Board Moves Forward with Regulation Changes

At the NSBAIDRD January meeting, board members agreed to move forward with changes to the Nevada Administrative Code, Chapter 623 (NAC 623).

In accordance with Nevada law, a public hearing and workshop will be held before the board adopts any changes to NAC 623. The public hearing and workshop will be held during the March 8, 2006 board meeting. The official notice was posted in January. To download the notice, including a complete copy of the proposed changes, please go to the "Board Meetings" page of the board Web site, nsbaidrd.state.nv.us/board_meet.htm.

The board is proposing housekeeping changes to NAC 623.310, "Determination of practice as a principal." It is also proposing limiting use of the title "principal," to Nevada registrants.

Proposed amendments for NAC 623.740, "Use of corporate or fictitious names," will implement requirements for firm names that the board applies currently. The changes will require that firm names using plural terms for the professions (i.e. "architects") have at least two of these professionals employed with the firm. The changes will also clarify that the board may deny

approval of a firm name if the proposed name is potentially misleading to the public.

Changes proposed for NAC 623.750, 755, 760, 763 and 766 will allow registrants to electronically seal, sign and date plans, specifications and documents. As outlined in the last issue of Focus, this change will clear the way for building departments to begin allowing electronic submittals of plans. Electronic submittal of plans will be implemented as each jurisdiction's building department chooses to move forward. Changing the NAC will not require building Continued on Page 2.

NCARB News

New monograph published

NCARB recently published *Senior Living*, the 18th title in its monograph series. This nuts-and-bolts guide provides the information needed on a wide variety of senior living options. It outlines eight major building types and the challenges associated with senior living communities:


assisted living residencies, dementia/ Alzheimer's care, independent/residential living apartments, continuing care retirement communities, and active adult communities.

Bradford Perkins, FAIA, the founder of Perkins Eastman Architects, and other architects in the firm wrote the monograph. Perkins Eastman Architects, based in New York City, has designed hundreds of housing and care environments for the elderly. Stephen A. Kliment, FAIA, an architectural journalist and adjunct professor at the City College of New York, is also an author.

Perkins said, "The increasing numbers of older people, combined with changes in the way these people want to live their later years and their expectation of higher quality of life, are creating the need for new care and housing options. Thus, new ideas about senior care and housing have developed the look of these environments not simply as health-care facilities but as seniors' homes."

Senior Living includes chapters dedicated to special equipment and technologies, international challenges, interior issues, energy/environmental challenges, and evolving concepts. Each chapter includes charts, pictures and floor plans to complement the ideas and content.

Completion of the monograph and two accompanying quizzes is worth 20 PDUs in health, safety and welfare. The monograph can be ordered from the

Updated ARE starts February 27

Starting Feb. 27. 2006, an updated version of the ARE, *ARE Version 3.1*, will be administered. The new exam reduces the number of vignettes from 13 to 11. The *ARE Version*

3.1 site zoning vignette combines the former site analysis and site zoning vignettes. The new site design vignette combines the previous site parking and site design vignettes.

A new practice program and updated *ARE Guidelines* can be downloaded from the NCARB Web site at www.ncarb.org/are. New study guides are also available for purchase. The updated graphic study guide reflects the changes to the number of vignettes and the allotted test time of each division resulting from the release of the *ARE Version 3.1*. The questions contained in the new multiple-choice study guide do not significantly differ from the previous versions.

NCARB seeking monograph authors

NCARB is looking for authors for its next series of monographs. The targeted

audience is registered architects with some familiarity of the subject matter. Monographs are not intended to be introductions to the subject.

The monographs include:

Older Buildings: An analysis of buildings built before 1950, including their systems, materials, maintenance, repair/restoration, adaptive reuse, and the challenges that exist in ensuring their continued viability.

