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
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
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## Publisher's Note/The Judges

s it a secret ballot, or do you guys just go have a beer?" Lance Burton asked writer Mike Weatherford when the two were discussing the process that led to the selection of the Las Vegas magician as *Nevada Magazine's* first Nevada Entertainer of the Year (see story on page 16).

Maybe next year for the suds. This time computers carried messages between judges Norm Clarke, Las Vegas Review-Journal columnist; Jerry Fink, Las Vegas SUN entertainment reporter; entertainment critic Robin Leach; Mike Weatherford, Las Vegas Review-Journal reporter and columnist; and Ann Henderson, Nevada Magazine entertainment editor.

On the first round, voters were asked to name four headliners with long-term contracts and to consider their community involvement, showmanship, and name recognition beyond Las Vegas. The short list of entertainers who received at least two nominations included Burton, Caesars headliner Celine Dion, comedienne Rita Rudner, comedy magicians Penn and Teller, and singer Clint Holmes. A second vote to break the tie put Burton at the top of the list.

Another entertainer nominated was Roy Horn of Siegfried and Roy fame. Leach lauded the star's recovery from an onstage tiger attack on October 3, 2003. "For showing strength, dedication, and incredible bravery. For not giving up, and showing us all the magic will be back," Leach says of the performer.

Clarke and Weatherford commended Dion for using her star power to pack the Caesars Palace Colosseum to benefit Hurricane Katrina victims and the Las Vegas community. Clarke also pointed to Penn and Teller's successful United Blood Drive and applauded Rudner. "You see Rita at a multitude of charity events, offering her support and special brand of humor," Clarke says. Rudner recently moved her act from New York-New York to Harrah's Las Vegas.

Weatherford named Sir Elton John and Barry Manilow to his "A" list of Vegas performers. Their charitable activities are on a national level. Sir John is linked to the Ryan White AIDS Foundation and Manilow his Fund for Health and Hope.

Frank Scinta of The Scintas at the Sahara and Wayne Newton drew a vote from Fink. "Frank never stops performing," Fink says. "If he weren't being paid for it, he would do it for free, which is often the case when he shows up for charity events..." Fink calls Newton the ultimate entertainer.

In September, Burton was named by Magic Castle founder Milt Larsen as one of the 10 greatest magicians of all time. Harry Houdini and Dante topped the list, with Siegfried and Roy and Burton placing numbers eight and nine, respectively.

Choosing this year's Entertainer of the Year was not an easy task, says Henderson. "Entertainers need to be recognized for everything positive they do," she says. "But they also need applause when things go wrong, which does happen. Several years ago I was watching Burton perform, and an illusion misfired, revealing the secret. Despite a collective gasp from the audience, finger-pointing, and loud remarks such as, 'Did you see that?, Burton carried on like the pro he is."

When he was informed that he had been selected as Entertainer of the Year, Burton, with his usual down-home charm, kidded, "I'm very excited about it, especially the \$500,000 stipend that came with it!"

However, Amtrak California provides express-bus service from the downtown Las Vegas Greyhound station to the Bakersfield, California, Amtrak station twice daily, and travelers to and from the east, e.g., Kansas City and Chicago, can use the Commuter Carriers service from McCarran International Airport to connect with the Southwest Chief at Kingman, Arizona. The service is quite convenient, reasonably priced, and fairly fast.



## Ghost Towns and Mining Camps

Martin Shelton's photos document the beauty of Nevada's haunting ruins.



GOLD POINT: Shelton used a polarizer over the lens to record this false-fronted store with its out-of-service gas pump. The town began in 1868 as Lime Point, was later called Hornsilver, then in the 1930s was renamed Gold Point. Today the town, 30 miles southwest of Goldfield, survives with a few businesses and a group of friends who live here and work to restore some of the 40 buildings still standing.

RHYOLITE: In 1908, Rhyolite, three miles west of Beatty, was the third-largest city in the state. When Shelton visited the town in 1991, only grand ruins, such as the three-story brick John S. Cook Bank building on Golden Street, remained. The bank's concrete safe once held sacks of high-grade ore from the area's mines.



BELMONT: Founded in 1865, Belmont was the original seat of Nye County. The town's prosperity lasted about 20 years. The Monitor-Belmont Company built the Highbridge Mill in 1915 to rework the old mining dumps, but the mill didn't survive. Shelton photographed its brick-wall remains in November 1991. Belmont, 46 miles northeast of Tonopah, now features new homes, but the old town remains the main attraction.



TEXAS-BASED PHOTOGRAPHER MARTIN SHELTON crisscrossed Nevada from 1987 to 1999 photographing more than 1,400 sites of the state's ghost towns and mining camps. His trips produced 7,000 Kodachrome slides and numerous prints and maps, which he donated to Nevada's State Historic Preservation Office. Nevada's governor, Kenny Guinn, presented Shelton with a letter of thanks for his donation. "I've always had a yen to visit and photograph ol' time and out-of-the-way places," Shelton says. "After my first trip-to Belmont and Manhattan-I was hooked." Shelton's photos document the boom-and-bust pattern of mining towns like Belmont, Rhyolite, and Gold Point. "I return to Nevada at least once a year. I love the place," he says.-WILMA LAROCCA

# **A Wendover History Lesson**

Airfield located near the northeastern Nevada border in Wendover, Utah. Spectators can climb to the top of the old tower and look down on the airfield—the site where Colonel Paul W. Tibbets trained his crew of the Enola Gay for its historic mission over Japan in 1945—and the Wendover area. Displays in the museum show the airfield's important role in the defeat of Germany and Japan in World War II, and a large diorama depicts the base in 1944. A replica of the "Little Boy" atomic bomb also is on display.

Those interested in a bird's-eve view of history can visit the Wendover

More than 100 buildings in various stages of decay still stand in the airfield, and restoration projects are ongoing. One of the squadron buildings has been transformed into the terminal for commercial aviation, and there is a small gift shop at the museum. # The Chocolate Nugget's Christmas Candy Craze

Chocolate Santas, candy canes, and gumdrops—these are treats that youngsters dream about during the holiday season. Dan and Caroline Salzwimmer, owners of the **Chocolate Nugget Candy Factory** in Washoe Valley north of Carson City, say that dream is what has kept them in the candy business for more than 20 years.

"Kids get wide-eyed and leave the store with a smile on their faces. There cannot be another business in the world more fun or satisfying than candy making," Dan says.

Dan opened the store in 1983, but he is retiring and passing on the business to his son, Danny, the third generation of family candy makers. Dan says, "There are very few family-owned candy operations left today that are still using the same recipes their fathers used over 50 years ago. We do."

December is one of the Salzwimmers' busiest times of the year, as they make peanut brittle, eight flavors of fudge, and salt water taffy. For the Christmas season, the Chocolate Nugget sells handmade candy

#### GET AWAY

#### **One-room Cabin Fever**

Travelers can visit the restored Amargosa Valley cabin built by a man some call a hero and some call a criminal. In the late 1800s, 58-year-old Jack Longstreet came to Nevada from Arizona and settled at Ash Meadows, an outpost in the Mojave Desert. The area is now

Ash Meadows National Wildlife Refuge. Manager Sharon McKelvey says some historians believe the one-eared Longstreet designed a hiding place in his cabin in case he needed to escape from the law.

While working as a hired gunman for the Tonopah Stage, the romantic Old West figure was acquitted of the murder of his brother-in-law. During Prohibition he operated a still at the site of his cabin, yet he also spoke for Native American rights and was embroiled in a dispute with the Bureau of Indian Affairs about the mistreatment of Paiutes. Longstreet died on July 26, 1928, at the age of 90 after he accidentally shot himself. He is buried in the Belmont Cemetery.

The Longstreet cabin was rebuilt in 2004

La Bussola, at 211 West First Street, is owned by Meredith Tanzer and Dawn Lewis. The gift shop and arts and crafts store has huge storefront windows decorated with a rainbow of decals. Inside the store is a blast of color, with racks of chunky jewelry and rooms of pastel-painted dressers and end tables.

Tanzer's enthusiasm for art and artists is reflected in her merchandise that ranges from \$20 stocking-stuffer necklaces to \$700 furniture and \$1,000 paintings. # From Sushi to Steak

Rampart Casino's Ari Sobel finds adventure in food.

#### By Matthew B. Brown

ri Sobel was drawn to the bright lights of Las Vegas seven years ago when he signed on for the management apprenticeship program at Rio. The city has fed his insatiable appetite ever since. "I eat it all," says the 36-year-old chef.

