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

One of my favorite editor perks is the many new Nevada books that appear on my desk for review (if you want proof, click on "Nevada Books" at nevadamagazine.com).

Recently, I was elated when I opened a package addressed to our editorial department and pulled out a book that highlights mountain-west ghost towns. The timing was impeccable, as days later I would be embarking on a 1,200-mile roundtrip

journey from Reno to Ely with myriad ghost-town stops along the way.

Excited, I immediately flipped to the Nevada chapter, but was disappointed to find multiple pages dedicated to Austin, Goldfield, and Virginia City. I'm sorry, but anywhere you can easily get a burger and a cold beer is not a ghost town.

Anywhere you can buy the wife and kids a souvenir, or fill up your gas tank, is not a ghost town.


There are exceptions to any rule, of course. Take Belmont, one of Nevada's better-known "ghost towns" located in the central part of the state. There are a few businesses there, such as Indian Maggie's Saloon, and a number of homes, but the plethora of decaying structures and ruins in the center of town make it quite worthy of the title.

I suppose that's what the author of the aforementioned book was thinking in

reference to Austin, Goldfield, and Virginia City, but I respectfully disagree with that assertion—proving that there is a degree of subjectivity that plays into the definition of a ghost town.

With that off my chest, one of this issue's features pays homage to some of Nevada's true—or truer—ghost towns. These are the places that take some getting to on dirty, dusty roads and more ruggedly define Nevada's boom-and-bust past. Standing among the half-upright buildings and broken-down machinery is both awe-inspiring and a little eerie (reminding me of a second misconception about ghost towns—the term has nothing to do with the existence of spirits at these sites).

The photo-heavy look at seven Nevada ghost towns (or areas) we recommend visiting is a perfect complement to our 33rd annual photo contest. Also, we introduce a new feature in our *Events & Shows* section—a one-page column, or guide, that highlights the new, traditional, and thematic, so you can mark your calendar from here to Nevada Day.



History and the Supernatural Unite During These October Ghost Walks—and Rides

Many people at the Paul Laxalt Building in Carson City—where the *Nevada Magazine* and Nevada Commission on Tourism offices are located—have an eerie tale to share about the 119-year-old building. Elevators moving on their own, unexplained shadows, and voices in the basement have all been topics of discussion.

It comes as no surprise that many of the city's historic buildings share similar tales of the supernatural. Carson City Ghost Walking Tours, typically the last Saturday of each month, give visitors a chance to visit many of the city's haunted places and learn something about their history in the process (the Laxalt Building isn't on the tour, but drop in with lunch and we'd be glad to show you around). Tickets are \$20 for adults and \$10 for children for the September 25 and October 23 tours. Advanced purchase is suggested. A special Friends in Low Places Cemetery Tour, October 22 at Carson City's Lone Mountain Cemetery, shares the stories of some of the graveyard's inhabitants. visitcarsoncity.com, 775-687-7410

Presumably gripped by the Halloween spirit, a number of northwestern Nevada towns are offering ghost-themed events in October. Haunted Ghost Walks in Minden (October 21), Gardnerville (October 22), and Genoa (October 23-24) join Carson City with healthy helpings of history and the supernatural. historicnevada.org, 775-782-2555

Historic Pahrump and Honest Abe

Although the Town of Pahrump was established less than 50 years ago, the region holds a rich history, which dates to Spanish explorers and Shoshone inhabitants. This history takes center stage at the Pahrump Valley Museum. The museum sits on four acres and includes several historic buildings from Pahrump's early days, antique farming and mining machinery, a southwest garden display with a large variety of cacti, and a recently expanded exhibit hall. The exhibit space features many artifacts from Pahrump's past along with a display dedicated to Yucca Mountain and atomic testing in Nevada, plus one of the finest collections of Abraham Lincoln—he was in office when Nevada was granted statehood in 1864—memorabilia in the country. pahrumnpnv.org, 775-751-1970



It took me three takes to get the shot I was after. I spent another 20 minutes shooting the storm before it stopped, but never came close to getting another shot like that." Kukowski captured the split-second moment on a hillside off of State Route 445 (Pyramid Highway).





Though it's an hour and a half before the first pitch of tonight's Triple-A baseball game, the stadium block is already abuzz. A scattering of children play catch on the complex's grassy lot, sometimes tackling one another in what appears to be a rambunctious mix of baseball and football. Blocked-off side streets and adjacent parking lots are filling fast with tailgaters. Live music pours from a patio overlooking the stadium entrance and, delighted, I walk up a flight of stairs to get a glimpse of the band and rejoice in the sound.

I emerge onto the Freight House District plaza, boxed in by an alehouse, sports bar, and nightclub with an island bar and stage a dominant presence in the open-air space. Family members,





20-somethings, and middle-aged patrons share in the pleasures of food and drink from tables and bar stools. A few college-aged men battle in a furious match of ping-pong, a group of teenagers toss beanbags, and several couples recline in lounge chairs and take in the effervescent mood.

Connected to the ballpark, the newly opened Freight House District—named for a historic building that anchors the project—has quickly become a popular hangout in Reno. This venue, open daily and year

round, is part of an evolving redevelopment concept meant to broaden business opportunity and create jobs in downtown Reno.

Good first impressions can fade fast, though, if not sustained by the prospect of growth. "The goal is to always be developing and to always have something unique," says Ryan Reidel, an operations manager at the Freight House District. "But we're still working out minor kinks and tweaks." Rather than viewing the work-in-progress as a burden, Reidel sees it



as an opportunity to engage the fan base and build the district's brand. "We want to capture people's attention," he says.

The defining vision for the Freight House District entails creating a little something for everyone. Long-term goals include building synergy between the Freight House District and downtown Reno by providing new entertainment choices with each passing block. Cultivating this eclectic appeal is characteristic of Reno's renaissance over the last 20 years.

In that time, the Reno Redevelopment Agency has spent \$176 million on revitalization projects. The result of this investment, funded

through property-tax revenues, can be seen at Reno City Hall, Truckee River Whitewater Park, and West Street Market, among others. By including the ReTrac project, which lowered more than two miles of railroad through downtown, the total investment amounts to more than \$400 million.

All revitalization plans are not created equal, however, and in a time of economic uncertainty, some projects inevitably furrow brows. "I think in the field of economic development you always have [people] that either disagree with the policies...or don't quite understand them," says Peter Wallish, Reno's economic

The venue's opening is one phase of many planned downtown Reno projects over the next several years.

development manager. Addressing this pushback, he says, requires educating the public on the financial structure of projects and their expected benefits.

The \$72-million tag on Aces Ballpark and the Freight House District is funded by a car-rental tax and initial private equity. Future windfalls resulting from an increased tax base will be pumped into new revitalization projects and, ultimately, back into city and county coffers when the redevelopment agency's mandate expires in 2035.

Four extension phases are in the works for the neighborhood sharing the Freight House District name. Mixed-use retail, restaurant, hotel, and housing units are likely additions. A planned first-floor renovation of the National Bowling Stadium is progressing rapidly. This phase is slated entirely for retail development. But much of the area is currently in a "pre-production" stage with specific phases under the control of private developers working with the redevelopment agency. Break-ground dates for many of these initiatives are expected sometime in 2012, though market conditions ultimately determine timelines.

Diversifying a historically tourist-centric economy begins with the belief that each new project contributes to the whole. "The idea, from our perspective, was that the ballpark [opened in April 2009] is a catalyst for redeveloping the entire area," says John Hester, Reno's community development director and redevelopment administrator.

The Freight House District venue is just one addition to the area, but evidence attesting to its influence on revitalizing downtown has already emerged. Owners of the Silver Peak Brewery chain of restaurants opened a pizzeria in the neighborhood in August, hoping to capitalize on the burgeoning draw of the district. In creating a vibrant street life and urban neighborhood—from green parks to clean streets and education centers to entertainment districts—Reno's charm broadens dramatically.

This is confirmed in fan reactions at the Freight House District in May. "We're really excited to have this in Reno," says Keith Thomas, an audio/video specialist

who lives in Truckee, California, a short drive west of Reno. This is the second time in the last month that he and friends have come to Reno to enjoy a night out at the ballpark.

