# Fifty Years of Dedication to Excellence: UNR School of Medicine

On March 25, 1969, Nevada Governor Paul Laxalt announced on the floor of the Nevada State Assembly that he received a telegram from Howard Hughes giving \$200,000 a year for twenty years to create a Nevada School of Medicine. Governor Laxalt's announcement came just before a vote on Assembly Bill 130 permitting UNR to establish a School of Medical Sciences.

The vote passed along north/south lines. Founding Dean Dr. George Smith told Dr. Sohn that the bill passed by two votes (*Better Medicine*, pg. 23). Others told me when I became Dean in 1981 that it passed by one vote. In the early 1980s as I traveled across the state describing the School of Medicine to multiple groups and relating the story of the one vote passage – more than one former legislator would stand up and say, "I was that one vote."

After the School of Medical

Sciences was created, the first class of 32 students entered in 1971. The north/south support lines have continued over the years since that 1969 vote. On my first day as Dean in 1981 I presented the School's budget to the combined Senate Finance and Assembly Ways and Means committee and encountered the following comments/questions: "The school is an albatross around the neck of the state and we could save money if we bought every student a Ferrari and sent them to an out of state medical school", "Dr. Daugherty, I hope you haven't sold your home in Indiana to move to Nevada", "Dr. Daugherty, I hope you haven't bought a home in Nevada."

We prevailed; but the northsouth division continues to this day, as evidenced by the recent creation of the UNLV School of Medicine in the south.

## Dr. Donald Mousel Lounge

The Lounge at the entry of the History of Medicine Library/Museum is named to honor the late Dr. Donald Mousel (1930-1994). While in the U.S. Navy he was a friend of Dr. Ronald Cudek and instrumental in Cudek coming to Reno. Dr. Cudek was a medical school classmate of Dr. Anton Sohn, and he, in turn, recruited Sohn to come to Reno in 1968.

Dr. Donald K. Mousel was born in Hastings, Nebraska, went to Whitman College in Walla Walla, Washington, and graduated from McGill University School of Medicine in 1958. He did his internship and residency in ophthalmology at the Washington Medical Center, Washington, D.C. Dr. Mousel served in the U.S. Navy in Key West, Florida, before moving to Reno in 1965 to become the first pediatric ophthalmologist in Nevada.

Dr. Mousel made expeditions to the Caribbean, Mexico, Central America, and New Guinea to treat underserved eye patients. He had many local interests including serving on the Board of Directors of the Reno Chamber Orchestra and the Community Concert Society. Dr. Mousel also enjoyed outdoor sports such as trekking, whitewater rafting, and skiing.

He held teaching appointments at Nevada's School of Medicine and University of California San Francisco's School of Medicine. In addition, he was on many national committees including the Chairman of the Committee for the Prevention of Blindness Society. The Nevada State Medical Association awarded the Nevada Physician of the Year to Dr. Mousel in 1983 for his community service. For his involvement in humanitarian causes and being a role model for medical students, the Lounge in the History of Medicine Library/Museum is named in his honor.

# Drs. Robert and Sandra Daugherty Reading Room

Robert M. Daugherty was Dean of the University of Nevada, Reno School of Medicine for twenty years. He was born in Missouri in 1934 and graduated from the University of Kansas School of Medicine in 1960. He completed a residency in internal medicine at the University of Oklahoma where he also obtained a PhD.

Dr. Robert Daugherty came to Nevada in 1981 after the school transitioned to a four-year program and helped to assure its success. He recruited renowned clinical and basic sciences chairs, developed a campus in southern Nevada, managed hospital relations with public, private, and VA affiliates, built strong rural outreach programs, and oversaw the development of statewide residency programs.

While Nevada's medical school Dean, he built educational, research, and clinical enterprises,

and was instrumental in securing space for the History of Medicine Library/Museum. For his efforts, the Reading Room is named to honor him and his wife Sandra. Dr. Daugherty retired from the School of Medicine in 1999. Currently, he is co-editor of *Greasewood Tablettes*.

### Dr. Owen C. Bolstad Conference Room

Dr. Bolstad (1921-2002) was born Appleton, Minnesota. He enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1941, served with the 34th Infantry Division in North Africa and Europe, and rose to the rank of staff sergeant before his discharge in 1945. After earning his MD degree from the University of Minnesota School of Medicine in 1951, Dr. Bolstad practiced family medicine for ten years before deciding on a career in pathology. In 1966 he moved to Reno and became a partner in Western Clinical Laboratories, and in 1971 he was a founding partner of Laboratory Medicine Consultants.

When he retired in 1982, he pursued his interest in history of medicine at the University of Nevada, Reno School of Medicine and was important in the success of the History of Medicine program. He and Dr. Anton Sohn were the founders of Nevada's Great Basin History of Medicine at the School of Medicine. Dr. Bolstad was the first editor of *Greasewood Tablettes*. The

first book he sponsored was an oral history of Dr. Leslie Moren, who lived in Elko.

Dr. Bolstad had a lifelong interest in outdoor activities that included hunting from his duck camp near Fallon, upland bird hunting with his friend Dr. Leslie Moren in Elko, and hunting with Roy Hogan and Anton Sohn in Nevada and Idaho. He also was an active member of the U.S. Navy League. For his role in Nevada's Great Basin History of Medicine, the Conference Room in the Library/Museum is named in his honor.