"There's adventure in food," Sobel adds.
"I'm excited by it. I love everything from sushi to a good steak. I like going out and checking out new restaurants. I like going to places on the Strip and finding weird places off the Strip."

Now the director of food and beverage for Rampart Casino, the Succasunna, New Jersey, native already has more than 20 years of experience in the food business. Growing up in Tampa, Florida, Sobel got his start when he was just 13. He and a friend stuffed hot dogs in buns at Tampa Stadium, former home of the NFL's Tampa Bay Buccaneers. "We liked having a little money in our

pocket and being with the guys," Sobel says. "We learned a lot about hard work and respect." As a 17-year-old junior in high school, he started his own catering service. Sobel and his staff served food at weddings, bar mitzvahs, and anniversary parties.

Sobel has earned a degree in culinary arts from the Culinary Institute of America in Hyde Park, New York, and a degree in hotel administration with a concentration in properties design at Cornell University School of Hotel Administration in Ithaca, New York.

He has worked with famed Las Vegas chefs Jean Louis Palladin, Michael Demers, and André Rochat, as well as Cannery Resorts' Executive Director of Food and Beverage Luc Akellino. After working at the Rio, where he managed the Carnival World Buffet, he started as a shift manager at Cannery Casino Resorts, owner of Rampart Casino. For the last two years, Sobel has been responsible for the operation of Rampart's restaurants and bars and manages a staff of 300 managers, chefs, cooks, kitchen workers, bartenders, and servers.

Rampart, an upscale neighborhood casino 15 miles northwest of the Strip, is located in Summerlin. Among the restaurants Sobel manages is the Carmel Room, a fine-dining steakhouse. Menu items include a crab cake appetizer, rack of lamb (see recipe) or porterhouse steak entrées, and

#### ROASTED RACK OF LAMB

**Ari Sobel** offers his recipe for roasted rack of lamb. "It's pretty straightforward, and it gives you a great result," Sobel says. "Ideally, you have to get a good quality of lamb. If you have your choice, get domestic lamb like Colorado, versus New Zealand."



#### INGREDIENTS (per person):

Half a rack of lamb (four ribs)

Kosher salt, fresh ground black pepper

1 tablespoon each of vegetable oil and butter Fresh herbs: rosemary, thyme, parsley, chives, mint, and tarragon

2 ounces of red wine

2 tablespoons of mustard grain

2 fluid ounces of veal stock

Shallots, assorted baby vegetables

Season lamb with salt and black pepper on all sides. Wrap the exposed bones tightly with aluminum foil. Heat the vegetable oil in a medium-sized sauté pan on high heat until oil almost reaches the smoking point. Sear meat on all sides for approximately two minutes or until browned.

Spread one tablespoon of mustard over the top of the lamb. Roll the top side of the lamb into fresh chopped parsley, chives, mint, and tarragon.

Add one tablespoon of butter to the pan and several sprigs of rosemary and thyme. Place the pan in a 375-degree oven and roast the lamb for 12 minutes or until it

crème brûlée or Grand Marnier soufflé for dessert. Dinner averages \$50 per person. The Rampart Buff et serves lunch for \$8.99 and dinner for \$11.99, and prices at the Promenade Café average \$9 per person.

Sobel did the conceptual design for Cannery Casino's Vino's Ristorante & Deli, as well as for the restaurants and bars at the Meadows Racetrack and Casino, Cannery Resorts' new property near Pittsburgh. He also is helping to design the restaurants planned for Cannery Resorts' Eastside Cannery, which will replace Nevada Palace Hotel and Casino on Boulder Highway, with construction beginning in January.

Although his heavy workload has nearly taken Sobel out of Rampart's kitchen, he says he cooks several times a week at home. His favorite dishes—seared tilapia with banana rum sauce, tortellini with white truffle oil and fresh herbs, and meat loaf with mashed potatoes—are indicative of his eclectic tastes.

With the birth of his daughter, Zoë Elizabeth, in April, Sobel is focused on his role as a family man. With his wife of five years, Christina Drum, and daughter, Heather Marie Ward, 17 Sobel now stays home more often than he scours the Strip for a new favorite restaurant. But he still sees Vegas as the same exciting city he and Christina moved to in 1999.

"Hike the chaos," Sobel says. "Hike the fact that it's constantly changing. There's always something to do."

reaches desired temperature (110 degrees for rare, 120 for medium rare, 130 for medium, and 140 for well done). Remove from the oven, drain the oil and fat, remove the lamb to a warm plate, and let rest uncovered for five minutes.

In the same pan, add the red wine, remaining mustard, and two sprigs of mint, and bring to a boil. Stir with a wooden spoon, scraping the bottom of the pan. Boil the sauce until the volume has been reduced by half. Then add the hot veal stock and reduce again by half. Strain and adjust seasoning to your taste and keep warm.

Slice the rack into chops, remove the foil, coat lightly with the sauce, and serve with sautéed baby vegetables.

## Nevada Magazine Celebrates 70 Years

Writers and photographers welcome the opportunity to showcase the outdoors.

The writers, editors, and photographers of *Nevada Magazine* revel in the chance to show readers that Nevada is more than neon and slot machines. In the magazine's 70 years they have featured the natural beauties and outdoor activities that make Nevada unique.

Reno writer and photographer Mark Vollmer has been producing outdoor stories for *Nevada Magazine* since his "Good-Natured Vacations," a March/April 1999 story about the growth of eco-tourism. The editors of *Nevada Magazine* have always been open to outdoor coverage, he says. "It's a great idea for them to include these outdoor and wilderness articles. I think it's an important part of our state. People tend to think of casinos first."

Vollmer has an affinity for Nevada's hidden attractions. "There's a lot of scenic beauty that you don't see from the highways," Vollmer says. "If you take the back roads into remote valleys, you'll see lush riparian zones [wet areas] up in the mountains, where the creeks flow all year, and wildlife such as deer, golden eagles, and antelope."

In 2003, Vollmer published a coffee table book on the Tahoe Rim Trail, Tahoe Rim Trail: Exploring the Jewel, with Reno Gazette-Journal photographer Scott Sady. He teaches photography workshops at Truckee Meadows Community College and says his favorite things to do are hiking and photography. "I love taking my camera out and capturing

things in nature I didn't expect to discover," he says.

Tahoe Daily Tribune sports reporter Jeremy Evans is the author of "The 10 in 10 Challenge," the cover story for Nevada Magazine's September/October 2003 issue. Over 10 days, Evans and three other writers and photographers completed outdoor adventures in 10 areas highlighted by the Nevada Commission on Tourism booklet, Your Nitty-Gritty, Down and Dirty Guide to Nevada. They hiked and biked the Tahoe Rim Trail, boarded down Sand Mountain, went rock climbing at Wheeler Peak, and hiked the Ruby Crest Trail. "There was definitely a following for that story," Evans says. "I had people I didn't know talk to me about that story for years."

Evans says he's glad that *Nevada Magazine* is celebrating the Silver State's wide-open places and publishing the work of writers and photographers who love the outdoors.

"Some people think that Nevada is just cowboys and all that," Evans says. "Nevada Magazine provides an outlet for journalists who are into the outdoors. I think there is a lot of talent here, and the magazine gives them a venue to write about stuff they wouldn't be able to otherwise."



# And the Winner Is ...

Las Vegas magician Lance Burton named Nevada's top 2006 performer

ance Burton was curious about this whole Nevada Entertainer of the Year thing. When the concept and criteria were explained to him, he said, "Thank God talent wasn't included."

That's Burton, same ol' go&h-darn guy he's been for nearly 25 years in Las Vegas. He "remains humble and true to his Kentucky roots, friendly and courteous, and is frequently seen in the community showing support for a variety of causes," says Jerry Fink, a writer for the *Las Vegas SUN* and one of this year's judges.

Burton was selected as *Nevada Magazine's* first Nevada Entertainer of the Year. Five Las Vegas show business writers and critics were asked to consider a performer's showmanship, community involvement, name recognition beyond the



state, and whether he or she held a longterm contract. The majority of judges felt Burton best fit the criteria.

Over the years, the 46-year-old magician has melded a folksy offstage persona into the classy, traditional image he has always favored onstage. Many of the family and friends who attended his 10th-anniversary performance last June at the Monte Carlo remember him as a young specialty act in the Tropicana's "Folies Bergere."