All are big baseball fans, and the opening of the Freight House District has only added to the allure of the experience. "This is nothing but positive for the area, and I'm looking forward to spending more time here," says Greg Jacobsen, an automotive service manager from Truckee and friend of Thomas.

There is a rooting spirit among tonight's crowd. "We'd like to see this succeed," says Pete Nevin, frontman of The Deckheads, tonight's musical act. "This is the perfect spot for a bar and beach band like us." As the bats crack on the field, Nevin jumps back onstage with his band and bursts into a Jimmy Buffet rendition. "It's great to be at the Freight House District!" he screams to a healthy throng of revelers.

The City of Reno hopes that refrain reverberates long beyond this night. ▾

RENO IN THE MAKING

By the end of 2010, ground is expected to break in Reno on a gasification and materials reclamation plant—the first of its kind in the United States—which will produce clean energy and remove hundreds of tons daily from the city waste stream.

Plans to convert the U.S. Post Office building downtown into a retail center are moving forward. Construction of a new post office site will coincide with these developments.

Near-term redevelopment and revitalization projects in Reno also include expanding the River Walk district and extending the Truckee River Whitewater Park. A pedestrian corridor connecting the downtown sector with the University of Nevada is in the design stages. And a proposed gateway project along this corridor would include mixed-use retail and housing developments.

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

The eccentric George Whittell Jr.'s legacy reverberates at this popular Lake Tahoe waterside attraction.

Imagine owning 27 miles of Lake Tahoe's beautiful shoreline encompassing more than 40,000 acres. Sound impossible? Not if your name was George Whittell Jr., the former owner and resident of Thunderbird Lodge, now an intriguing Nevada tourist attraction.

The son of a wealthy San Francisco couple whose families made their money from the California Gold Rush, Whittell was born into extravagance on September 28, 1881. An adventurous, sometimes defiant spirit defined Whittell from an early age—from African safaris to serving in World War I and ill-advised marriages to the high-society party scene, his was a life only imaginable for the absurdly rich. His love for high-stakes poker games and fast cars and boats, in addition to his collection of wild animals, quickly turned him into an icon. Much of his life was shrouded in mystery, rumors, and speculation.

After the stock market crash of 1929, Whittell was able to acquire an extremely large amount of inexpensive land on

Lake Tahoe's east shore south of present-day Incline Village in what is now Lake Tahoe Nevada State Park. He purchased the land from the Carson and Tahoe Lumber and Fluming Company and several other landholders in the area. In 1937, he began construction of his summer home, the Thunderbird Lodge. After the lodge was completed two years later, Whittell would spend every summer thereafter enjoying his lakefront estate.

All of the materials used to build the lodge were acquired locally to ensure that it melded with its natural surroundings. In addition to the main lodge, several other buildings grace the property, including the Card House, Elephant House (where Whittell kept his enormous pet, Mingo), Lighthouse, Gatehouse, and Boathouse.

The Boathouse contains Whittell's wooden speedboat, the *Thunderbird*.

The *Thunderbird* is one of the most famous boats to cruise the pristine blue waters of Lake Tahoe. Designed in the

image of a DC-2 aircraft, it's 55 feet long and constructed from double-planked mahogany and brushed stainless steel. Originally powered by twin 550-horsepower V-12 Kermath engines, the vessel

could reach a speed of 60 knots (almost 70 mph). In 1962, Whittell sold the boat to Bill Harrah, who restored it and replaced the Kermath engines with two 1,100-horsepower V-12 Allison aircraft engines. Harrah called the boat “a 70-mph cocktail lounge.” Today, the boat is owned by Foundation 36 (a nonprofit dedicated to preserving Nevada’s historic treasures) and has been returned to its original home at the Thunderbird Lodge. This year marks the 70th anniversary of the *Thunderbird*.

Late in Whittell’s life, the State of Nevada used eminent domain to confiscate large tracts of Whittell’s land to form Lake Tahoe Nevada State Park. Whittell sold 9,000 acres, which became Incline Village, to developers, donated land to the University of Nevada, Reno for research, and gifted a large tract to St. Mary’s hospital. After Whittell’s death in 1969, his remaining lands were sold to invest-

In the same vein as another fanatical Nevada figure, Howard Hughes, George Whittell Jr.’s reclusive tendencies came out in the lodge’s design. The estate included a 600-foot-long main tunnel that allowed him to move stealthily from room to room. At one point, the tunnel comes to a “y,” the right branch leading to the Boathouse, while the left is no longer a viable route.

ment banker Jack Dreyfus, who then sold large parcels to the United States Forest Service. By 1998, all that remained was 145 acres surrounding Thunderbird Lodge. In a federal government land-swap transaction, the acreage transferred into the public trust, and the Thunderbird Lodge Preservation Society assumed ownership of the historic buildings.

Designated a National Historic Site, Thunderbird Lodge hosts 10,000 visitors a year and is open for seasonal tours and special events year round. Tours can be taken by land or water. By land, visitors meet at the Incline Village Crystal Bay Visitors Bureau for a short bus ride to the lodge. The tour takes visitors on a journey into the extraordinary life of Whittell. Guests get to see the main lodge, the *Thunderbird* boat, secret underground tunnels, the Card House, and more. They

also hear exciting stories about Whittell’s brief stint as a teenager in the Barnum & Bailey Circus, his pet lion, Bill, and the shenanigans that transpired around the lodge’s legendary poker table. The tour is conducted by the knowledgeable docents of the Thunderbird Lodge and available from late May to mid-October, Tuesday to Saturday. Private tours are also available year round for groups of 15 or more.

Woodwind Cruises and the Get On Tahoe Water Shuttle offer waterborne options to gain access to the lodge from the north and south shores. On a roughly five-hour tour, Woodwind’s vessel, the *Tahoe*, departs from the south shore and includes continental breakfast, an en-route narrated tour of the east shore, a Thunderbird Lodge tour, and lunch. Get On Tahoe’s boat, the *M/V Blue Warrior*, departs from the north shore and features

coffee and breakfast pastries, a tour of the lodge, and beautiful views of Sand Harbor and the palatial homes of Lakeshore Drive in a three-hour tour. Both boat tours are available roughly June through early fall.

The Thunderbird Lodge also provides one of the most scenic and unique places to host a special event. With more than 3,000 square feet of interior space, the lodge is equipped to handle weddings, meetings, and conferences. The 1,500-square-foot conference room and 1,800-square-foot Lighthouse Room (with a large commercial kitchen) can accommodate smaller events.

Perhaps one of the most intriguing events at the lodge is its winemaker dinners. Four times a year, Lake Tahoe's best chefs are paired with California's best winemakers for an unforgettable evening. Winemaker dinners are set in the Lighthouse Room, where patrons are treated to panoramic views of the lake while they relax and enjoy an extraordinary dining experience. Wolfdale's Cuisine Unique and White Cottage Ranch wine will be featured Sunday, September 19, and Bistro 7 and Wines of Italy will be featured Sunday, October 17. Tickets for both dinners can be purchased at thunderbirdlodge.org.

"We're all here because of the history," says Thunderbird Lodge's executive director Bill Watson. "Our goal is to turn visitors into patrons." ▀

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mackay mansion reborn

Tourists and history buffs are again flocking to the spiffed-up former residence of Comstock silver king John Mackay.

A tour of The Mackay Mansion Museum reveals many nuggets of Virginia City history. Perhaps the most fascinating is learning of a system of underground tunnels that once led from John Mackay's home to a number of businesses in town.

After a four-year hiatus, the museum reopened for tours on May 1. We are lucky enough on this day to be escorted around the property by the man behind

the mansion's renaissance, Octavio A. Cresta, and his publicist, Wendy St. Martin. Cresta shows us what appears to be an average white wall in a storage room on the mansion's bottom floor. Behind the sheetrock, Cresta says, is access to the tunnels, once used primarily by deliverymen for transportation of goods and messages.

Cresta's temporary acquisition of the

property is indicative of how communication has changed since the 1800s. Consider how he got the idea to lease the 150-year-old mansion until 2014. "I ran into Brian Bills, the owner, through craigslist and fell in love with the property," Cresta says.

