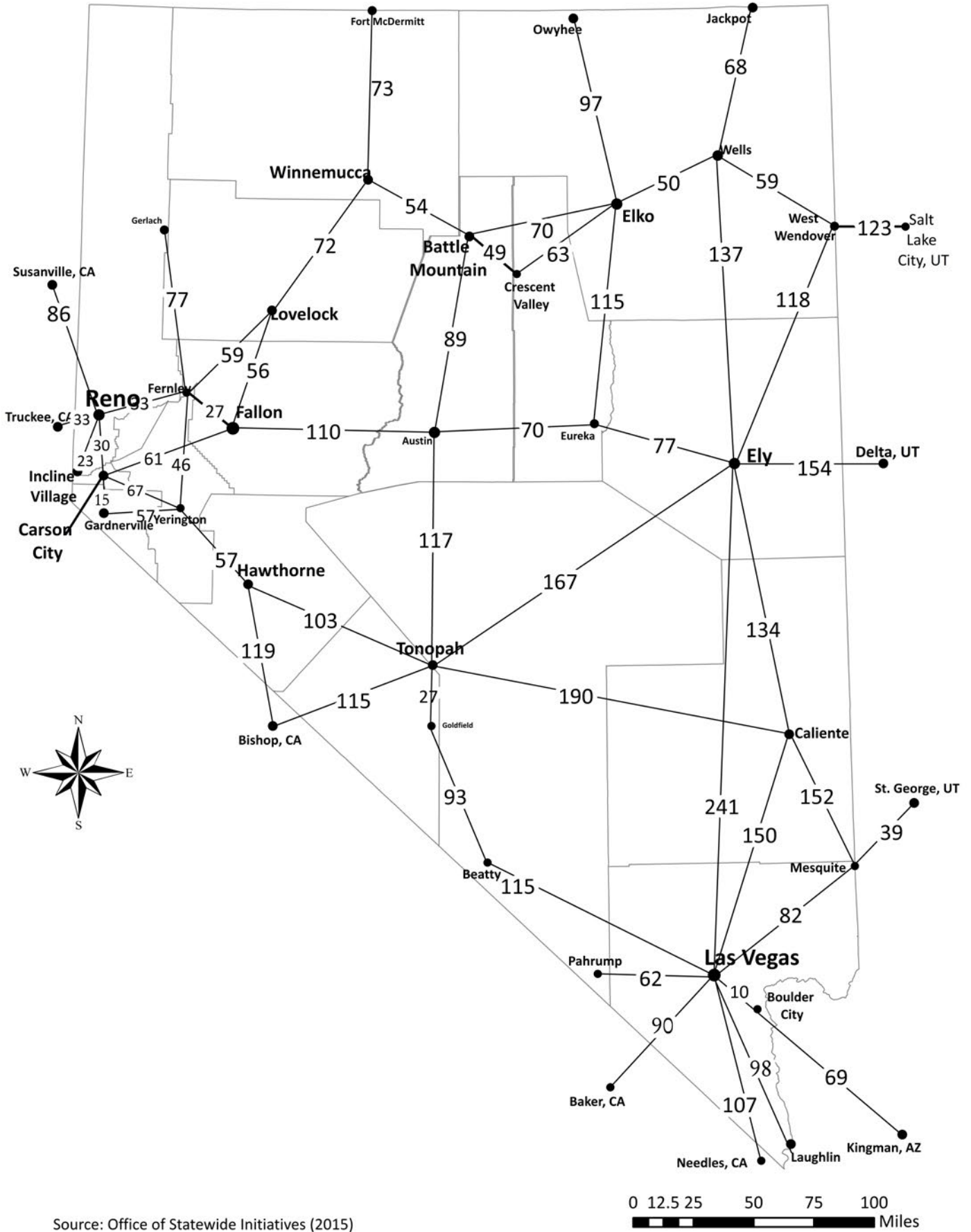
Highlights and Key Findings

- Currently, there are 15 rural and frontier hospitals in Nevada serving an estimated population of 286,251 residents scattered over 95,431 square miles – 11 of these facilities are federally designated Critical Access Hospitals (CAHs) (Tables 1.5 and 5.1).
- On average, Nevada’s 15 rural and frontier hospitals are 59.1 miles from the nearest hospital and 118.1 miles from the nearest tertiary care hospital (Table 5.1 and Map 5.1).
- In 2013, Nevada’s 15 rural and frontier hospitals had a combined 2,250 employees (FTE) and payroll of \$141.2 million – these hospitals had an average annual salary of \$62,772 (Table 5.2).
- Nevada’s 11 Critical Access Hospitals (CAHs) had a combined 1,502 employees (FTE) and payroll of \$94.4 million in 2013 – these CAHs had an average annual salary of \$62,825 (Table 5.2).
- In 2013, Nevada’s 19 urban acute care hospitals had a combined 21,825 employees (FTE) and payroll of \$1.6 billion – urban hospitals had an average annual salary of \$71,809 (Table 5.3).
- Nevada’s 15 rural and frontier hospitals employed 2,250 individuals in 2013 – when the jobs created in other businesses, as a result of hospital operating activity, are included in the analysis, rural and frontier hospitals were responsible for an additional 807 jobs for a total employment impact of 3,057 jobs (Table 5.4).
- In 2013, Nevada’s 19 urban hospitals employed 21,825 individuals – when the jobs created in other businesses, as a result of hospital operating activity, are included in the analysis, urban hospitals were responsible for an additional 15,532 jobs for a total employment impact of 37,470 jobs (Tables 5.3 and 5.4).
- Nevada’s 15 rural and frontier hospitals had a combined payroll of \$94.4 million in 2013 – when the income created in other businesses, as a result of hospital operating activity, is included in the analysis, rural and frontier hospitals were responsible for an additional \$18.7 million in personal income for a total payroll impact of \$113.1 million (Table 5.5).
- In 2013, Nevada’s 19 urban hospitals had a combined payroll of \$1.6 billion – when the income created in other businesses, as a result of hospital operating activity, is included in the analysis, urban hospitals were responsible for an additional \$674 million in personal income for a total payroll impact of \$2.0 billion (Table 5.5).
- In 2013, there were 96,484 Nevadans employed in the health sector with a combined payroll of \$5.5 billion, including 6,5276 rural and frontier residents with a combined payroll of \$287.8 million (Tables 5.6 and 5.7).