Burton and Harrah's afternoon comedy-magic headliner Mac King grew up together in Louisville, spending their high school summers working at a bygone amusement park. Burton revved up the "Action Mobile," an old Plymouth Duster with its passenger door secured by a rope, and headed west in 1981 to perform in a variety show, "It's Magic," in Southern California.

A TV appearance on *The Tonight Show* with Johnny Carson landed Burton in the



"Folies Bergere" where he performed his 12-minute act for nine years while building illusions for a bigger show, an opportunity that came in 1991. Burton opened his own show at the former Hacienda, a production that presented the magician surrounded by topless dancers.

"They had always had topless revue shows in that room," he recalls. He talked the hotel into a schedule of having the first show of the evening "covered" and the second topless. By his fifth year, modesty won out.

In June 1996, Burton moved into a Victorian-style theater at the Monte Carlo, where he is contracted to appear through June 20, 2009. Last summer he unveiled new segments that had taken nearly two years to incorporate. A Solid Gold Lady appears when \$10-million worth of the precious metal disappears. His new "Magic Zone" is a six-minute, nonstop round of appearing and disappearing cast members, who play out a murder-mystery story line.

Entertainment personality and judge Robin Leach hails Burton for his "tenacity" and for "revamping and redesigning his Monte Carlo show and still proving he's the magic of magic." Television audiences may remember Burton for his appearances on Eye on America, The Academy of Country Music Awards, and several magic shows, including The World's Greatest Magic. He has toured Japan and taped shows for Europe, United

Kingdom, Australia, Canada, and South Africa.

Burton's signature sleight-of-hand act still opens the show as doves appear and vanish in a flash. Getting into the act is his sidekick, a parakeet named Elvis. Burton's red Corvette also flies and disappears, and the magician is stampeded when he calls for children to join him onstage, often with unexpected results.

At his anniversary party, Burton introduced his girlfriend, Gabriella Versace, star of the Rio's "Erocktica" revue. He has dated other performers and had a short-lived marriage to Melinda Saxe, "The First Lady of Magic," in the 1990s.

Burton says his life has toned down. "For me the main change is I don't stay out late like I did a couple of years ago. I'm getting older," he says. "Back in the '80s, you could do two shows and then hang out all night."

What pushed Burton to the top of the list was his charity work. Each year, he pulls in other performers for a Shriners' benefit that goes back to his Hacienda days. "This year we had the Scintas and last year we had Clint Holmes," Burton says. For Jerry Lewis' Labor Day telethon, Burton headed to the South Coast to perform on the national broadcast. The next day he answered phones at the Las Vegas Hilton to boost momentum in the final two hours of the local broadcast.

He's known for giving his time to any Las Vegas cause that needs a boost, including the Lied Discovery Children's Museum, Habitat for Humanity, Arthritis Foundation, Sunshine Foundation, Las Vegas Metro Police, North Las Vegas SWAT Team, Las Vegas Marathon, and an airport tourist safety program.

His hard work and generosity have paid off, but Burton remains a man of inexpensive tastes. "I like TV dinners, fast food, sometimes sushi. I've been trying to eat more healthy, more fresh fruits," he says. "I love hamburgers, but I can't eat 'em every meal like I used to."

# Clint Holmes and Rita Rudner top the list of finalists.

The panel of Las Vegas entertainment journalists was so effusive in its praise of cabaret singer Clint Holmes that only the little matter of his Harrah's Las Vegas show closing on September 30 took him out of the running.

The entertainer who was, in the words of Robin Leach, "still blowing the roof off his theater every night," spent more than six years on the Strip. The Harrah's showroom will be shared this winter by Wayne Newton, who was also considered by the judges as a candidate for Nevada Entertainer of the Year, and Rita Rudner, who placed second. Finalists included Celine Dion and Penn and Teller, and nominees included Sir Elton John, Roy Horn, Barry Manilow, and Frank Scinta.

Instead of looking for another Las Vegas showroom to house his act, the 60-year-old Holmes is pursuing another dream, developing an original stage musical, "Breathe," for London or Broadway.

The musical would set Holmes' own life as the product of a mixed-race marriage against the larger tapestry of the nightclub entertainer as an endangered species, one he is doing his best to preserve. Holmes' parents—an American black jazz singer and an English opera diva—met in England during World War II.

"He's just the best," Lance Burton says of his friend. "Clint's kind of the instigator. He's just such an outgoing, gregarious, social animal. He's the one going, 'Let's go out to dinner after the show.'"



# Dancing With the Stars

Celebrating with celebrities on New Year's Eve in Las Vegas.

hen media stars like Paris
Hilton or hottie actor Dean
Cain party at Las Vegas' famous nightclub, the Palms'
ghostbar, my husband, Joey,
and I are dancing and watching
the celebs as they live on the edge.

New Year's Eve is no exception. We party at the Palms almost every weekend (it helps that we're DINKs: double income, no kids), and Friday is our "date night." But there is something special about New Year's Eve—it's romantic, fun, and our favorite together-time.

For the past two years we have spent New Year's Eve at the ghostbar, which is located on the 55th floor and offers a stunning 180-degree view of the Las Vegas Valley. The nightclub has glass walls, and the outdoor deck features a see-through acrylic floor overlooking the Palms' swimming pool that gives you a sensation akin to standing on air.

Celebrities from around the world come to Vegas to ring in the New Year, and we love to check out the arrivals. Among them have been Tara Ried, Britney Spears, Chris Webber, the Hilton family, and Hugh Hefner, accompanied by his voluptuous entourage.


Planning is essential, and we start in October. Four years ago we decided to check out the Strip and found ourselves buried in an overwhelming crowd of elbow-to-elbow street partiers. Normally officials block off the Strip and its access roads beginning about 5 p.m. and reopen the streets around 1 or 2 a.m. So, we always rent a limo.

Another year we timed our evening poorly and ended up at a Wendy's drivethru in a stretch limo instead of joining celebrities at the Nine Steakhouse at the Palms, where the food can be astonishing. A burger just doesn't compare to a champagne caviar bar, popcorn shrimp, salad, and a filet mignon.

Evening attire presents a challenge for me—finding a "club chic" dress on a budget. In October I start scouting stores such as Nordstrom and Cache. Celebs will walk into the Palms wearing outfits priced anywhere from \$500 to \$10,000 with labels from designers such as Dolce & Gabbana, Christian Lacroix, Stella McCartney, and Oscar de la Renta. Cleavage counts and gowns are usually tight and short.

Joey only needs a week to get his tux fitted and shoes polished, so his attitude is more casual. But I've found New Year's Eve is mainly about how you feel, and what you wear can change your entire attitude. At one time, I weighed more than 150 pounds, and it seemed nothing ever looked good on me. Now that I've trimmed down to a size five, I look forward to "the search," which this year will be for something short with sequins, no back, and, hopefully, a price tag between \$200 and \$400.

Because we spend so many evenings

clubbing, we bought an annual membership in Nine Group, which also owns Playboy Club, Rain, and Moon at the Palms. Members receive VIP treatment, discounts on hotel and spa facilities, priority seating in restaurants, and invitations to special parties, which also allow you to buy New Year's Eve tickets early.

Last year the tickets were \$300 per person, which included an open bar from 8 to 10 p.m. and lavish hors d'oeuvres such as tuna tartar, mini-sirloin burgers, crab cakes, and mini cheesecakes. Since we didn't have to wait in line, we bypassed the three or four no-nonsense bouncers. (Those without tickets started lining up about 8 p.m. and waited until midnight when the ghostbar opened to the public at a cost from \$500 to \$1,000 per person.)

Inside, hats and noisemakers waited for us at our reserved table. Under the soft blue lighting, I sipped my Grey Goose dirty martini, and Joey ordered his Chopin and soda, which were free until 10 p.m. After that we could buy individual drinks at the

bar or purchase a bottle for \$300. When midnight approached, we raced outside to watch the Strip light up with fireworks and to drink a champagne toast. We exchanged wishes for a peaceful year and returned inside for more dancing.

Throughout the evening we chatted with celebrities, most of whom we find are pretty approachable. One night at Rain, Joey was missing. I located him as he grinned and waved at me from Jennifer Love Hewitt's private party room. He had dropped by to chat with her group. We have found that it is a good idea to treat celebrities with respect. Some are protective of their privacy—others can be rude—but most have a great sense of fun.