Craigslist.org, a popular classifieds website, connected Cresta to a key piece of Virginia City's past and a popular worldwide history attraction. "We've had a great response [to the mansion's reopening]—hundreds of people have

come through," Cresta says on a sunny June day. "We just had a group of journalists from all over the world—Germany, Canada. It's getting great reviews."

Leasing the classic home was the perfect opportunity for Cresta to mingle his Incline Village antiques business, Uniquities, with the home's original decorations. "I brought some of the antiques from my gallery," says Cresta, a 24-year Nevada resident. "I had to fix and clean up the whole house and paint in several areas...the whole parlor was redone."

MORE VIRGINIA CITY HISTORICAL ATTRACTIONS

Fourth Ward School Museum

Erected in 1876 to house more than 1,000 students, this school graduated its last class in 1936. Today, art exhibits, oral history lectures, and scholar-in-residence programs are available for visitors and residents.

LEC #1 Comstock

Firemen's Museum

Founded in 1979 by Virginia City's volunteer Fire Department, this museum displays 19th-century firefighting equipment. Liberty Engine Company No. 1 is still an operating volunteer unit.

Piper's Opera House

Built in 1885 and still in use,

Piper's Opera House has

undergone extensive restoration. Show attendees at Piper's can watch for ghosts who are said to attend many of the performances.

St. Mary's Art Center

Dating to 1876, the building was originally established as the St. Mary Louise Hospital by the Sisters of Charity and Bishop

Patrick Manogue. Today, the art center offers year-round lodging and art instruction, including watercolor, acrylic, oil, pastel, and photography.

St. Mary's in the Mountains

Virginia City is home to a number of beautiful churches reflective of late-19th-century culture. St. Mary's was rebuilt by Bishop Manogue following the Great Fire of 1875. Currently, the church



paper articles mentioning Mackay are framed for reading in the hallway.

On the museum's bottom floor, the dining room is decorated with a set of gold plates and goblets of the day, as if Mackay or George Hearst—father of William Randolph Hearst and the home's original owner—were set to entertain guests in a matter of hours.

The museum has its share of rustic items, from an old fire-fighting wagon to myriad household items of the period (stoves, sewing machines, laundry soap, etc.). Our tour ends outdoors at the site of the home's original Chinese laundry; it amazes me that the structure has withstood so many grueling Nevada winters. The original assayer's office, independent of the mansion, is still standing and in good condition.

According to Cresta, the office-turned-home-turned-museum first opened for tours more than 50 years ago. Like many old Nevada buildings, there are rumors of the paranormal associated with the Mackay Mansion.

The most famous story concerns actor Johnny Depp. While filming the movie "Dead Man," Depp stayed in Mackay's former bedroom. He supposedly saw a ghostly apparition in the form of a little girl dressed in white, which other people have claimed to see in the house. There is also speculation of a floating elderly lady, a colonel, and a woman who ambles up and down the staircase.

Are the ghostly tales true? On his website, Cresta invites you to the mansion to judge for yourself. ▀

Cresta's tender loving care shows from the inside out. The lush, landscaped grounds and party terrace can accommodate up to 400 persons for reunions, concerts, cultural events, and fundraising galas. The grand gazebo has provided a wonderful ambiance for numerous weddings held at the Mackay Mansion throughout the years.

The mansion's mystique, however, is within the home. A stroll through its confines is eloquent, rugged, and a little bit spooky all rolled into one. When you walk into the stylish rooms, you get a feel for how absurdly rich Mackay was. The title of "Boss of the Big Bonanza" came with it a then-unfathomable net worth of about \$100 million (by today's standards, Mackay would be worth more than \$2 billion—the same as Oprah Winfrey).

Mackay moved into the mansion, originally built in 1860 as the Gould and Curry mining offices, after his residence was destroyed in the city's Great Fire of 1875. He relocated to the International Hotel in 1877.

The Grand Parlor on the middle floor of the Italianate-style mansion claims the original fireplace and overhanging mirror, the frame of which is plated with gold. Benches, chairs, dressers, chandeliers, tables, curtains, frames—all are 1800s-style and either original mansion pieces or dating to that era.

The narrow, steep "hanging staircase" leading to the third floor gives you a genuine taste for how architecture has changed over the years. There is an old phone in one of the rooms and an equally old toilet on display—for gazing at only. Old news-

holds weekly mass and features a museum displaying numerous artifacts and photographs. Read a story about the church on nevadamagazine.com.

Storey County Courthouse

The Storey County Courthouse, built in 1876 after being destroyed in the Great Fire of 1875, is the state's oldest continuously operating courthouse. Built in Italianate style, the two-story seat

of government houses a two-tier jail containing the Silver State Peace Officers Museum.

V&T Railroad

Visitors can board the historic Virginia & Truckee railway in Carson City and arrive in Virginia City the way folks did in yesteryear. The Virginia City depot is located a short walk from The Mackay Mansion Museum.




Since it was established in the early 1930s to house workers who were building Boulder Dam (now Hoover Dam), Boulder City has existed in a self-imposed time warp, a small crystal of tradition and propriety in the loose sands of the Mojave Desert. The contract to build Hoover Dam meant that Ragtown, a dusty tent city perched on a hill overlooking the Colorado River, would become a utopia of brick buildings, parks, and schools.

By the time Hoover Dam was dedicated in 1935, Boulder City had become an international tourist attraction and primary source of electrical power for Southern California. The same is true 75 years later. The Hoover Dam Visitor Center, a short drive east of Boulder City, is open daily except Thanksgiving and Christmas. Visitors can explore one of our country's engineering marvels on a tour available through the Bureau of Reclamation. The new Hoover Dam Bypass—officially the Mike O'Callaghan-Pat Tillman Memorial Bridge—is scheduled to open to traffic in November. It will provide an alternative route across the Colorado River and relieve

the stress one million annual visitors put on the dam's existing road.

Lake Mead, the product of Hoover Dam, offers numerous recreational opportunities from a sunset ride on Lake Mead Cruises' *Desert Princess* paddlewheeler to a weekend houseboat excursion with Forever Resorts. Boat races, fishing tournaments, and an increasing number of competitions such as the annual Pumpkin Man Triathlon take advantage of the clear blue waters. Just south of the dam, Boulder City Outfitters offers kayakers and boaters the opportunity to enjoy hot-springs waterfalls amid the sheer cliffs of Black Canyon. Black Canyon Adventures offers launch permits, guided raft tours, and boat, kayak, and canoe rentals.

Bootleg Canyon Mountain Bike Park attracts pedal pushers from around the world. If you aren't ready to "end-over," you can zipline from peak to base at speeds up to 50 mph with Bootleg Canyon Flightlines. Boulder City is also a hub for "flightseeing" tourism, skydiving, and paragliding. The Boulder City Airport added a \$9-million terminal where visitors can pick up a souvenir or book flights to Hoover Dam and other nearby attractions through various

tour companies. For more sedate outdoor adventures, hike, bike, or ride horseback on the 35-mile River Mountains Loop Trail that runs through Boulder City, skirts the edge of Henderson, and loops back alongside Lake Mead. The trail was recently recognized as a National Recreational Trail.

History buffs will enjoy a day—or night—trip to the historic Boulder Dam Hotel, now a bed and breakfast, which has hosted numerous movie stars, among them Clark Gable and Carole Lombard. The recently renovated property features a delightful restaurant and a series of gift shops, including an outlet for the local art guild and a small museum that is open daily.

A few doors down another historic gem, the Boulder Dam Theatre, opens for special events and shows. The property is owned and restored by Desi Arnaz Jr., son of Desi Arnaz and Lucille Ball, who honors his famous parents with a small display of artifacts in the hotel windows. The theater hosts dance-school recitals, musical performances, and the annual Chautauqua and Dam Short Film Festival.

In the quaint downtown area, brick houses dating to the 1930s line streets




named for the states with waters that drain into the Colorado River: Arizona, California, Colorado, Nevada, New Mexico, and Wyoming. At the center is Bicentennial Park, used for numerous festivals, including the 4th of July parade, Wursthfest, Art in the Park, and Santa's Electric Light Parade.

Although Boulder City is one of only two Nevada communities to prohibit gaming, liquor was legalized within the city limits in 1969. One of the earliest bars, The Backstop, offers guests a free drink "any day the sun doesn't shine."

