REPORT.

To the Honorable the Board of Commissioners for the Care of the Indigent Insane of the State of Nevada :

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to present to you the fourth detailed report of the Nevada State Insane Asylum, the present report being for the biennial term of 1887-8. The tables of statistics are so full and complete, that all of the facts concerning the institution, and its management, may be readily ascertained.

IMPROVEMENTS.

The permanent improvements, since my last report, consist in the erection of a laundry, refrigerator, flume, pump house and necessary appliances for hoisting and conveying water to the Asylum.

LAUNDRY.

The laundry is a brick building attached to the boiler house. It is 20 feet wide and 60 feet long, covered with corrugated iron. Near the center of the roof are two openings for the escape of vapor, each about three feet in diameter. In these openings are placed two large sheet iron pipes, each provided with a projecting cover so arranged that neither wind nor rain can enter, but through which the steam can easily escape. The floor is of concrete, the surface of which is as smooth as marble. It is easily kept clean and will last for years. The building is supplied with a Johnson steam washing machine, propelled by a two-horse power Risdon automatic engine, which receives the steam from the main boiler. Around the room are ranged many large stationary tubs, into which steam is conducted through iron pipes for the purpose of heating the water. The room also contains a large iron tank in which soap is manufactured. Taken as a whole, this constitutes a commodious and convenient laundry, by means of which all of the clothing and bedding belonging to the Asylum can be cleansed in a short space of time and with slight outlay of labor. This was an improvement greatly needed. The old laundry being inconvenient and entailing a great amount of labor on both laundryman and patients. Another bad feature of the old laundry was that the steam escaped into many of the rooms on the second floor, there being no proper escape for it, greatly damaging the walls and ceilings, and was a source of annoyance and discomfort to the occupants of the building.

REFRIGERATOR.

A refrigerator has been constructed in one corner of the old laundry. Its walls are of rustic and are double with a four-inch space between, which is filled with sawdust; over this is a covering of zinc. With this refrigerator meats can be preserved in the hottest weather. It has been a great convenience during the last season.

FLUME.

The flume is a substantial structure over a mile in length and has a capacity for six hundred inches of water. The water from this flume is discharged into a Leffel wheel, which is situated in the pump house, and is connected with a tripple-plunger pump, which is capable of forcing from three to four thousand gallons of water per hour into the large tank which is near the Asylum.

PUMP HOUSE.

The pump house in which this wheel is placed is situated on the bank of the river about five hundred feet from the Asylum. It is a substantial frame building and is nineteen feet wide, thirty-nine feet in length and is thirteen feet high, is finished with rustic nicely painted and presents an attractive appearance. Since the construction of these works the supply of water has been abundant and at a trifling cost to the State, and has rendered the building comparatively safe from fire, as the pump can be started in a moment at any time and the supply of water is inexhaustible.

GAS.

We still use the gas manufactured on the place from gasoline. It is not a satisfactory means of lighting the building. In my opinion electric lights would be preferable.

LIVE STOCK.

The inventory of live stock remains about as given in my former report. The number of each kind produced, killed and sold may be ascertained by reference to the Asylum books.

FARM AND GARDEN.

During the past season about 350 tons of hay was cut upon the Asylum farm, and the garden produced a greater supply of vegetables than during any previous season since the land was brought under cultivation. The present report will show the exact amount of each vegetable raised.

APPARATUS.

To the apparatus on hand at the beginning of the term we have added some surgical instruments, a galvanic battery and a Harvard operating chair. We now have all of the articles of this class which will be required at the Asylum for some time to come.

REPAIRS.

With the increase of age the cost for repairs of an institution necessarily increases. This being the case, we have been forced to expend more coin and labor for this purpose during the last, than during the preceding terms. We have painted and whitewashed the building wherever needed, have repaired sewers, re-laid floors, replaced brick around steam boilers, and have had the same repaired. The fences, barns and everything connected with the farm and buildings, will be found in as good a condition as could reasonably be expected.

EMPLOYMENT.

During the past term, as formerly, we have endeavored to furnish all those who were able to perform labor, with some useful employment. We have kept two teams, most of the time, hauling brush, which has been cut by patients on neighboring ranches. This has not only kept the patients engaged, but has greatly aided in saving fuel. Other patients were engaged in making road between the Asylum and Reno, making walks and digging trench for sewer on State University grounds. With the above-mentioned, and those that were employed in laundry, kitchen, etc., thirty-three per cent. of all our patients have been engaged in some form of labor, greatly to their advantage.

DEATHS.

During the term twenty-four deaths have occurred, twenty males and four females. This is an average of $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. for the whole number treated. During the past term no patient has died of acute disease, except one man who was brought to the Asylum with cerebral congestion, far advanced, his stupor gradually increasing till time of death, which took place one week after admission. Of the remaining twenty-three, seven died in paralytic dementia, five of phthisis pulmonalis, one of brain softening, one of dropsy following liver and kidney disease, one of old age and the prostration produced by repeated partial strangulation of an immense inguinal hernia, two of apoplexy, and one of senile gangrene. During the six years past, no case of typhoid fever, dysentery or any other disease, that could be chargeable to either impure air or water, has been contracted by any inmate of the institution. This is certainly sufficient time in which to test the character of the water furnished by the Asylum wells, and makes a strong showing in its favor, as typhoid fever has afflicted numbers of persons in the surrounding country every year since the patients were brought from Stockton, and this year has assumed almost an epidemic form. The wisdom of your Honorable Board, in arranging for the bountiful supply of delicious and healthful water, must be apparent. All authorities agree in charging water with being the great disseminator of typhoid fever, and kindred diseases. If this theory is correct, then the difference in cost, between a pure and impure supply, should never influence the guardians of public health in favor of the latter.

AMUSEMENTS.

The Saturday-night dances have been kept up most of the time, and church services have been held occasionally. We have procured a magic lantern, and are organizing an orchestra, and hope to be able to arrange for amateur theatrical performances. With these, added to our former means of entertainment, we will be able to present something of interest two or three evenings during each week.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS.

I desire most cordially to thank your Honorable Board for the great and constant interest you have taken in the institution, every thing having been furnished the management necessary for the health and comfort of the unfortunates under your care.

My thanks are also due to Mr. W. L. Bechtel, our able clerk and supervisor, for having correctly and promptly performed his duties; to the employes who have discharged their labors faithfully; to the press for the liberal supply of papers, periodicals, etc., donated to the patients; to the Opera House Brass Band for music furnished on several occasions, which was greatly enjoyed and served to break the monotony of Asylum life.