Speaking of fun, I keep in mind that it can come at a price. There is no magic cure for the morning after New Year's Eve.

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# COPPER RIVETS IN THE SILVER STATE

# THE LITTLE-KNOWN STORY OF HOW LEVI'S JEANS WERE BORN IN NEVADA.

The world's oldest pair of jeans paid a visit to Reno last May. It was a homecoming of sorts because the idea which led to the invention of the blue jean originated in a simple tailor's shop on Reno's Virginia Street more than 130 years ago.

The story starts with Bavarian dry goods merchant Levi Strauss, who arrived in Gold Rush-era San Francisco in 1853. He imported clothing and household goods from New York and Europe, which he then sold to the small stores of the West. One of his customers was Latvian immigrant Jacob Davis, who was working as a tailor in Reno in the early 1870s and had come up with a novel idea to keep men's work pants from falling apart:

#### HIDDEN AWAY IN A SMALL TRUNK WERE FIVE PAIRS OF LITTLE LEVI'S BIB OVERALLS, DWIGHT'S OVERALLS, PACKED AWAY A CENTURY EARLIER BY A GRIEVING MOTHER.

Davis put metal rivets at strategic "points of strain" such as pocket seams.

Davis' trousers were so popular that he decided to patent his rivet process. He needed a business partner to get manufacturing off the ground, so he contacted Strauss, his fabric supplier. On May 20, 1873, the two received a patent for "a new pocket fastening." They soon began to make men's denim work pants with shiny, copper rivets, and Levi's—a registered trademark of Levi Strauss & Co.—was born.

Among the many customers for the new pants were the miners, carpenters, teamsters, railroaders, and other working men of ever-growing Nevada. The Levi Strauss & Co. Archives has been able to acquire some of these pants, left behind by their original owners, then rediscovered by hikers, explorers, and spelunkers.

One of the historic jeans is a pair that was found in the late 1990s in an unnamed Nevada mining town. Manufactured by Levi Strauss & Co. around 1885, this pair was auctioned on eBay in May 2001. The archives won the auction after a heart-stopping bidding war for \$46,532. The pants are not the famous 501 jeans, but an even more basic pair of riveted denim work pants. The company's historical records were lost in the 1906 earthquake and fire in San Francisco, and no one knew what the pants were called in the 1880s—so they were named the Nevada Jeans after the state where they were found.

The company's archives owns quite a few other old Levi's jeans found within Nevada's borders. One pair from the late 1920s was unearthed in a garbage dump near Gold Hill. An 1890s pair with drippings from a miner's candle came from an unknown mine, and another from an area near Goldfield.

Nevada ranchers and their families also were among these early Levi's customers, and some old denims owned by a Carson Valley family were discovered last year. They are toddler-sized bib overalls, worn by a little boy named Dwight Dangberg at the turn of the 20th century, and they are the oldest known Levi's garments in Nevada.

Dwight was the son of Gertrude and H.F. Dangberg Jr., who is recognized today as the

founder of the town of Minden. Dangberg Jr.'s parents were Heinrich and Margaret Dangberg, who owned a prosperous ranch in Carson Valley in the mid-1800s. Heinrich Sr. and his son both served in the Nevada State Senate and both made considerable


but differing contributions to the growing state. The senior Dangberg died in 1904 and, tragically, so did his grandson Dwight, then a child of five.



Many generations of Dangbergs lived at the ranch until the last family member died in 1995. The state took control of the property in 2005, and the Dangberg Ranch is being developed as Nevada's newest state park in cooperation with Douglas County, the Douglas County Historical Society, and the Friends of Dangberg Ranch.

When park staff members explored the many buildings on the ranch last year, they discovered that the family had apparently never thrown anything away. Altogether there were about 19,000 items: clothing, kitchen utensils, furniture, magazines, and newspapers. Hidden away in a small trunk were five pairs of little Levi's bib overalls, Dwight's overalls, packed away a century earlier by a grieving mother.

Levi Strauss & Co. has been making chil-

dren's clothing since the late 19th century, and Dwight's garments were described in a catalog as "Boys' Bib Overalls, 8 oz. Blue Denim, with elastic straps." They cost \$3.25 per dozen wholesale. Mrs. Dangberg probably spent about 50 cents for Dwight's overalls at local stores like Russell Bros. in Sheridan, E.G., Carr & Co. in Gardner-ville, and N. Harris in Genoa.

Once the new Dangberg Ranch State Park is open, Dwight's overalls will be on display for visitors to see. A few people got a sneak peek at the little pants last spring at a ceremony on Virginia Street.

On May 20, the 133rd anniversary of the day Davis and Strauss received their patent to make the first jeans, the Reno Historic Resources Commission unveiled a plaque at 211 North Virginia Street. The site, which was originally 31 North Virginia, is where Davis made the first pair of riveted pants. To help commemorate the event, the Dangberg bib overalls were placed on display.

Levi's Strauss & Co.'s oldest pair of Levi's 501s, known as the XX Jeans, were taken out of their fireproof safe in the archives in San Francisco and shown to the assembled crowd. These pants, made around 1879, are the closest thing to the original item made by Davis. Their appraised value of \$125,000 would no doubt astonish the old gentleman.

## THE NFR SPURS THE CITY'S ECONOMY AND ATTRACTS RODEO REVELERS FROM NEAR AND FAR.

he famed dancing fountains at Bellagio haven't performed the Texas two-step yet, but it would be fitting when Las Vegas goes Western for 10 days beginning in November. That's when the world's richest rodeo—the National Finals Rodeo—makes Justin hats and Wrangler jeans fashionable everywhere in Las Vegas, even at Bellagio, one of the Strip's two five-diamond resorts.

"We might not have the volume of cowboys that some of the other properties have, but we are certainly well represented," says William McBeath, Bellagio's CEO. "It's the only time of the year you'll see black cowboy hats in Bellagio, and you'll see a lot of them."

November and December were slow months in Las Vegas until the rodeo arrived 21 years ago. But the NFR is more than a rodeo—it's a cultural experience where the history and traditions of the American West are celebrated. When the NFR is in town, it isn't just the contestants and livestock workers wearing boots, jeans, and cowboy hats. Thousands of rodeo fans descend on the city, and Las Vegans as well as visitors go Western for the duration.

"To us, it's the greatest sporting event in the world," says former Las Vegas resident Jack Watson, 81, who with his wife, 74-year-old Bertha, has attended every NFR event since the finals began in 1959 in Dallas. The pair always have down-front seats. "Each night they put a camera on us, and an announcer tells our history," Watson says. "It's quite an honor. People all over the country call me and say, 'We seen you at the rodeo on TV."

Watson, a former Oklahoma rancher and saddlebrone and bull

rider, worked at the Nevada Test Site while his wife was a costumer at the Tropicana in the 1960s. Today, they make an annual trek from their New Mexico home to Las Vegas, where the finals moved in 1985. "It's the one place where the people with Western heritage and cattlemen get to meet and have a reunion," Watson says. "We've got friends in nine states, and we all go there to enjoy the rodeo."

The \$6-million finals open November 30 at the Thomas and Mack Center, the culmination of nearly a year of intense competition. From January to November, professional rodeo athletes travel across America to nearly 200 competitions. The top 15 contenders in each of seven events—bareback, saddle-bronc and bull riding, calf and team roping, steer wrestling, and for the women, barrel racing—qualify for the NFR.

The NFR officially kicks off on the eve of opening night when

the Fremont Street Experience hosts the "Downtown Hoedown," which this year features Ricochet, Little Texas, Deana Carter, and Trick Pony. Over the next 10 days most of the biggest names in country take over many resort stages—including such stars as Brooks & Dunn, Tracy Lawrence, Randy Travis, Charlie Daniels, and Tanya Tucker. Like other Las Vegas tourists, those visiting for the NFR also enjoy the Strip's usual roundup of top-rated entertainment, shopping, fine dining, and gambling.

For the competing cowboys and cowgirls, the focus is on winning money and the ultimate prizes: gold buckles for eight world champions and one for the All-Around World Champ, as well as national-television exposure on ESPN. World champions are determined by total money earned throughout the year, and for most competitors the NFR can determine whether or not the year has been profitable.

Last year, All-Around World Champion Ryan Jarrett, a Georgian who will be 23 on December 28, was the only NFR contestant to qualify for two events, calf roping and steer wrestling. He won \$114,718 during the NFR to push his season total to \$263,665 and become the second youngest to win the all-around buckle.