Milo's Cellar and Sidewalk Café attracts patrons with its fresh sandwiches and salads and extraordinary wine at bargain prices. Owner Milo Hurst recently added a bed and breakfast with a charming private courtyard and koi pond. "People come to town [for an event], and they are looking for a good glass of wine at a great value,"

Hurst says. "That is the type of customer we want to attract."

Next door to Milo's, Tony's Pizza has added a sit-down section. The adjoining outdoor-seating area blends into Milo's, letting patrons mix and match their dining choices. Parents often share a bottle of wine and a cheese platter with a neighbor while the kids split a pizza. Close by, beer aficionados can enjoy sandwiches, week-end live music, and locally brewed libations at Boulder Dam Brewing Company (for more Boulder City dining options, visit nevadamagazine.com).

Just past the Nevada Southern Railroad Museum on Yucca Street, which offers 45-minute rides on Pullman coaches most Saturdays and Sundays, is the Fisher Space Pen Company. Fisher pens have accompanied numerous manned space flights. The factory hosts a small storefront that

is open weekdays until 4 p.m. and offers engraving services.

Boulder City's blend of sophisticated dining, world-class outdoor activities, open scenery, and historic intimacy make it a fine stop on any tour around Nevada. "Boulder City is a very special place," Hurst says. "It's real. If someone passes by and doesn't stop to take a look, they'll miss out." ▽

Having written a lot of “Cravings” articles during my time at *Nevada Magazine*, I’ve had the pleasure of dining in a great array of Nevada eateries. From over-the-top opulent to greasy spoon and everything in between, I’ve lifted a fork in every corner of the Silver State.


An unfortunate side effect of all this culinary travel is that a restaurant rarely surprises me anymore. Enter The Slanted Porch in Fallon, an environmentally conscious eatery that seems as if it were plucked out of a trendy urban neighborhood and dropped into charming, laid-back rural Nevada.

This unassuming converted 1908 residence could easily be mistaken for a home if not for its sign. The building was renovated and expanded by owner Steve Hernandez and his wife, Peggy, over a three-year period. The loving detail that went into remodeling the century-old building is also present in the food. “I am

a farmer/restaurateur,” says Hernandez, who is also the chef.

Hernandez got his start in the San Francisco restaurant scene after graduating from California Culinary Academy in 1996. In his Fallon venture, which opened in June 2008, Hernandez has combined his top-rate education with his upbringing as the grandson of Mexican migrant farmers. “My grandmother cooked on a wood stove with the freshest produce and meat you can imagine,” he says. “She literally plucked it right off the farm.”

Often still covered in dirt, potatoes for The Slanted Porch’s delectable homemade potato chips come from Fallon’s Workman Farms (the original purveyor of the nationally acclaimed Hearts O’ Gold cantaloupe). Spinach and other salad accoutrements make the less-than-four-mile trip from Lattin Farms (known for its farmers’ markets and family-favorite corn maze). Beef is hand-selected by Hernandez from the H5 Ranch, also in Fallon. “You see the immediate impact on the local farmers and ranchers when you buy products

from them,” Hernandez says.

Equally important to Hernandez’s restaurant ethos is the impact—or rather lack thereof—that getting meals to his customers has on the environment. “I’m trying to reduce my carbon footprint as a restaurant and minimize the fossil fuels used to get food to the table,” he says. Produce and meats from across town require a negligible amount of fuel to transport compared to products trucked from California. To this eco-friendly end, The Slanted Porch uses biodegradable compostable to-go containers, composts whatever food waste possible, and sells grease to an area biofuel company.

The farm-to-table movement has been sweeping across the country in recent

years as restaurants and individuals become increasingly aware of where their food is coming from and its environmental impact. As Hernandez puts it, a big part of the movement is “making people aware of how they eat and what is going into their bodies.” If what people are putting into their bodies is food from The Slanted Porch, then they are off to a good start. Up to 75 percent of each dish offered has traveled a shorter distance to get to the restaurant than many of its patrons.

Lunch usually sees a full dining room and several people milling around the door waiting for to-go orders. The draw? More than 20 creative sandwiches and salads that could turn even the staunchest carnivore. Sandwiches include everything from the simple (the Alternate 95, a BLT with avocado), to the American classic (a half-pound local Angus cheeseburger), to the inspired (the Pinion with roast beef, green chilies, and dill havarti cheese). Sandwiches come with a fresh, local side salad or homemade potato chips, and the burger comes with homemade fries. Lunch salads are as popular as the sandwiches. The favorite spinach salad includes avocado, bacon, chopped hard-boiled egg, sunflower seeds, and onion and is drizzled with a warm sweet bacon dressing.

If The Slanted Porch stopped at lunch, it would still rank as one of my favorite Nevada eateries, but dinner on Fridays and Saturdays secures its position as a top contender. The simple, seasonal menu is complemented by a plethora of nightly specials, providing the opportunity for every visit to be new and exciting. Shrimp Catalan comes in a cast-iron pan with bubbling olive oil, roasted garlic, and red chilies. While not local, the plump juicy shrimp appetizer is a great start—make sure to save some bread to dip in the remaining sauce.

Main dishes—such as local, hand-selected T-bone steak with asparagus and steak fries drizzled in homemade bleu cheese sauce (opposite page)—are treated with a degree of care and attention uncommon at most restaurants. I have never been a big fan of T-bones, and I have dined in some of Nevada’s best steakhouses, but I rank this steak among my all-time favorites. From the seasoning—complementing while not overpowering—to the top-quality beef, every bite is better than the last.

The Slanted Porch owes that consistency to Hernandez’s philosophy of serving the freshest local foods available—a philosophy that is as good at winning the hearts of diners as it is at running an environmentally responsible, sustainable restaurant. ▀

WHAT’S IN A NAME?

During the restoration of The Slanted Porch, one of owner Steve Hernandez’s friends pointed out that the porch was noticeably slanted toward the street. While this is an intentional design feature that allows water to drain away from the building, the episode proved memorable enough to give the restaurant its moniker.

“The biscuits and gravy are the best in Northern Nevada,” says Paul Carlson as he exits the Courtyard Café & Bakery. Talk to many Fallonites, and they will likely share Carlson’s sentiment about one or more of the restaurant’s dishes.

Since opening in December 2008, the Courtyard Café has built an impressive local following, and it’s no surprise why. “We pride ourselves in homemade food, baked and made fresh daily,” says owner Deb Nelson. “Fresh food just tastes better.” Nelson takes full advantage of produce from local outlets such as Lattin Farms and Workman Farms and is constantly searching for fresh, in-season fruits and vegetables from small farms in California.

Making a bad selection from the menu would be mission impossible, but some other dishes that stand out alongside the biscuits and gravy are hot cinnamon rolls, a ham sandwich with sliced apple and cheddar cheese, and the Southwest Omelet (pictured above).

The melt-in-your-mouth cinnamon rolls are served fresh from the oven and lightly drizzled with homemade frosting. The ham sandwich with sliced apple and cheddar is served on grilled raisin bread, giving it a unique, Zen-like balance between salty and sweet. The accompanying salad with tangy homemade vinaigrette is unbelievably fresh and worthy of meal status all by itself. The fluffy, surprisingly light Southwest Omelet comes piled high with fresh homemade salsa, sour cream, and avocados. Spicy sausage and bell peppers combine for a complex but not overwhelming spice, and creamy Monterey Jack cheese seamlessly pulls everything together. ▀

california trail tale

My great-great-great uncle, Oliver Goldsmith, trekked across Nevada with other hopeful 49ers.

His adventure began as a lark, but by March 1850 it was over. My great-great-great uncle, Oliver Goldsmith, returned from the California gold fields on a sailing ship and stumbled down the gangplank at the harbor in New York City. He was wracked by fever and wrapped in a piece of quilt to ward off the biting wind.

He had less than \$50 in gold dust in his pocket, enough to pay for a room, haircut, coat, and a ticket home to Detroit. Goldsmith was 21 in the winter of 1848, when gold was discovered in California. He joined a wagon train of 50 fortune-seeking young men and left for the Land of Gold.