Project Delivery Methods: Covers all architectural and construction delivery methods available to owners for the design and construction of a project. Discussions will include: project delivery methods regarding leadership, communication, contractual responsibilities, project management, on-site supervision, scheduling and budget impacts, and a matrix of pros and cons.

Sustainable Design, Part II: Introduces existing rating systems for sustainable buildings, specifically LEED. The monograph should cover design approach, team selection, economics, products, levels of achievement, rating system, process, and resources.

departments to begin accepting plans electronically.

The new language will not *require* electronic seals; it will allow registrants who choose to seal, sign and date their documents electronically to do so. Registrants can continue to use an original signature and stamp or seal if they prefer. The language will also allow registrants to use a combination of electronic and original stamp, signature and date. For example, a

registrant may electronically seal and date his plans, and apply an original signature.

The board is proposing amending its formal hearing procedures in NAC 623.945 by implementing deadlines for submitting certain documents.

If the board adopts these changes at its March meeting, the new regulations must be filed with the Secretary of State. They will be effective 45 days later.

Enforcement Actions

(October 27, 2005 - January 11, 2006)

Inquiries are routinely sent both registrants and non-registrants for alleged violations of



the Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) and Nevada Administrative Codes (NAC). There were nine cases this period that resulted in disciplinary action. Additionally, one case was closed this period because there was no basis for the allegations or the complaint did not fall within the board's jurisdiction.

The following cases were closed by means of settlement agreement. As part of the settlement, respondents agreed to assure discontinuance of illegal acts. Should the respondent be involved in a subsequent case and found to have again violated a NRS or NAC, the case may be used as an aggravating factor.

Failure to Act Within the Unlicensed Practice Standard of Care

Case No. 05-011R

The allegations against Scott A. Carter (Reg. No. 3708) are that he violated NRS 623.270.1(c)(f) and Rule of Conduct 5.5 by not acting within the normal standard of professional care generally exercised by other members in the profession of architecture and residential design, and by making misleading and/or false statements to his client regarding the status and completion of custom home plans. The matter was resolved by settlement agreement incorporating an admission of guilt, probation for one year, restitution to the client, an administrative penalty of \$3,500 and investigative costs in the amount of \$2,500.

Holding Oneself Out

Case No. 06-006N

The allegations against Michael R. Carlson and Carlson Studio Architecture are that they allegedly held

themselves out as being able to provide architectural services, without having a certificate of registration issued by the board, in violation NRS 623.360.1(a)(b). The matter was resolved by settlement agreement incorporating a "No Contest Clause," an "Effect on Licensure Clause," an administrative penalty of \$2,500 and investigative costs in the amount of \$1,500.

Case No. 06-016N

The allegations against Richard T. Burns and **Design Collective**, **Inc.** are that they allegedly held themselves out as being able to provide architectural services, without having a certificate of registration issued by the board, in violation NRS 623.360.1(a)(b). The matter was resolved by settlement agreement incorporating a "No Contest Clause," an "Effect on Licensure Clause," an administrative penalty of \$2,500 and investigative costs in the amount of \$1,000.

Case No. 05-015N

The allegations against Fred Barlow and **Building Technologies of Nevada, LLC** are that they held themselves out as being qualified to practice architecture and residential design and engaged in the practices of architecture and residential design, without having a certificate of registration issued by the board, in violation of NRS 623.360.1(a)(b)(c). The matter was resolved by settlement agreement incorporating an admission of guilt, an administrative penalty of \$1,500 and investigative costs in the amount of \$1,000.

Case No. 05-19N

The allegations against Rex E. Ramsey and Ramsey Architectural Group are that

Case No. 05-40N

The allegation against **Kenneth Gruskin** and **Gruskin Group** is that they allegedly engaged in the practice of architecture and registered interior design, without having a certificate of registration issued by the board, in violation of NRS 623.360.1(c). The matter was resolved by settlement agreement incorporating a "No Contest Clause," an "Effect on Licensure Clause," an administrative penalty of \$18,000 and investigative costs in the amount of \$1,400.