Diehard fans celebrate nightly at the Gold Coast, where after the rodeo the winners of each event are presented with gold belt buckles for being the best in their round of competition—commonly called a "go-round." Round winners receive \$15,000, and the top performers over the 10 rounds in each event also earn a bonus of \$40,000, both of which count toward the world rankings.

#### WHEN YOU GO

The 48th annual National Finals Rodeo at the Thomas and Mack Center in Las Vegas is sold out this year, as it has been for the past 16 years, but that doesn't mean you can't attend one of the 10 performances and share in the event atmosphere. The finals run from November 30 through December 9. Each year, event promoter Las Vegas Events offers two options for those without tickets. The NFR Ticket Exchange is located at the Cowboy Christmas Gift Show in the Las Vegas Convention Center. Folks who have tickets but can't attend leave their tickets at the exchange, where they are sold for face value and a \$2-per-ticket handling fee.

The Mad Dash 30 allows you to buy an admission ticket for \$37.50, and you have until 30 minutes after the rodeo begins to find an empty seat in the balcony, or you can return to the ticket office for a refund. You also can opt to remain in the center and watch the event from the concourse on closed-circuit television.

**NEVADANS TO WATCH** Five Nevadans have good chances of qualifying for this year's National Finals Rodeo.

Team roping brothers **Jay** and **Randon Adams** of Logandale consistently have been in the top 10 most of the year. Header Jay, 22, is trying to make his first NFR, while it would be the second for heeler Randon, 24. Jay was the team-roping top rookie in 2003, and Randon was the top rookie the previous year.

Matt Shiozawa, 26, qualified for his first NFR in calf roping last year and finished the season eighth in the final standings with \$125,381 He lives in Pocatello, Idaho, but spends considerable time

near Logandale, where he was an all-state basketball player at Moapa Valley High School.

**Paul Jones** of Elko has been ranked consistently among the topfive bareback riders this year and will likely qualify for his first NFR. The 28-year-old won eight major rodeo titles this summer.

Battling for a spot in his second straight NFR is **Cody Hintz**, 24, of Spring Creek. The team-roping heeler is on the cusp of cracking the top 15 after finishing 2005 ranked No. 15. He got a boost on September 30 by placing fifth in the ProRodeo Tour Summer Finale in Omaha, Nebraska.—*Jeff Wolf*

If fans miss the rodeo, they can watch replays of the previous night's action on a big-screen TV at the Cowboy Christmas Gift Show, held at the Las Vegas Convention Center. Deals can be had on Western apparel—for human and horse—and Western-themed arts and crafts from more than 400 vendors. Prices range from \$10 to several thousand dollars for artwork (want to buy a barbed wire sculpture?), jewelry, furniture, and horse trailers.

Although rodeo is a big part of Nevada's heritage, Western-style culture in Las Vegas goes back only to the annual Helldorado Days, a rodeo and cowboy festival contrived in the mid-1930s to attract tourists. The late Southern Nevada historian Frank Wright once said that the image of Las Vegas as a cowboy town is as authentic as the Eiffel Tower at the Paris hotel-casino. Wright noted, "Las Vegas billing itself as an Old West town was deliberate public relations."

In the 1980s casino pioneer and cowboy Benny Binion (who died in 1989) encouraged city officials and the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association to bring the NFR from Oklahoma City to Las Vegas. Until the move in 1985, the period from Thanksgiving to Christmas had been a time of layoffs and repairs.

"Before the NFR, December in Las Vegas used to be the month when we'd change the carpet and paint the ceilings," says Michael Gaughan, chief executive of Coast Resorts and part-time rancher. "December was a disaster for business. You'd roll up the streets around here. You'd furlough your employees. You'd half close down the joints."

Only a few casinos were prepared for the crowd of 140,000 at the first NFR. Las Vegan Rick Rosen, 53, was a dealer at the Silver Slipper in 1985, but grew up near Pueblo, Colorado, where he was a rodeo fan. He knew what was riding in on the horizon. Rosen, who was the host of a sports talk radio show at the time, says, "Sure enough, when the NFR came to town, we were doing double shifts, and we had pit bosses dealing blackjack. We didn't have enough people."

Las Vegas would never be caught off guard again. The rodeo became a sellout after four years and has sold out every year since, bringing in more than 3.5 million spectators and an estimated \$590 million in revenue.

Today, a bevy of cowboys and cowgirls in their boots, hats, and jeans, along with thousands of others with a passion for one of America's oldest sports, keep the cash registers ringing on casino row and Nevada's cowboy culture riding high.

## **GAY RODEO RETURNS**

#### IGRA FINALS RIDE INTO RENO AFTER A 21-YEAR BREAK.

he competitors in the International Gay Rodeo Association Finals take their work seriously, but they also know how to have fun. The 2006 championship event in Reno will offer dancing in Doc's Bar and competitions like the "drag race," where a competitor dressed in drag rides a steer.

Reno activist Phil Ragsdale organized the first gay rodeo in Reno 30 years ago as a fund-raiser for muscular dystrophy research. It ended after nine years due to financial difficulties, but during those years the event became the model for gay rodeos throughout the West.

The IGRA, formed in 1985, now has 20 member organizations representing 25 states and Canadian provinces. This year the High Sierra Gay Rodeo Association will bring the finals to the Reno Livestock Events Center on November 10-12.

Reno's Brian Chew, president of the association, says gay and straight cowboys and cowgirls will compete in bull riding, calf roping, bronc riding, and barrel racing for fun, belt buckles, and a small purse. "The nice thing about gay rodeo is the livestock doesn't know you're gay and doesn't care," Chew says.


The top 20 cowboys and cowgirls from the IGRA season are invited. "These are the best of the best," Chew says. "We have all the traditional events and the camp events, too." By "camp," Chew means off-the-wall competitions such as dressing a goat and the drag race.

The highlight for Chew, however, is the competitors' camaraderie and hard work. "These people have so much heart and so much try," he says. "The ones who stand out to me are the ones who are having difficulties at the beginning of a season, and seven or eight rodeos later, they are smoking."

Casino sponsors will bus out-of-town visitors around Reno, to parties at the Grand Sierra Resort (the event's main sponsor), and on a pub crawl. The skybox overlooking the livestock arena will be transformed into Doc's Bar, with tunes spun by San Francisco DJs, and will be open to everyone.

he nearly-full moon poked its shiny face from behind the clouds and lit up the blanket of white around us. The snow crunched softly under our snowshoes, but otherwise we were silent, too stunned by the views to speak. In the distance the dark hulk of Mount Rose disappeared into the night while bright ribbons of white spun below it. We could see the moon's reflection on the still surface of Lake Tahoe, and above the mountains of the west shore, dozens of glittering stars.

Nine of us were on one of six snowshoe treks led by Tahoe Rim Trail Association volunteers last winter. We hiked from the Mount Rose trailhead on the ridge above Tamarack Peak until the sounds of civilization disappeared and we could hear only the plopping of our snow-

shoes. It was a wonderful night, cool but not too cold, and the terrain—some uphill, some downhill—was suitable for beginners and experts alike.

While everyone did some huffing and puffing, we took frequent breaks to enjoy the view. Three hours and about four miles later, we were back at the trailhead, where Tahoe Rim Trail Association leaders provided us with hot chocolate and a smile.

The moonlight trek is one of several day and evening snowshoe adventures offered by the Tahoe Rim Trail Association. The winter trails program made its debut last January and was such a success that volunteers plan to increase the number of hikes this year.

One of the highlights of last winter's program was the Hot Soup and Snowshoes Hike at Page Meadows on Lake Tahoe's west shore. The group took the four-mile hike on a beautiful, sunny day. The sky was a deep blue, and the snow sparkled. After a short walk through the trees, the snowshoers reached the five wide-open fields that make up Page Meadows, where they clomped through meadow after meadow, enjoying the views of Twin Peaks and Grouse Rock high on the Sierra crest.

Earlier, the leaders had hiked into the area, set up camping stoves, and prepared hot soup for the participants—who, after all that hiking, were ready for the feast. "Snowshoeing works up an appetite," says trip leader Alexis Ollar. "I have never seen such

big smiles as we handed the participants their steaming-hot cups of soup. Everyone warmed up and was ready to finish the hike."

One of the great things about snowshoeing is just about everybody can do it—and you don't need to take a lesson. It is basically like walking with big feet. If you don't own a pair of snowshoes you can rent or purchase them from Lake Tahoe and Reno area ski shops and outdoor stores. Many people like to snowshoe with poles, so you can give them a try.