Most of these so-called “Forty-niners” never found the riches they dreamed of, but, unlike Goldsmith, many stayed in the West and established ranches and businesses in California, Oregon, and eventually Nevada. The majority of the 250,000 travelers on the 2,000-mile California Trail in the years between 1841 and 1869 were families seeking a better life. They left their homes and all that was familiar for the promise of land, not necessarily mineral wealth.

As many emigrants did, Goldsmith wrote about his journey. Most information about the great American Western migration comes from handwritten, often misspelled diaries. In 1896, Gold-

smith published *Overland in Forty-Nine*, his recollections of traveling the California Trail, and gave hardbound copies to his family and friends.

It is a remarkable account and tells of the hardships endured by equally remarkable people. His trip took up to four and a half months. The first portion of the trail, from Missouri through what is now Nebraska, Wyoming, and either Idaho or Utah, depending on the route taken, was difficult enough.

Wagons broke down and had to be repaired; rivers had to be crossed. Travel was slow, and valuable time was spent hunting game and gathering cooking fuel. Many emigrants were felled by cholera.

In August, the travelers reached what is now Nevada, during the hottest, driest time of the year. Goldsmith’s group took the route to Salt Lake City from Fort Bridger, Wyoming, crossed Bidwell Pass, and trekked south of the Ruby Mountains. They joined the main California Trail at the Humboldt River near present-day Carlin.

Goldsmith wrote: “The thick, powdery, alkali dust on the roads through

these lands was terribly hard on both animals and men. It was so thick that the drivers kept as far from the cattle as possible and often could not see them though less than ten feet away. The poor creatures coughed constantly...After a few days’ march down the river (which we called ‘three hundred miles from source to sink’) we gave up traveling by day and tried it by night, it being much more endurable when the hot sun was not beating down upon us.”

FOLLOWING THE HUMBOLDT

Nevada’s Humboldt River figures largely in the settlement of the Western United States and the expansion of the Union from coast to coast.

As welcome as it was, the river was shallow, muddy, and foul—very unlike the deep, swift-moving waterways the pioneers were used to. “When your life depends on animals to travel from Missouri to California,” says ranger Gary Koy of the California National Historic Trail Interpretive Center near Elko, “you had to have grass and water to feed them. That’s why places like the 40-mile desert or the salt flats were such hardships.

“Meanest and muddiest filthiest stream,
most cordially I hate you.”

—Emigrant Leander V. Loomis, 1850 (about the Humboldt River)

Without the Humboldt River, the history of the world might be very different today.”

The aforementioned Interpretive Center overlooks the spot where travelers on the Hastings Cutoff (the deceptively named “short cut” taken by the ill-fated Donner Party) from Salt Lake City rejoined the main trail at the Humboldt River.


A few miles farther down the river, the trail divides into two: south of the Humboldt, the Carson River Route went through what is now Fallon to Eagle and Carson Valleys, and the northern Truckee River Route arrived in Truckee Meadows, where Reno is today. In both cases the travelers had to cross the 40-mile desert before facing the final barrier: the Sierra Nevada.

Although the emigrants left their homes behind, they took their values with them. They elected leaders and agreed on rules and regulations, Koy says, and when they arrived, they formed mining and grazing associations and organized schools and churches. “The California Trail story is really the story of making a decision, the family decision to leave home and go somewhere else,” he says. “They heard that in California and Oregon good farmland could be had, and they could get there by wagon. It is the little band of river in front of [the Interpretive Center] that made the trip to California possible.”

ON TO THE GOLD FIELDS

Goldsmith and his band followed the Humboldt on its northern bank. He and a fellow native of Michigan, Al Frary, grew impatient at the slow pace. They decided to leave the wagon train against the party’s advice. They each had a good horse, but only to carry their supplies. They walked through day and night, pausing only briefly.

At first, they made good time, figuring they covered 72 miles in 26 hours. Goldsmith wrote: “Continuing our journey down the Humboldt we came to where there was a road to the north, leaving the old Fremont ‘Trucky River Trail’ to the left. At this fork of the road a notice was posted

on a stick, stating that the Sacramento River was but one hundred and fifty miles from this point, by way of Lassen’s Pass... This cut-off, as we called it...proved to be the very opposite...We started on this northern trail [also known as the Applegate Trail to Oregon, which leads through Nevada’s Black Rock Desert and High Rock Canyon] with the rest of the emigrants.”

Goldsmith describes the increasingly difficult travel for wagon trains as oxen and mules had to be abandoned due to lack of feed and water: “The wagons were many of them occupied by women and children. The giving out of so many teams necessitated first lightening of the loads, then leaving the wagons behind and [keep]ing only such things as were absolutely essential to life itself...The road soon became strewn with cattle, horses and mules, dead and dying.”

Goldsmith fed most of his bread to his horse to keep her alive. The hours ahead were the most horrendous of the journey. He continues in his book: “The last ten miles I was about used up and could hardly put one foot before the other...I

would drop down occasionally to rest, but my thirst would become so perfectly unbearable that it would urge me on.”

He and Frary finally reached the Sacramento River after weeks of trudging through Nevada deserts and mountains and the rain-soaked forests of Northern California. They endured scurvy and hunger. Grizzly bears robbed what little food they had. Goldsmith panned for gold and worked as a cook. He made, in the end, about \$400—the amount he originally started with.

Disillusioned, Goldsmith went by sea from San Francisco to Panama, where, to top it off, he caught Chagres malarial fever. He walked across the isthmus and then sailed to New Orleans and Cuba, arriving at last in New York. Reunited with his family in Michigan, they naturally were curious to know: After two years in the gold fields, had he made his fortune?

Goldsmith held up a five-dollar gold piece and a penny and replied, “Perhaps I have; this is all I have to show for it now, but in experience I have more than a wagon can hold.”

CALIFORNIA NATIONAL HISTORIC TRAIL INTERPRETIVE CENTER

The California National Historic Trail Interpretive Center, operated by the Bureau of Land Management eight miles west of Elko off Interstate 80, has views of the Humboldt River Valley and the South Fork of the river, which look very much like they did in the 1840s.

The center is open Wednesday through Sunday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. through September 6 and will open for the 2011 season on May 27. Between

those dates, tours can be arranged, and the meeting room can be reserved for groups. The center's grand opening

is tentatively planned for May 2012. At that time it will be open year round.

At the attraction, visitors learn about daily life on the California Trail, its various cutoffs and alternate routes, the effect mass migration had on American Indians, and the trail's importance to the development of the West. Interactive



displays allow children to try on period-style clothing and experiment with games that emigrant youth played.

Among the exhibits are murals depicting the various portions of the trail from Missouri to California, dioramas of camp with life-sized figures of emigrants cooking, playing music, and socializing, and a cutaway wagon packed with travel essentials. One mural is a replica of names the travelers carved at Record Bluff in Nevada, about

15 miles south of the Idaho state line.

The center's front plaza has a winding map of the California Trail and various sub routes inlaid into stone pavers, weaving in and out of a water feature representing the Humboldt River. Sandstone walls support bas-relief sculptures, which depict scenes on the trail and quotes from emigrant diaries. The plaza is used for special events, such as the annual California Trail Days event in May. ▾

CALIFORNIA TRAIL DAYS

Visitors can pet an ox's huge head and taste camp beans at California Trail Days, the annual celebration of the pioneer experience at Elko's California National Historic Trail Interpretive Center in May.

Events are free and include black powder firearms demonstrations, Dutch-oven cooking, Civil War reenactments, American Indian demonstrations, gold panning, old-time music, living history wagon encampment, and California Trail history presentations.

Full-sized covered wagons, camp tools, American Indian foods and baskets, antique firearms, and kids' traiside toys are displayed on the plaza and inside the center. The 2011 Trail Days is scheduled for a Friday and Saturday in May. elkotraildays.com, 775-738-1849

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SEPTEMBER

4, 1908 - A disastrous fire sweeps through Rawhide, devastating the mining boomtown.

5, 1960 - Actor John Huston rides to victory in Virginia City's first official Camel Races. Fifty years later the annual event is still going strong, as competitors and spectators will gather in the historic town on September 10-12, 2010.

12, 1959 - NBC debuts the television series "Bonanza," which enjoys a 14-year run. The program's Nevada set, the Ponderosa Ranch in Incline Village, was a huge tourist attraction until it was sold in September 2004.

