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

WNCC Foundation Celebrates 15 Years of Helping Others

Take a walk around Western Nevada Community College's three campuses, and a visitor will likely notice the many buildings that house academic programs and services, provide student study and recreational space, and create an attractive campus environment. But what may be less obvious is the enormous role a relatively small group of community leaders has played in the college's success.

As it celebrates 15 years of service to the college this year, the WNCC Foundation can be justifiably proud of its accomplishments for students and the widespread communities of western Nevada. In all, the group of several dozen advocates and their leader, Vice President for Institutional Advancement Helaine Jesse, has raised more than \$14 million to help fund buildings, equipment, scholarships, and land acquisitions.

Among the foundation's notable achievements are the Manuel Beck Library, Don Bentley Hall, Andy Butti Welding Technology Center, E.L. Cord Automotive Technology Center, Jack C. Davis Observatory and Planetary Walkway, Virgil Getto Hall, John L. Harvey Baseball Stadium, Ramsdell

The Western Nevada Musical Theatre Company is opening its 2007 season with the celebrated characters of Charles Schultz's comic strip in the classic musical "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown." Catch their final performances April 6-8 at the Brewery Arts Center's Black Box Theater.

Presented in its award-winning Broadway revival version, the musical recreates Schultz at his best: Schroeder and Lucy at the piano, Charlie Brown and Lucy at the psychiatry booth, Linus with his blanket, Snoopy with his super dish, and the whole gang at the baseball game. The characters live the moments of a child's life waffling from wild optimism to utter despair, from a bright, un-

certain morning to a hopeful starlit evening.

Hilarious comic sequences are animated by high-energy dance routines, creating non-stop entertainment for adults and children alike.

Typically performed by young adults dressed as children, the show stars Adam Whitney as Charlie Brown, Caitlin Papp as Lucy, Christopher Willson as Schroeder, A. J. Hamann as Linus, Therese Curatolo as Sally Brown, and Marcus Quiroga as Snoopy. The cast is rounded out with an ensemble of singers and dancers, including Alice Sady as Woodstock, and accompanied by a professional ensemble of musicians, led by Linda Hardy on the piano.

"Thoroughly Modern Millie" Comes to Town

She's a spunky kid who's moved to New York from Salina, Kansas. She's ready to join the modern women of the 1920's, raise her skirts, bob her hair, marry her boss and have a stable future. But then, there's Jimmy...

The Western Nevada Musical Theatre Company presents "Thoroughly Modern Millie," the Tony Award-winning 2002 musical, in seven weekend performances at the Carson City Community Center, May 11-20.

The show is based on the popular movie, but gussied up with high-energy tap numbers, jazz sequences and love ballads, including two songs from the 1967 film, four standards from the 1920's, and nine new songs by composer Jeanine Tesori and lyricist Dick Scanlan.

The musical swept the Tony Awards in 2002 and created such excitement that it left all of New York dancing the Charleston.

The zany plot revolves around Millie Dillmount, who escapes to New York City from Salina, Kan., determined to marry her wealthy boss - whomever he may be. Shedding her country girl image for the modern look of a flapper, she takes a room at the Priscilla Hotel for Women and gets a job as a stenographer at the Sincere Trust Insurance Company. In short time, she finds herself involved with Jimmy Smith, an apparently unsuccessful paper clip salesman; Miss Dorothy Brown, a genteel aspiring actress who is excited to be poor; Trevor Graydon, the unromantic boss Millie wants to marry; and Muzzy van Hossmere, a nightclub singer heiress.

Add the hotel proprietress, Mrs. Meers, a villainess everyone loves to

hate, and her assistants Ching Ho and Bun Foo whom she forces to carry out her diabolical schemes, and the evening adds up to adventure, romance, comedy and pure entertainment.

Lauren Ashley Durant plays Millie, Domenic Procaccini II plays Jimmy Smith, James McDuffie is Trevor Graydon, Therese Curatolo is Dorothy Brown, Karen Chandler is Mrs. Meers, Dianne Hale plays Muzzy van Hossmere, and Tom Fisk and Paul Stufkosky play Ching Ho and Bun Foo.

They will now be a highlight at Western Nevada Community College's 12th annual Multicultural Festival.

The Mystical Arts of Tibet, a Richard Gere and Drepung Loseling production, is a world tour presented by a group of monk artists that shares Tibet's most ancient traditions. "I am amazed by the ever-increasing fascination in the West for Tibet and its ancient cultural traditions," said Geshe Lobsang Tenzin, director of the Mystical Arts of Tibet. "It seems to appeal to people from all walks of life, spanning the boundaries of age, race, gender, and ethnic affiliation."