Case No. 06-007N

The allegations against **Albert R. Luper** and **Worship Concepts, Inc.** were that they held themselves out as being qualified to practice architecture and engaged in the practice of architecture, without having a certificate of registration issued by the board, in violation of NRS 623.360.1(b)(c). The matter was resolved by settlement agreement incorporating an admission of guilt, an administrative penalty of \$8,000 and investigative costs in the amount of \$1,700.

Case No. 06-014N

The allegations against **Thomas P. Cox** and **Thomas P. Cox Architects, Inc.** were that they allegedly held themselves out as being qualified to practice architecture and engaged in the practice of architecture, without having a certificate of registration issued by the board, in violation of NRS 623.360.1(a)(b)(c). The matter was resolved by settlement agreement incorporating a "No Contest Clause," and "Effect on Licensure Clause," an administrative penalty of \$21,500 and investigative costs in the amount of \$1,300.

Case No. 06-18N

The allegation against Michael L. Prifti, John E. Thrower and Bower Lewis Thrower Architects, Ltd. is that they allegedly engaged in the practice of architecture without having a certificate of registration issued by the board, in

violation of NRS 623.360.1(c). The matter was resolved by settlement agreement incorporating a "No Contest Clause," and "Effect on Licensure Clause," an administrative penalty of \$10,000 and investigative costs in the amount of \$1,500.

NCIDQ News

2008 exam eligibility requirements clarified

In January 2004, NCIDQ announced changes to the eligibility requirements for the NCIDQ Examination. The biggest change requires individuals who begin their work experience in 2008 or later complete that experience under a licensed/registered interior designer, an NCIDQ certificate holder, or an architect who offers interior design services. This change was implemented because NCIDQ believes "supervised practice is an

essential component to protect the public's health, life safety and welfare."

Some NCIDQ member boards were concerned that the new requirement would present a hardship for some exam candidates. In response, NCIDQ implemented an "alternate supervision" clause.

The "alternate supervision" policy is designed for individuals who are unable to meet the 2008 requirement for supervised experience. Individuals must demonstrate that the requirement presents a hardship due to remote location, health or financial issues or other reasons. For alternate supervision to apply toward exam eligibility, an applicant must request approval from NCIDQ when applying for the examination. An additional fee of \$150 applies for the special review. IDCEC Announces New Method for Determining HSW

The Interior Design Continuing Education Council (IDCEC) changed its method of



determining health, safety and welfare (HSW) content for continuing

education courses in December. IDCEC will no longer determine HSW content using the subject code of the course. Each course submitted for approval will now be evaluated to determine if the content meets the new criteria to receive a "HS" or "W" designation.

"HS"

This designation will be awarded if more than 75 percent of the course content covers knowledge and practice of legal codes,

building regulations and product performance standards. Topics may include energy efficiency, acoustics, lighting and fire, and life-safety systems that are implemented to protect the public and the environment.

"W"

This designation will be awarded if more than 75 percent of the course content covers knowledge and practice of design that enhances the social, psychological, financial and physical well-being of individuals and the environment. Topics may include business practices, ethics, space design, budgets and estimating, construction administration, environmental and sustainability issues, and methods of construction detailing.

Courses that do no meet the requirements for the HS or W designation will be classified as "General Interior Design Professional Knowledge."

All existing courses will maintain their current HSW designation until they come up for their three-year review. At that time, courses will be reviewed under the new system and receive the new designation. Providers with existing courses who wish to have their course receive the new designation before the three-year review can resubmit their courses to one of IDCEC's core member organizations.

Firm Name Approval and Registration: What Every Registrant Should Know

The board office often gets questions from registrants confused by the laws governing their firms. NRS 623.349 and NAC 623.740 address this issue. In addition to these sections, all firms must comply with Nevada business laws. For information on setting up your business in the state, please contact the Nevada Secretary of State.