14, 1862 - Decorated U.S. Army officer Jesse Lee Reno, for whom the City of Reno is named, dies in the Battle of South Mountain in Maryland and Pennsylvania.

28, 1881 - George Whittell Jr. is born in San Francisco. Construction of the wealthy eccentric's Lake Tahoe estate, Thunderbird Lodge, is completed in 1939. Today, the lodge, on the lake's eastern shore, is a popular tourist attraction.

30, 1935 - President Franklin D. Roosevelt speaks at a formal dedication ceremony in Boulder City to honor newly constructed Boulder Dam (now known as Hoover Dam).

OCTOBER

2-3, 1915 - Three strong earthquakes within about seven hours disturb a large portion of Northern Nevada. The third tremor has an estimated magnitude of 7.75. It destroys and seriously damages many adobe houses from Pleasant Valley north to Winnemucca.

12, 1874 - Classes begin at the University of Nevada in Elko. The university moves to Reno in 1885, the same year Elko opens the state's first high school.

12, 2007 - Nellis Air Force Base in Las Vegas begins operating its solar photovoltaic system, which is one of the largest in North America.

15, 1997 - ThrustSSC (Super Sonic Car) sets the World Land Speed Record (766 mph) in the Black Rock Desert and breaks the sound barrier, on that day calculated at 748 mph (this measurement varies based on weather and altitude).

27, 1986 - Great Basin National Park is established.

Adam Bradley

Reno

Adam Bradley, 38, is what is called a thru-hiker. A pioneer in the relatively unknown sport of fastpacking (a seemingly masochistic union of backpacking and trail running), he holds the current speed record on the 2,650-mile Pacific Crest Trail at a mere 65 days, nine hours, 58 minutes, and 47 seconds—21 hours faster than the previous record. While substantially shorter in distance than this transcontinental adventure, Bradley recently underwent a Nevada trek of far greater significance.

In the energy-hungry world in which we live, people rarely take the time to think of what it takes to power our homes, offices, shopping centers—basically, our lives. With the support of the Nevada Wilderness Project, Bradley set out in the spring to follow the path of the planned Southwest Intertie Project Transmission (power) Line from southern Idaho to the Harry Allen substation, north of Las Vegas, 501 miles away. Bradley's objective for the 15-day trek was to route the intended path to help the aforementioned conservation group determine the impact the line will have on the landscape and wildlife.

Bradley's "SWIP" trip, as he came to call it on his blog, took him through some of Nevada's most rugged, iconic terrain; over lofty mountains, across parched valleys, even up craggy rock faces. "[It was] a once-

in-a-lifetime opportunity for me," he says in a recent story in the *Las Vegas Review-Journal*. When completed, the line will deliver energy from geothermal, solar, and wind sources to Southern Nevada, making it, as John Wallin, director of the Nevada Wilderness Project puts it, "the backbone of Nevada's clean-energy economy."

Bradley's journey underscores the very reason the advancement of such green-energy initiatives is so vital for Nevada, the nation, and the world. As the default stewards of the planet's fragile ecosystems,

we must ensure that the evolution of human progress does not irreparably harm the land that supports us and be mindful of the environmental cost of things we consider necessities. Bradley says it well in summing up his trans-Nevada march along the route that will soon support a virtual electrical and economical artery: "Every time I flip on the light switch at home, I'm now considering the journey that my power takes to get to me."


IN MEMORY

Kenny Guinn

Las Vegas

August 24, 1936 – July 22, 2010

Former Nevada governor Kenny Guinn served two terms from 1999 to 2007. The once superintendent of Clark County schools was a champion of education and was responsible for Nevada's popular Millennium Scholarship program, which resulted in more than 21,000 Nevada students receiving money to pursue higher educations.



He also successfully shepherded Nevada through the largest tax increase in the state's history, which was praised as "controversial but realistic" by *Time*. In 2005, the same magazine named Guinn one of the five best governors in the country. "I am both shocked and saddened to hear of the...passing of a true Nevadan," said U.S. Senator John Ensign in a July press release. "It's nearly impossible for me to put into words what this one man has meant to me and the people of Nevada." Guinn is survived by his wife, Dema, and two sons, Jeff and Steve.

PAINTER

Wayne Scarpaci

Gardnerville

Wayne Scarpaci encountered his first United States Navy ship when he was one year old. A Navy dependent, he was bounced from Guam to Washington D.C. and San Diego as a child. During this time, he spent many



hours aboard various Navy vessels. From an early age, Scarpaci, now 60, had a passion for painting those ships. "I remember standing in a hobby shop [in about 1957], awestruck, admiring Scott Eidson's...art of the *USS New Jersey* and saying to myself that someday I was going to paint ships like that," he says.

"Someday" has come for Scarpaci. The Gardnerville resident has published three books about battleships, which feature photos, histories, statistics, and his paintings of the ships. His next book will feature Nevada's ships, including the *USS Nevada* (BB-36 is pictured), *USS Carson City*, and *USS Minden*. artbywayne.com

Jerry Lewis

Las Vegas

It is likely that as many people associate the name Jerry Lewis with the Muscular Dystrophy Association as with the entertainer's seven decades of acting, singing, and comedy. That's because for 45 years, Lewis' name has been synonymous with the MDA Telethon. As the MDA National Chairman, Lewis has been instrumental in raising more than \$1.5 billion since the telethon began in 1952. Lewis, a Las Vegas resident for 25 years, has been the chairman since the organization's inception in 1950. The first televised telethon was in 1966.

MDA combats neuromuscular diseases through programs of worldwide research, comprehensive medical and support services, and far-reaching professional and public health education. MDA has more than 200 offices in the United States, sponsors more than 200 hospital-affiliated clinics, and supports more than 330 research projects around the world. Boulder City

His work—which includes silver, gold, and gemstones—has won numerous awards at shows such as the Santa Fe Indian Market in New Mexico, the largest such show in the world. Ghost Towns

You could spend a lifetime visiting Nevada's many deserted—or nearly deserted—settlements.

Ghost towns have always captured my imagination. As Indiana Jones-obsessed children, my brother and I relished the opportunity to roam around the ruins of abandoned settlements in the Nevada countryside. And while my Harrison Ford role-playing days are over—mom took away the whips almost immediately after we got them, and I still can't pull off the fedora—I am still drawn to these deserted outposts.

Luckily for me—and all inquisitive Nevada travelers—the Silver State is home to the remains of hundreds of former towns. Some are little more than crumbled foundations or a picked-over garbage heap, but others

have stood more steadfastly against the ravages of time and Nevada's harsh elements to provide unique glimpses into a time long passed, but not forgotten. Following are some of the Silver State's most interesting, well-intact, and accessible ghost towns.

If you choose to follow our tire tracks, or create your own, here are a few things to remember to ensure that you have a safe, enjoyable trip:

† Many of the towns still maintain small populations, so please respect the residents and private-property signs.

† The derelict buildings you see are historical artifacts that depend on visitors to help preserve them—leave no trace, and take only memories and photos home with you.

† Most ghost towns are on infrequently traveled dirt roads. While two-wheel drive vehicles can easily reach them, they are remote. Start with a full tank of gas, and carry extra water and a spare tire.

† Only a few of Nevada's ghost towns can be accessed with the use of a standard state map. Most require a detailed Nevada road atlas, available at many bookstores and grocery stores throughout the state.

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RHYOLITE

Location: Four miles west of Beatty via State Route 374

THEN

Rhyolite was born in early 1905 following the discovery of gold in the Bullfrog Hills to the west of the town site. By 1907, the crude camp had grown into a bustling city complete with electricity, water mains, telephones, newspapers, hotels, banks, and even a stock exchange. Estimates put the town's peak population anywhere from 5,000 to 8,000 residents. Financial panic in late 1907 started Rhyolite's bust period, and the town never recovered. By 1909, new ore discoveries had ceased. A year later the banks had closed, and the town claimed only 675 residents. By 1922, the population had dwindled to 14, and in 1924, Rhyolite's last original resident died.