You will also need the type of warm clothing that you might wear cross-country skiing, a backpack or fanny pack, water, and snacks. You will warm up quickly, so dress in layers. You can carry water-resistant layers in your pack. There is one rule of etiquette to remember: If possible, avoid snowshoeing on top of existing cross-

country ski tracks as this wrecks the tracks for skiers.

Snowshoeing enables you to spend time enjoying the snow away from the resort crowds. Night or day, it is a refreshing way to be outside in the winter—but snowshoeing at night holds a special place in my heart. Once you have spent an evening on the moonlit snow, you will never look at the moon quite the same way again.

# The Family Business

Growing lavender is a passion for Mike and Kristen Harris.

"All of a sudden it struck me. We had everything we needed to grow lavender ourselves."

Ithough in late fall Lavender Ridge's fields of plump purple blossoms have been harvested, you still can take in the herb's intoxicating aroma—a scent Kristen Harris describes as "heaven on earth"—at the gift shop where lavender oil, soap, and dried bouquets are sold.

Kristen and her husband, Mike, own and operate Lavender Ridge, the only working lavender farm in Nevada. Kristen can tell you anything you want to know about the plant, such as which varieties grow best in Nevada's high desert and which types can be used for

potpourri, oil, and cooking.

Lavender Ridge is nestled between the Truckee River and the hills west of downtown Reno,

a mile and a half past West McCarran Boulevard on West Fourth Street. The 1920s farmstead sits on one and a quarter acres. Two huge fields are planted in lavender, which in summer burst with color and scent.

The Harrises originally bought the place so

Mike could store equipment for his landscaping business. "It was a mess back then," Kristen remembers. "We had a lot of cleaning up to do just to use the barns for storage." Now the buildings also serve as drying barns for lavender, and the original farmhouse has been remodeled into a workshop and a gift shop where Kristen sells her products.

The couple discovered working lavender farms while on a vacation to New Zealand in 1999. "All of a sudden it struck me," Kristen says. "We had everything we needed to grow lavender ourselves." Mike's background as a horticulturist, landscaper, and chemist coupled with Kristen's business experience formed the perfect mix. Mike knew Northern Nevada's climate was suited for growing lavender and began researching the different types. Kristen focused her attention on developing products.

More than 3,000 plants in eight varieties produce enough lavender oil to keep their shelves stocked with lotions, soaps, oils, salves, scrubs, teas, and cooking herbs. Dried lavender blooms are used for potpourri, arrangements, and sachets. Two beehives are housed in an old treehouse near the fields. The bees pollinate the lavender and produce the honey sold in the gift shop.

The family puts in long hours. Mike distills the oil from the lavender buds in an industrial still. In her basement workshop Kristen formulates, bottles, and packages the products. Their two teenage boys, Cameron and Ryan, help at farmer's markets and with harvesting.

"We do work hard, but I wouldn't trade it for anything," Kristen says. "I spend my time tending lavender and thinking of creative ways to package it. We offer group tours a chance to cut their own lavender and even have lavender cooking classes. Can life be any sweeter than that?"

# Earning Their Wings

hether he's building miniature models or restoring old warbirds, Dennis Buehn has been occupied with planes all his life. The walls of his office at the Carson City Airport are covered with memorabilia showcasing his love for aviation. An old wooden propeller hangs in the center of his collection, surrounded by photographs and posters of planes that he has built and flown. "It is such a unique and spectacular thing to be able to fly and be free to navigate as you please," Dennis says.

At their company, American Warbirds

Inc., Buehn and his wife Tami have been restoring warplanes since 1988. Under military contract, they also inspect and fly aircraft for the air force's test pilot school. While Tami takes the planes apart, Dennis performs the inspections.

The two specialize in restoring the Albatross seaplane and the AT6 Texan fighter for private pilots. "The Albatross is the large, luxury yacht-type plane, while the Texan is more like a sports car," Dennis says. He fell in love with the Albatross when he earned his wings in the Navy in the 1970s, but he has found a new kind of excitement in his World

War II-era Texan, the Midnight Miss III, which he enters in the Reno Air Races. This year he took second in the Gold Heat.

It can take one to three years and thousands of dollars to restore an airplane, but Dennis says he can't imagine doing anything else. "I enjoy creating a life out of a pile of parts," he says. "Most people don't like what they do at work, and I work at what I like."

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

# College on a Shoestring

A 1941 graduate of the **University of Nevada** recalls counting his pennies in **Reno**.

hen Ted Rischard entered the University of Nevada in 1939 to earn a mining engineering degree, the Great Depression still lingered. The 20-year-old Balboa Island, California, man and his fellow Mackay School of Mines students would find ways to stretch their meager incomes.

Rischard's daughter, Carolyn Fox, a longtime photographer and *Nevada Magazine* contributor, helped coordinate photos for her 87-year-old father's autobiography. One chapter, "College on a Shoestring," relates his two years at the Reno campus—he had completed his first two years at Santa Ana Junior College in Santa Ana, California. Rischard was able to include many details of this period of his life thanks to the letters he wrote to his parents and his future wife, Maureen McClintock, who was living in Costa Mesa, California, and attending SAJC.

It was a hot August morning when Rischard—at the wheel of his 1929 Franklin nicknamed Betsy—and his childhood friend Bill Kerns arrived in Reno. They found housing scarce and rental rates high, but they finally procured a little place at 926½ West Second Street. Rischard writes: "It had a good-size kitchen with a big wood stove for cooking, heating, and heating the water, a bedroom with a single and double bed, and a small bathroom with toilet and tub. The rent was \$22.50 per month."

The students christened the house "Bachelor's Arms," and although they ad-




Ted and Maureen Rischard drove the restored Betsy to their 50th-anniversary party in 1992.

hered to a strict budget, Rischard was determined to eat as well as he could. One evening Kerns wanted to make a big pot of oatmeal for supper and have the rest for breakfast. Rischard would not go for that: "I persisted, and we often had beef stew or pot roast with potatoes, carrots, and onions cooked in a cast-iron Dutch oven. One time we made a pot of dry lima beans and could not believe how they swelled up. It took us four nights to eat them all."

Although prices in those days were low—pot roast cost 27 cents a pound, ground beef, 21 cents—Rischard's income

was equally low. His out-of-state tuition for the fall semester was \$75, and his part-time job cleaning the display cabinets at the mineral museum (now the W.M. Keck Museum) paid him 37½ cents an hour, a sum he was happy to earn.

The students were frugal with their midday meal: "Much of the time we would have a very inexpensive lunch at school. We would bring a can of soup into the assay lab, light a Bunsen burner and place the soup in a beaker to heat...I am sure the profs knew what we were doing because we could not hide the aroma of the



soup cooking, but no one objected. Times were tight for everybody!"

The roommates shopped for groceries at Sewell's Market, located just west of Virginia Street on Commercial Row. They liked the store because it had a bakery where they could buy their bread, and: "After we had collected \$10 worth of register receipts, we could get a nice frosted two-layer cake free."

Rischard continued to be careful with his money during the second semester. He was disappointed he couldn't attend a major springtime event at the school, the Military Ball: "I was missing the social affairs and feminine company I had enjoyed with Maureen at Christmas and would like to have gone. However, in one of my letters home I noted three reasons why I could not...Renting a tux, the tickets, and a corsage would come to at least \$10."

Over the summer break Rischard and Kerns joined a two-month field trip paid for by the Hunt Foundation. They toured mines in eastern Nevada, spending time in Panaca, Caliente, Ely, Red House (location of the Getchell Mine), and Winnemucca. During a short stay at home before returning to his final year at the University of Nevada, he claimed \$1,000 left to him by his grandfather.

Rischard continued his part-time jobs and put his \$1,000 in the bank. He worked six hours a week in the lab for Professor Harry E. Wheeler and corrected papers for \$15 a month. He also cleaned Professor Walter S. Palmer's lab: "I took it upon myself to wash all his equipment and tried to keep the lab neat and clean...I kept track of my time and he was happy with the arrangement, so I did this for both of my last semesters. At 37½ cents an hour I did not make a lot, but every little bit helped."