Unlike some other professions, registered design professionals in Nevada may form business organizations with persons who are not design professionals, as well as with persons not registered in Nevada. These businesses can be formed if at least two-thirds of the ownership is held by Nevada registrants licensed pursuant to NRS 623, NRS 623a (landscape architects) or NRS 625 (professional engineers). Businesses not wholly owned by Nevada registrants must register with the board.

All business entities using corporate or fictitious names, and providing architectural, registered interior design or residential design services in Nevada, must have their firm names approved by the NSBAIDRD. Businesses applying for firm registration are automatically also applying for firm name approval and do not need to submit an additional application.

The board's decision to approve or deny firm name applications is based on its objective of protecting the public interest. Following is an example of the criteria that the board considers in granting approval of corporate or fictitious firm names:

- Possible confusion with an existing name.
- Any connotation of an affiliation or endorsement not supported by fact. Example: Use of the word "international."
- A connotation of quality or services that is potentially misleading. Example: "World's Best Architects."
- An effort to avoid a deserved reputation with negative connotations. Example: Using or changing a name to avoid public wrongdoings.

- Any vulgar or offensive connotations.
- Any other potentially false, deceptive or misleading aspect. Examples: (1) A one-person firm cannot use the plural "John Doe Architects," "John Doe Group" or "John Doe Partnership." (2) Firms wishing to use the plural terms "architects," "registered interior designers" or "residential designers" must have more than one such Nevada registrant employed with the firm. (3) Professional membership association appellations (i.e. AIA) can only be used in the firm's name if the named persons are registered in Nevada.

All businesses using corporate or fictitious names, and providing architectural, registered interior design or residential design services in Nevada, must have their firm names approved by the board.

Firm Registration or Firm Name Approval?

Answer the questions below to determine if your firm should apply for firm registration or firm name approval.

Firm Registration

Is the partnership, corporation, company, etc. owned partially by Nevada registered architects, interior designers, residential designers, professional engineers and/or landscape architects? (Important: Nevada registrants must own two-thirds – 66.67 percent – of the business entity.)

If you answered yes, apply for firm registration.

Firm Name Approval

Is the partnership, corporation, company, etc. <u>owned 100 percent</u> by Nevada registered architects, interior designers, residential designers, professional engineers and/or landscape architects AND doing business under a fictitious name?

If you answered yes, apply for firm name approval.

Approval Not Required

Is the business a sole proprietorship, owned 100 percent by a Nevada registered architect, registered interior design or residential designer AND doing business under the registrant's real name (i.e. John Doe, Architect)?

If you answered yes, you do <u>not</u> need to apply for firm registration or firm name approval.

Businesses not owned by persons registered pursuant to NRS 623 do not need to apply to the NSBAIDRD for firm registration or firm name approval. These individuals should check with their profession's regulatory board for laws applicable to their businesses.

Firm applications can be downloaded from the board Web site or requested by calling the board office.

NSBAIDRD Late Registration Policy

Registrants whose certificate of registration expired on Dec. 31, 2005 and have failed to renew their registration must pay a late renewal fee of \$220, in addition to the \$150 annual registration fee.

Per NAC 623.280, registrants who do not renew their certificate of registration within one year of its expiration can renew it before the end of the third year by:

- a. Submitting a letter of application for renewal:
- b. Obtaining the board's approval; and
- c. Paying the required late registration fee (\$300).

Registrants who have not renewed their registration within three years of the certificate's expiration date are no longer entitled to have it renewed, but may have their certificate restored. The board will issue a new registration number and certificate if the person complies with the following procedure:

- a. If the expired certificate was obtained through reciprocal registration, the person must reapply to the board using the same procedure.
- b. If the expired certificate was obtained through examination in Nevada, the person must:
- (1) Submit a new application to the board:
- (2) Submit a certificate of good standing from every state in which he is licensed; and
- (3) Appear for an oral interview.