NOW

Rhyolite's handful of buildings and ruins, proximity to Beatty and U.S. Highway 95, and the Goldwell Open Air Museum make it one of Nevada's most visited ghost towns. The Bottle House—built by Tom Kelly during the town's heyday, using roughly 30,000 bottles—is one of Rhyolite's most unique attractions. Other partial structures include the two-story school, three-story Cook Bank Building, and the Las Vegas and Tonopah Railroad Depot. While it does not date to the early 1900s, the museum is as much a part of Rhyolite's draw as the town itself and consists of the works of seven artists, a visitor center, and the Red Barn Art Center. Beatty, about four miles away, has food, gas, accommodations, and services and is a great base camp for a visit to Rhyolite. rhyolite.org, rhyolitesite.com, goldwellmuseum.org, beattynevada.org

NELSON


Location: 40 miles south of Las Vegas
via U.S. Highway 95 and State Route 165

THEN

Local legend maintains that American Indians, Spanish explorers, and Mormon settlers had mined the Eldorado Canyon district near Nelson for more than 150 years before miners from nearby Potosi made significant discoveries in 1861 at the Techatticup Mine. Born from those finds, Nelson's predecessor, Eldorado, was a tough and lawless camp almost 200 miles from the nearest sheriff. Nelson emerged more than four decades later at the head of the canyon. An explosion at the town's smelter in 1909 started a two-decade period of inactivity until production resumed in the 1930s. Increased costs of labor heralded the town's demise in the 1940s.

NOW

A handful of original buildings and some photogenic, rusted cars remain at the site of Nelson, but the primary draw to the area is Techatticup Mine. Eldorado Canyon Mine Tours has excavated part of the old mine and restored some of the original buildings and offers hour-long tours. For more information about Nelson, Eldorado Canyon, and the Techatticup Mine, visit nevadamagazine.com. Nelson is close enough to Las Vegas to make a single-day trip from a Strip hotel, but for a more laid-back stay, Boulder City is a great base for a Nelson visit—and closer. eldoradocanyonminetours.com, bouldercitychamberofcommerce.com

BELMONT

Location: 45 miles north of Tonopah
via U.S. Highway 6, State Route 376, and S.S.R. 82

THEN

Silver was discovered in the Toquima Range in late 1865, and the ensuing rush in 1866 marked the beginning of Belmont. With an abundance of wood, stone, water, and clay readily available, the town grew quickly. In 1867, the Nye County seat was moved to the booming town of 2,000—at the time, the second-most populous city in Nevada behind Virginia City. Belmont experienced a slight decline beginning in 1869 but recovered quickly following further ore discoveries in 1873. Construction of the Belmont Courthouse was completed in 1876, a strong indication of the perceived permanence of the community. Mining spiked again in 1883, but the boom was short-lived. The mining boom in Tonopah at the turn of the century drew most of Belmont's remaining residents, and in 1905 the county seat was moved to that community.

NOW

More than a dozen original buildings hang on in Belmont, and the pièce de résistance, the Belmont Courthouse (a State Historic Park), is worth the visit alone. Its well-preserved exterior belies the reality that it has been abandoned for more than a century. Inside, graffiti dating to the 1890s make the building truly unique among Nevada attractions. The property has hosted an unknown multitude of squatters, the most notorious of which spent a few weeks there in the summer of 1969. A doorway on the first floor bears the only concrete evidence of their visit and reads, "Charlie Manson + Family 1969," the "o" replaced with a peace symbol. Call 702-486-5125 days in advance to set up a tour of the interior.

Two saloons and a handful of residents call Belmont home today, and all rely on solar power. The saloons are open sporadically, and there are no services in town. Tonopah is the nearest place to find food, gas, and lodging. parks.nv.gov/bc.htm, tonopahnevada.com

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Berlin

Location: 20 miles east of Gabbs
via State Routes 361 and 844

THEN

Silver was discovered in the Shoshone Mountains in 1863, resulting in the birth of Union, a camp a mile south of the future site of Berlin. It was not until 1896 that Berlin itself started to develop. Though the town boomed from 1898 to 1908, its population never exceeded a couple hundred residents. By 1911, the town was completely abandoned. Some of the residents are interred in the cemetery below town.

NOW

Though by no means a big player in Nevada's early mining scene, Berlin stands today as one of the state's best preserved and most visited ghost towns with a well-intact mill (pictured at right) and a handful of original buildings. Fittingly, another underground discovery has helped to preserve Berlin and protect it as a State Park. Following the discovery of fossilized ichthyosaur (a large Triassic-period marine reptile) remains, the area was designated as a State Park in 1957. A large enclosure a few miles from Berlin gives visitors the opportunity to view some of the fossils via a 40-minute guided tour, offered daily Memorial Day through Labor Day and weekends until the second Saturday of November. The Diana Mine Tour is available Fridays and weekends through late September. Call 775-964-2440 for more tour information. There is a campground in the park, but no services. Food and gas are available in Gabbs, but it would be wise to stock up on supplies in Austin, Fallon, Hawthorne, or Tonopah before a visit to Berlin-Ichthyosaur State Park.

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Ione

Location: 25 miles east of Gabbs via State Routes 361 and 844

THEN

Ione was the first town born of the discovery of silver in the Shoshone Mountains, which came to be known as the Union District and later supported towns such as Berlin and Union. The current site of Ione was first populated in 1863. By February 1864, Ione was named the seat of newly created Nye County. The town boomed over the next couple of years but in 1867 lost the county seat to Belmont. Ione experienced varying levels of prosperity until it fell off sharply around 1880.

NOW

Ione has retained a small population since its founding and still boasts 41 residents, according to the sign (which also reads “The Town That Refused to Die”) as you enter town. Many original buildings remain, and its proximity to Berlin-Ichthyosaur State Park—six miles away—make it easily accessible and well worth a side trip. As with Berlin, the nearest food and gas are in Gabbs, and supplies and accommodations are available in Austin, Fallon, Hawthorne, and Tonopah. austinnevada.com, fallontourism.com, mineralcountychamber.com, tonopahnevada.com

Candelaria


Location: 61 miles west of Tonopah via U.S. Highway 95

THEN

Although they were reportedly known since as early as 1863, the veins of silver in the hills around what would become Candelaria were not tapped on a large scale until 1873. Thereafter the town boomed into the early 1880s when it reached a population of about 1,500, the largest town at the time in Mineral County. At its height, Candelaria supported hotels, breweries, a school, a telegraph office, saloons, and a branch of the Carson and Colorado Railway. Lawlessness and harsh conditions ruled the town, which started to decline after a fire in 1883, ironically not long after a waterworks was built. The town rebounded briefly in 1890, but was abandoned by 1892.

NOW

The stark, treeless landscape at the site of Candelaria has not changed much in the last 150 years. Substantial rock ruins, including those of the bank (pictured at right), remain along with some wooden structures and a cemetery. A nearby abandoned open pit mine is a reminder that new mining processes often turn a profit from ore that was once thought to be tapped out. Keep your distance from the pit, as the sides are not stable, and it is a long way to the bottom. No services are available in Candelaria. Gas and some food are available in Mina, 21 miles north, but Hawthorne and Tonopah are also options for supplies, accommodations, and a greater variety of dining. mineralcountychamber.com, tonopahnevada.com





HAMILTON

Hamilton Area

Location: 47 miles west of Ely via U.S. Highway 50 and White Pine County Road 11

THEN

During their heyday, the handful of settlements clustered in the northern part of eastern Nevada's White Pine Range topped out at almost 20,000 residents. Rich lodes of silver discovered on and around Treasure Hill late in 1867 led to the birth of the settlements of Belmont Mill, Eberhardt, Hamilton, Shermantown, Treasure City, and a handful of smaller camps. Despite the rough climate (some of the towns were at elevations greater than 8,000 feet) the area thrived—Hamilton, the center of the district, grew to be one of Nevada's largest cities with more than 10,000 residents and was named the White Pine County seat in 1869. Treasure City, the district's second largest, reached a population of nearly 6,000. By 1870, the district started to decline, and devastating fires in the 1870s and '80s sounded the death knell for Hamilton, Treasure City, and most of the Treasure Hill mining district. Spared from the fires that claimed the rest, Eberhardt prospered into the 1870s, but declining production eventually spelled its demise in the 1880s.