In addition to their performance, the monks will create a mandala, a colorful sand-painted sculpture that includes geometric shapes and ancient spiritual symbols, for the festival. The mandala ritual includes a ceremony on Wednesday, May 9, at noon, on campus, and a closing ceremony Saturday at 3:30 p.m.

"When the lamas finish with the mandala, they usually deposit the sand into a lake or river to put it back into the earth," said Claire Korschinowski, WNCC student activities coordinator and event organizer. "Since we don't have a body of water at the college, they will distribute the colored sand in bags to anyone who attends the festival."

The Multicultural Festival will also feature live music, traditional dancing, and ethnic food from local Nevadans. Exhibits will display artifacts from various cultures and youngsters will enjoy the Children's Cultural Corner.

Early Alert System Helps More Students Succeed

A new online system that refers struggling students for academic help earlier in the semester is having an immediate positive impact on students. During the fall semester, 24 instructors referred 108 students to counselors using the college's online Early Alert academic warning system. After a consultation with a counselor and appropriate intervention, 94 percent of the students successfully completed their fall courses, and 52 percent registered for spring classes.

WNCC instructors can access the early alert program easily from their online class rosters. If a student is receiving low homework/test scores, experiencing difficulty in a course, or not attending class, instructors can click on an "alert" icon next to each student's name and fill out an online referral form. A counselor will then contact the student and later communicate the outcome of the intervention to the instructor.

"This confirms that student success leads to continued attendance and goal achievement, which are two goals of the program," said WNCC Counselor Scott Drew.

College Foundation Dedicates Nursing Lab

The Western Nevada Community College Foundation recognized the generosity of donors Betty Ray and Locke Lesch recently by naming a nursing laboratory in their honor and hosting a dedication and open house at the college.

Featured speakers included donors Betty Ray and Locke Lesch, Nevada System of Higher Education Regent Ron Knecht, WNCC President Carol Lucey, and WNCC Nursing & Allied Health Director Judy Cordia. NSHE Regent Cedric Crear also attended the ceremony.

The couple decided to donate \$60,000 to the college after reading a newspaper article about the needs of the Nursing & Allied Health Department.

Helping Students with Disabilities

Landmark College of Vermont representatives made their second visit to the college this spring to help faculty and staff better meet the needs of students with disabilities. The visit was part of a \$1.02 million U.S. Department of Education grant that Western shares with four other community colleges nationwide.

Landmark representatives conducted workshops to help prepare college faculty, staff and students to use the online training modules

offered. Feedback and information that Landmark collects will be shared with the Department of Education and community colleges throughout the country.

Western assists more than 100 students each year who have designated learning disabilities, from dyslexia to processing disorders, and hopes to use the grant to stay up to date on prevailing thought about teaching methods.

Wildcats Score Well in Classroom

Western's student athletes have achieved success in the classroom as well as on the playing field. In the fall term, the women's soccer team compiled an overall grade point average of 3.04 and the men's baseball team posted a combined 3.0, out of a possible 4.0.

"Western strongly supports the academic achievement of our student athletes," Dean of Student Services and Athletic Director John Kinkella said. "The high expectations we have set for our student athletes continue to be met. We are delighted as much by their academic progress as by their league championships."

Baseball Head Coach D.J. Whittemore and Soccer Head Coach Hillary Arthur mandate study time and stress the need for academic progress, Kinkella said. "Additionally, Counseling Services works with the coaches to carefully track the progress of the student athletes."

Former Student Body President Helps Save Millions

Brian Kale, senior vice president for Integration Support and Analytics at Bank of America Card Services, and a former WNCC student government president, recently helped his company save a lot of money. Kale worked with several others to develop a new accounting program that saved Bank of America \$3 million per year in labor costs.

The program allows the bank to automatically send \$30 million in credit card transactions per day to designated general ledger accounts. This effort has resulted in a three-month return on investment.

Kale has worked at Bank of America for more than 10 years.

Five Sign to Play Wildcats Soccer

Five Nevada high school seniors or graduates have signed letters of commitment to Western to play on its 2007 intercollegiate women's soccer team.

Last fall in their second season, the Wildcats finished with a 10-8-2 record, won the Scenic West Athletic Conference Region XVIII Championship, and advanced to the National Junior College Athletic Association playoffs.