- Businesses in Nevada’s health sector employed 96,370 in 2013 – when the jobs created in other non-health sector businesses, as a result of health sector operating activity, are included in the analysis, Nevada’s health sector was responsible for an additional 50,099 jobs for a total employment impact of 146,469 jobs (Table 5.8).
- In 2013, businesses in the health sector in rural and frontier counties of Nevada employed 6,162 individuals – when the jobs created in other non-health sector businesses, as a result of health sector operating activity, are included in the analysis, the rural health sector was responsible for an additional 1,488 jobs for a total employment impact of 7,650 jobs (Table 5.8).
- Businesses in Nevada’s health sector had a combined payroll of \$5.5 billion in 2013 – when the income created in other non-health sector businesses, as a result of health sector operating activity, is included in the analysis, Nevada’s health sector was responsible for an additional \$2.0 billion in personal income for a total payroll impact of \$7.5 billion (Table 5.9).
- In 2013, businesses in the health sector in rural and frontier counties of Nevada had a combined payroll of \$284.8 million – when the income created in other non-health sector businesses, as a result of health sector operating activity, is included in the analysis, the rural health sector was responsible for an additional \$43.7 million in personal income for a total payroll impact of \$328.6 million (Table 5.9).
- Currently, there are 7,140 licensed community hospital beds in Nevada, including 272 licensed community hospital beds in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.11).
- There are 5,174 licensed skilled nursing beds in Nevada, including 567 licensed skilled nursing beds in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.11).
- Currently, there are 2.5 licensed community hospital beds per 1,000 population in Nevada – there are 1.0 licensed community hospital beds per 1,000 population in rural and frontier counties, as compared to a rate of 2.7 in urban counties (Table 5.11).
- Currently, there are 1.8 licensed skilled nursing beds per 1,000 population in Nevada – there are 2.0 licensed skilled nursing beds per 1,000 population in rural and frontier counties, as compared to a rate of 1.8 in urban counties (Table 5.11).
- Currently, of the 15 rural and frontier hospitals in Nevada, six are not-for-profit (publicly owned) hospitals, 5 not-for-profit (privately owned) hospitals, and three for-profit (privately owned) hospitals, and one not-for-profit (non-governmental) hospital (Table 5.12).
- In 2015, there are eight rural and frontier community hospitals with provider-based rural health clinics (RHCs). There are also 9 non-hospital based Federally Qualified Health Clinics (FQHCs), and 13 tribal and Indian Health Service (IHS) clinics and health centers (Tables 5.13, 5.14, and 5.15).
- In 2013, Nevada’s 15 rural and frontier hospitals had a combined 9,770 admissions, 31,665 inpatient days, an average stay of 3.2 days, an average daily census of 86.8, and an occupancy rate of 16.2% (Table 5.16).

- In 2013, rural and frontier hospitals had inpatient operating revenue of \$240.1 million or 27.5% of the total patient revenue; the outpatient revenue was \$631.6 million or 72.4% of the total patient revenue (Table 5.18).
- For 2013, rural and frontier hospitals had \$871.7 million in total revenue, \$506.8 million in contractual deductions and adjustments, resulting in net patient revenue of \$364.9 million; when adding other operating revenue (\$8.2 million), the total revenue was \$373.1 million (Table 5.19).
- For 2013, rural and frontier hospitals had \$373.1 million in total revenue, \$317.8 million in operating expenses, resulting in net operating income of \$55.3 million; when adding other non-operating revenue (\$30.1 million), the net income was \$85.4 million (Table 5.20).
- In 2013, net operating income was \$40.2 million for all 34 community hospitals in Nevada; the net operating income per adjusted admission was \$105 and a net operating income per adjusted inpatient day was \$22 (Table 5.21).
- In 2013, net income was \$108.5 million for all 34 community hospitals in Nevada; the net operating income per adjusted admission was \$284 and a net operating income per adjusted inpatient day was \$58 (Table 5.22).
- In 2013, rural and frontier hospitals had an average daily charge of \$6,468 and an average charges per admission of \$18,816 (Table 5.23).
- In 2013, 41.0% of inpatient admissions, 51.6% inpatient days, and 52.1% of inpatient billed charges were Medicare patients in rural and frontier hospitals (Tables 5.24, 5.25, and 5.26).
- In 2013, the top 20 admissions in rural and frontier hospitals mirror the urban top 20 admissions, however, some of the top admissions in rural and frontier Nevada reflect an older population, e.g., digestive disorders, chest pain, and simple pneumonia (Tables 5.28 and 5.29).