NOW

Ruins dot the hills and valleys all around the former Treasure Hill mining district, most notably at Hamilton and Belmont Mill, where a number of original structures—such as the mill itself—still stand. Hamilton and Belmont Mill are easily reached, but the remains of other towns take some route finding and more serious off-road driving to get to. Dirt roads twist and tangle across the region, making it difficult to reach some of the sites, so visitors hoping to see places such as Treasure City and Shermantown should be prepared to spend some time trekking. The closest services are in Ely, 47 miles east of the Hamilton area via U.S. Highway 50. elynevada.net

let's get physical

If ever there were two months made for the adventurous in Nevada, September and October fit the bill.

For starters, *Nevada Magazine* Associate Editor and veteran marathoner Charlie Johnston has your 26.2-mile options covered in our Spotlight story on Page 54. From Lake Tahoe Marathon Week in late September to Rachel's E.T. Full Moon Midnight Marathon in August 2011, runners have their choice of challenges across the state. There are also a number of shorter-distance runs available, such as the 14-mile race in Fallon on September 18.

Late summer and early fall are also popular for triathlons. The Aflac Iron Girl Triathlon takes place in South Lake Tahoe on September 19, but Southern Nevada is the place to be for triathletes, beginning with the Amica Lake Las Vegas Women's Triathlon in Henderson on September 11. That same day, Boulder Beach hosts the Sunset Racing Triathlon, then the Mountain Man Triathlon on September 26. If competitors haven't got their fill, the triathlon madness continues with Boulder City's Pumpkin Man Triathlon on October 22-23. If you prefer swimming only, check out the Endurosports Swim Race, held in Boulder City on October 16.

The RTC Viva Bike Vegas, on October 9, offers cyclists three options: 110-, 50-, and 23-mile rides. The 110-miler will send riders over the new Hoover Dam Bypass, expected to open to vehicular traffic in November. Northern Nevada is the hub, though, for bicycle rides, with such events as Tour De Tahoe—Bike Big Blue on September 12, the Tahoe Sierra Century Bike Ride and Great Lake Tahoe Bike Race on September 25, U.S. Highway 50's OATBRAN (One Awesome Tour Bike Ride Across Nevada) from September 26-October 2, and Fallon's No Hill 100-Mile Bike Ride on October 2. The Big Blue Adventure series (bigblueadventure.com) organizes other adventure races as well.

Keep in mind that registration closes sometimes weeks or months before these types of events. Find the individual listing in the proceeding pages for contact information.

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nevada



going the distance

Nevada's marathons range from quirky to flashy and everything in between.

The air is warmer and heavier than I imagined it would be at midnight in the middle of the Nevada desert. A full moon is rumored to lie somewhere in the sky above, but heavy thunderheads block its light. My body is telling me it's time to sleep, and I couldn't agree more. The only problem is, my bed is a 26.2-mile run away.

The E.T. Full Moon Midnight Marathon is quintessentially Nevadan—remote, tough, and a little odd. The small race (the full marathon draws about 100 participants) follows fabled State Route 375—the Extraterrestrial Highway—near the town of Rachel, famous for its proximity to the Nevada Test Site and secrecy-shrouded Area 51. Everyone from serious competitors to alien fanatics attend the mid-August event, which also includes a half marathon and 10K.

While a midnight, alien-themed marathon on a desolate desert road is not

for everyone, Nevada is home to nearly a dozen marathons that offer something for every runner. Take the Lake Tahoe Marathon, September 26, perhaps the most strikingly beautiful race in the country. The course runs along California State Route 89 on the west shore from Tahoe City to the lake's southern end and epitomizes the small, friendly, local-race atmosphere—complete with a beachside awards ceremony. Lake Tahoe Marathon Week features myriad running and outdoor events, including a half marathon, 10K, 72-mile ultra marathon, cycling, and kayaking. Don't let the scenery lull you into believing this is like other marathons. At more than 6,200 feet above sea level and with two grueling climbs, the Lake Tahoe Marathon is one of the most difficult in the region. "My legs almost fell off!" jokes Truckee's David Bunker of his experience during the race.

The Hoover Dam Marathon, October

30, lets runners take in some of Lake Mead National Recreation Area's finest scenery while passing through several historic railroad tunnels. By utilizing the paved River Mountains Loop Trail and packed dirt paths, the route avoids vehicle traffic.

Few marathons cross state lines, especially among the super-sized states of the West. The Mesquite Marathon, November 20 in Southern Nevada, crosses two—the Utah-Arizona and Arizona-Nevada lines. The fast downhill course and cool fall temperatures combine for a great beginner's race or a potential personal record for veteran runners.

Valley of Fire State Park is home to some of Nevada's most stunning vistas, and there are few ways to appreciate it more fully than on foot. The Valley of Fire Marathon, November 20, takes in some of the park's best sights such as Rainbow Vista and Fire Canyon lookout. If you're not running for a PR (personal record),

consider bringing a camera to capture the otherworldly beauty of the park's red sandstone formations.

If you've ever run a marathon, odds are you are familiar with the Rock 'n' Roll Series. From San Diego to Philadelphia, the races are renowned for their great crowds and live music at practically every mile. In its second year, the Rock 'n' Roll Las Vegas Marathon, December 5, is Nevada's largest race and the only way to run the Strip without being locked up for impeding traffic.

Calico Racing's Running From An Angel Marathon, January 8, 2011, and Running with the Devil Marathon, in late June, follow the same course from Lake Mead's Boulder Beach along Lakeshore Drive and the northwestern corner of the lake. The first takes place in ideal running conditions during Southern Nevada's mild winter, the second in summer when course temperatures can soar above 100 degrees, adding an entirely new challenge to an already difficult endeavor. Race director Joyce Forier suggests running both to see how the heat affects your run.

The Red Rock Canyon Marathon, March 5, 2011, was named *Runner's World* magazine's Race of the Month in March 2009. The out-and-back course lives up to the prestigious accolade with breathtaking scenery as it follows the scenic loop through Red Rock Canyon National Conservation Area—only minutes from the Las Vegas city limits.

The Labor of Love, April 9-10, 2011, is a two-day running festival that features a marathon, three ultramarathons (any distance greater than 26.2 miles), and more races in Lovell Canyon and the Spring Mountains just west of Las Vegas.

Northern Nevada's only marathon (the Lake Tahoe Marathon is technically in California) is Reno's Rock-n-River in early May. The flat, fast course starts and finishes under the Reno Arch and follows the Truckee River through Reno and Sparks. ▀

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



Franktown Meadows Equestrian Facility

hunter derby comes to nevada

High-caliber horse competition and fundraiser canters into the Reno-Carson City region.

Historically, elite hunter derbies have been associated with the east coast, but the owners of Franktown Meadows Equestrian Facility in Washoe Valley are determined to change that. On September 19, the inaugural \$25,000 Franktown Meadows Hunter Derby will take over the grassy complex that lies between Reno and Carson City near the foothills of the Carson Range.

The event is important on two fronts: competition and philanthropy. The derby will be a stand-alone event of the United States Hunter Jumper Association (USHJA) International Hunter Derby Series and benefit the efforts

of Parasol Tahoe Community Foundation, a nonprofit charitable organization in Northern Nevada. Competitors and spectators (either sponsors or those who pay to attend the champagne brunch) will enjoy great food and exhibits for all ages.

Franktown Meadows' Aimee LaFayette says the competition has a stroll-in-the-park feel to it, and that the course features—such as brush, logs, and stone walls—are reminiscent of the English countryside.

The hunter discipline originated in England in the 1850s and requires technical training. "It takes a special type of horse to gallop across an unfamiliar field and be brave enough to jump these types of fences—which are four feet high," LaFayette says.

Bobby Murphy, who will manage the Franktown Meadows Hunter Derby, sits on the Horse Show Management Committee and High Performance Committee for the USHJA. "The discipline of hunters is deeply rooted in tradition," he says. "Looking at old photos of brave horsemen soaring over stone walls and other natural obstacles in perfect form and style will give chills to just about anyone."

Lynne Garnett, whose mom, Janice MacLean, built the Franktown Meadows Equestrian Facility in 1989, says her late mother would have appreciated the stature of this event. "Our family has always made horses a part of our lives, including participating in many national hunter-jumper shows," Garnett says. "Really nothing of this caliber has ever been showcased at our facility, or even on the West Coast." ▾