Rischard was awarded a bachelor of science degree in Mining and Metallurgical Engineering on May 12, 1941. He started work at Douglas Aircraft in Long Beach, California, six months before Pearl Harbor, and after McClintock graduated from the University of Southern California, the two were married in July 1942. Three years later Rischard entered the U.S. Navy and served as an engineering officer during the last months of World War II. In 1960, Rischard left Douglas Aircraft to manage the family's

commercial real estate development.

Betsy, which had faithfully transported the two roommates over the Sierra Nevada to Reno and back several times during their tenure at the University of Nevada, was restored in 1992. That July, Maureen and Ted Rischard drove the car to their 50th wedding anniversary party in Santa Ana.—Joyce Hollister

celebrates 60 years

ixty years ago the leaders of a small Jewish congregation were also prominent figures in a small-but-growing city. Casino moguls such as Moe Dalitz, legendary owner of the Desert Inn, and Jay Sarno, who built Circus Circus and Caesars Palace, are two of its early members.

As the city grew, so did the congregation of Temple Beth Sholom, today one of the most modern Jewish houses of worship in the southwestern United States. The city is Las Vegas, which began as a dusty, desert railroad town and over the past six decades has grown into a glittering entertainment capital.

"Temple Beth Sholom is a symbol of the first Jews who came to Las Vegas," says Rabbi Felipe Goodman, who has been chief rabbi since 1998. "The synagogue gave them a place to call their own. Their impact at the time was enormous. Even today, our members are involved in the daily life of the city and state, including gaming and business executives, judges, and political leaders like Las Vegas Mayor Oscar Goodman and Congresswoman Shelley Berkley."

Several movie stars were married at the temple. Many have been known to daven (pray) during Jewish holidays, and their children have had their Bar or Bat Mitzvah there. Sandy Mallin, past president of the temple and 30-year member, says Elizabeth Taylor and Eddie Fisher were married at Temple Beth Sholom in 1959, and last

year actor Tony Curtis appeared during Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year.

"We have had many Hollywood and Strip entertainers attend services over the years who didn't want any recognition," Mallin says. "We've always honored that request. But I can tell you that all the major hotel people back then were members, including Jack Entratter, Mel Exber, Moe Dalitz, Jay Sarno, Jerry Turk, and Steve Wynn. We were a gathering place in the early years for the community. Former U.S. Senator Richard Bryan sent his children to the temple's preschool, as did Michael Gaughan from Coast Resorts."

Temple Beth Sholom was established in 1946 as the first formal Jewish congregation in Las Vegas. The Conservative synagogue began as a modest downtown building at the corner of Carson Street and Maryland Parkway, moved to East Oakey Boulevard where it remained for 35 years, and six years ago moved into an ultramodern, seven-acre facility in the Summerlin area of Las Vegas.


The outer façade of the temple walls are built with Jerusalem stone. A sculpture of a burning bush, symbolic of Israel, greets visitors in the circular entrance. Atop the bush is a perpetual light, symbolizing the ever presence of God. The semi-circular sanctuary is enhanced by 16 stained-glass windows, each reflecting a chapter of biblical Judaica.

The complex houses the Sandra and Stanley Mallin Early Childhood Center, Judy and Ron Mack Religious School, the Solomon Schechter Day School, and the Warsaw Ghetto Remembrance Garden, built with hundreds of stones from the streets of the World War II-era Warsaw Ghetto in Poland. The memorial pays tribute to the six million Jews who died in the Holocaust.




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

## Crazy for Poker



he poker craze keeps growing players are everywhere, and casinos are opening additional poker rooms, remodeling old ones, and scheduling one tournament after another.

In Las Vegas, the downtown **Golden Nugget** relocated its 24-hour poker room to a remodeled, semi-enclosed room that features 10 smoke-free tables with plush seating and first-class service. Amateurs and professionals can buy in daily to the Texas hold 'em tournaments at 11 a.m., 7 p.m., and 1 a.m. For beginners, free poker lessons are held daily at 10 a.m.

Also downtown, **Fitzgeralds** opened the Fitz Poker Room on the second floor with daily no-limit Texas hold 'em tournaments.

At the **Silverton** on the south end of the Strip, free poker lessons are offered Monday through Friday at 9 a.m. in the casino's new nonsmoking, poker room with oversized chairs and plasma screens.

In North Las Vegas, the **Cannery Casino** opened a room with 14 tables that feature low- and medium-limit Texas hold 'em, Omaha, and 7-card stud. Texas hold 'em tournaments are held daily at 10 a.m. Players can walk across the casino floor to Vino's Ristorante and Deli for some great pizza and sandwiches.

opened for the first time in Las Vegas at the old MGM Grand (now Bally's) in March 1980. It was a thrilling beginning to a wonderful and important part of my career.

Over the years, I've played Caesars Palace, the Sahara, the Desert Inn, and the Las Vegas Hilton. I built a great ranch house 25 miles northwest of the Strip and loved living in Vegas. During the day, I played with my 200 animals and at night I crazied up my hair, painted on my makeup, and drove into town to perform.

We had several varieties of exotic chickens, ducks, and geese that ran free in a fenced five-acre area with a pond in the middle. Wild turkeys and migrating Canada geese would drop by for a visit. I loved feeding the flocks, all except for a goose named Jake who preferred Alan.

My favorite time was the years at the Las Vegas Hilton when I starred in "Moulin Rouge." Henry Lewin, who was president of the Hilton, had produced the show and was disappointed when most nights there were more people on stage than in the audience.

To save the show, he asked me if I would

open the production, do my cabaret act in the middle, and close the performance riding Tanya the elephant (we wore identical headdresses and became really good friends).

We sold out two shows a night for most of the three years I was there. It was

thrilling to see the audience lining up each night in the casino.

In 1990, I decided to go back to television and spent seven years with Patrick Duffy on *Step by Step*. Other shows I've starred in include *Candid Camera*, *The Suzanne Somers Show*, and *She's the Sheriff*. I also have written 16 books, of which the latest, *Ageless*, the follow-up to the best-seller, *The Sexy Years*, was released on October 9.

Until now, I've continued performing in theaters and for corporate events and lecturing. Last summer I went to Broadway with my one-woman musical, "The Blonde in the Thunderbird."

I love Las Vegas, whether I'm on stage or in the audience. I have seen most of the great entertainers over the years and have worked with the exceptional ones, including George Burns and Bob Hope. After all these years, I am returning to Las Vegas with a brand-new show. I expect to see my friends from the '80s and a whole new generation. I promise they will leave the show feeling really good and happy they have spent the evening with me.

I never break a promise.

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




## Las Vegas Spotlight

## Louie Anderson

The **comedian**, **actor**, and **author** discusses Las Vegas, his pre-performance mantra, and **blowing off steam**.



he 10th of 11 children, Louie Anderson harbored plenty of angst growing up in a poor Minnesota family. A career in comedy provided the perfect release. "My way of letting off some steam is to go and perform," says the 53-year-old stand-up comic, who appears six nights a week at the Excalibur in Las Vegas.

The struggles that confronted Anderson's family in the Minneapolis projects are the focus of his act, but the 5-foot-11 jokester touches on other topics, such as his battle with his weight. Anderson has written self-help books, including *The F Word: How to Survive Your Family* and *Dear Dad, Letters From an Adult Child.* He also co-founded Homeless Empowerment Relationship Organization (H.E.R.O.), which helps the homeless.

Anderson—former host of the television show Family Fead—splits his time between Las Vegas and Los Angeles, owning homes in both cities. Anderson's parents, Louie and Ora, moved to Carson City in 1973 and retired there. Louie died in 1979 and Ora in 1990. Anderson visited his parents often and dropped dimes in the slots at the Carson Nugget. These days, Anderson is more health-conscious. Having just returned from the gym, Anderson talked to Nevada Magazine's associate editor, Matthew B. Brown, in August.

### What do you like about Las Vegas?

Anybody can come here and have a great time. They can go to the best restaurants, see the best entertainment, and once in a while hit a jackpot that changes their life. That's the exception, but they can stay in a beautiful room, get a chance to be a kid as an adult, and leave their cares and woes behind for a few days. It's everybody's chance to blow off some steam.

### How is life in Las Vegas treating you?

A It's been a little hot. I've had a hard time getting used to that. It's a dry heat. That's what people always say (laughs). It's so hot the devil left three days ago. A hundred's a hundred. I don't care how dry it is.

Speaking of your book, The F Word: How to Survive Your Family, what advice do you have about family dynamics? The thing that's really apparent in families is that they don't change much, and you should stop trying to think that your family can change. Really look at where your family came from. When dealing with your family, make sure your emotional fuel tank is full.

## In 1984, you made your television debut on The Tonight Show with Johnny Carson. What was that like?

To go on a show like that back then, that was it for a comedian. It kind of made your career overnight. I went from making \$500 a week to \$1,000 a night after *The Tonight Show*.

### O you find it difficult to try to be funny every night?

A I know people have taken their time, spent their money, and made the appointment to see me, and I can't afford to not be funny. Right before I go on, I do a little mantra, and I leave my troubles at the base of the stage. I can always pick them up on the way back down when Γm done performing.

### What's your goal as a comedian?

A To make people forget about the problems they might have for that hour that they're seeing me. I'd like them to forget their troubles and woes for that time. People are under a lot of stress in this world. I want you to go out of there going, "Oh, man, I laughed so hard my side hurts."

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
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## 10 Winter Treats

## All's Wells at the Track

Invitational depicts small town's love for chariot racing.

iehards like Kat Owen and Kay Schacht refuse to let the sport of chariot racing vanish in Wells. Each year, on the weekend before Thanksgiving, the small town in northeastern Nevada hosts the Charlie Nannini Invitational, two days of racing that attracts competitors—equine and human—from California, Idaho, Nevada, Utah, Oregon, and Wyoming. Owen and Schacht are president and secretary, respectively, of the Wells Chariot Club, which has organized the event for almost 30 years.

Although spectators can't expect the same heated competition that defined the sport in ancient Greece and Rome, there is still an element of danger. "Those little chariots weigh about 60 pounds," says Owen, 57 who has competed since the inaugural race in 1977

"You can get too close to someone and hook a wheel. I've broken my toe, and I've been trampled. It's fun 90 percent of the time," she says with a laugh.

The invitational is a family event that usu-

ally draws about 200 spectators. "You see some fantastic horseflesh, both large and small," says the 67-year-old Schacht. An announcer encourages spectators to bet on the outcome while teams are lining up to start their race. The event draws 20 to 30 drivers who race their thoroughbreds, quarter horses, and miniature horses on Saturday and Sunday.

In all classes, races start with two or three chariots in a row. Two horses pull one chariot and one driver, and the driver must be in the cart when crossing the finish line. The driver with the best time wins the race, and the driver with the best two-day total is the overall winner of his or her class.

A main attraction to the race is the mini horses. "That's what most people come to

see," Owen says. Owen and Schacht even started a business, Little Bit Stables, raising minis. "Selling the babies is really tough because they are so darn cute," Schacht says.

The event is centered around the racing, but Friday and Saturday nights are about celebrating. Starting Friday at 7 p.m., people gather for a jam session at Luther's Saloon. On Saturday, townsfolk head to the Fourway Casino to listen to live music or a DJ. A shuttle bus is available.

Owen and Schacht have competed in, organized, and donated to the invitational since its inception. They embody the passion that has kept the event running strong for all these years—just like the late Charlie Nannini, for whom the event was named. "He supported it so much," Owen says. Nannini once owned the Fourway, and his son, Mike—an Elko County commissioner—will participate in the mini races this year. It's that sort of dedication that has

kept Wells' chariot-racing tradition a November mainstay in Nevada.

## At a Glance America's Convention Central

n 2005, more than seven million delegates attended conventions in the Silver State, a 5.3 percent increase over the previous year. Nevada is recognized for its state-ofthe art facilities, customer service, unique settings, nearly 180,000 hotel and motel rooms, and for more than 50 years of experience in hosting meetings and trade shows.

Convention and meeting planners can choose from boutique-style venues for wedding parties and family reunions to megacenters for 100,000-plus delegates. An everexpanding variety of locations, atmosphere, and amenities are found in Las Vegas, Laughlin, Mesquite, Reno, Lake Tahoe, and rural Nevada.

Las Vegas

With more than 9.5 million square feet of convention space, Las Vegas offers more meeting facilities than any other city in the world. At the 2006 World Travel Awards in London,



The Reno Convention Center offers 500,000 square feet of meeting space for delegates choosing the area's outdoor adventure, and first-rate amenities, and top entertainment.

Las Vegas and the Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority were recognized by more than 80,000 travel professionals from 200 countries. The Las Vegas Convention Center was named North America's Leading Conference Center, LVCVA was chosen North America's Leading Tourist and Convention Bureau, and Las Vegas was tapped as the World's Leading Gambling Destination.

The number of delegates hosted by the city increased from 5.1 million in

2001 to 6.2 million in 2005. To keep pace with the growth, and a projected 43 million combined convention and leisure visitors by 2009, the LVCVA has begun a \$737-million enhancement program that is slated to be completed by the end of 2010. The project includes new South Hall meeting rooms, a front lobby connecting the North, Center, and South Halls, constructing a 100,000square-foot general session space, and renovating the existing facility. Plans also call for an enclosed connector between the convention center and the Las Vegas Monorail station, police and fire department substations, and a customer-service support center.

Included in Las Vegas' growth spurt are seven new hotels that will add 41,000 rooms to its current inventory of more than 130,000. Trump International (1,282 rooms) and Palazzo (3,025) have completion dates in 2007 Steve Wynn's Encore (2,000) and Cosmopolitan (3,000) in 2008, and City Center (6,800) and Fontainbleau (4,000) in 2009. Echelon Place (5,300) opens in 2010. Numerous expansions are planned at such properties as Planet Hollywood and Las Vegas Hilton. There are changes, too, in the landscape with Columbia Sussex taking over the Tropicana and closure of the venerable Stardust to make way for new projects.

The Colorado River community of Laughlin, located 90 miles south of Las Vegas, is courting SMERF organizations—social, military, education, religious, and fraternal. The area's nine

properties offer more than 125,000 square feet of meeting space and 10,000 rooms.

Loews Hotels has plans for a \$1-billion, 400-room resort at Lake Las Vegas in Henderson. It will feature 40,000 square feet of meeting space, a welcome addition to the city's 200,000 square feet. Upscale Green Valley Ranch has added trolley service to its expanded shopping complex, The District at Green Valley Ranch.

Shuttle service is also available for shoppers at Fashion Outlets in Primm, 43 miles south of Las Vegas on I-15. Three hotels, Buffalo Bill's, Whiskey Pete's, and Primm Valley, the Primm Valley Golf Club, and the Desperado Roller Coaster serve visitors.

Of interest, too, is the progress of The Skywalk at Grand Canyon West, a 4,000-foot high glass foot bridge across a narrow section of the Grand Canyon, 120 miles east of Las Vegas. The bridge, which leads to the visitor center, shops, and restaurants, is scheduled to open January I.

### **Reno-Tahoe**

An adventure place for all seasons, the Reno-Tahoe area appeals to delegates who welcome sophisticated amenities in a comfortable setting and top entertainment.

When completed in 2007 the Peppermill's \$300-million expansion will have more than 105,000 square feet of meeting space, a two-story, 10,000-square-foot nightclub, banquet facilities for 3,000



guests, and concert seating for 4,000.

A \$1.8-billion redevelopment project is underway at Grand Sierra Resort, the former Reno Hilton. Plans include America's largest indoor water park and show, outdoor amphitheatre, and four-level golf driving range.

The Atlantis will add 27,000 square feet of meeting space, doubling its current facility, during a \$50-million expansion project. The project calls for a new sports book, poker room, restaurant, larger spa and fitness center, and a pedestrian skywalk from the Atlantis to the Reno Convention Center.

Aesthetic changes to Reno's downtown landscape are found in the \$282-million ReTRAC Project, which will lower 2.3 miles of railroad track, adding lights to the bridges across the Truckee River, and the Virginia Street Plaza. The plaza offers a seasonal ice rink and a sloped amphitheater.

The Downtown Reno Ballroom, scheduled for completion in summer, will have a 28,000-square-foot ballroom divisible into five sections, a 4,700-square-foot pre-function area, banquet capacity of 1,970 and general assembly of 2,990 guests.

Summit Sierra, a 180-acre live-workplay-shop complex, continues to add dining, retail, and entertainment since its opening in March 2006.

Visitors attracted by first-rate dining and amenities at John Ascuaga's Nugget in Sparks will find a new attraction in spring 2008 when a 1.35-million-square-foot development on the east side of Sparks Marina is completed. The retail and entertainment complex has attracted tenants such as Saddle Ranch Chop House, T Rex: A Prehistoric Family Adventure, and Dave and Buster's.


