BIENNIAL REPORT

To the Honorable the Legislature of Nevada.

GENTLEMEN: In compliance with the law, we, the Board of Directors of the State Orphans' Home, beg leave to submit our report, including that of the Superintendent of the Home for the years 1917-1918.

The Home is now and has been, since March 17, 1913, under the efficient management of Mr. George W. Cowing and his wife, Mrs. Mary A. Cowing, as Superintendent and Matron.

They have given eminent satisfaction in every detail in their management and in the individual welfare of the children, who are neatly clothed and well fed and made as comfortable and happy as the overcrowded condition will permit.

They are kindly treated and well trained in morals and manners.

The arrangement with the Carson Public Schools for the education of the children of the Home on a basis of equality with the children of Carson City has still further proved the benefits of the plan, as shown in the development of the children. Besides the regular grammar-school work, more than a score of the boys and girls have been enrolled in the high school. Two of the girls, after graduation, have become successful teachers, another is at the University of Nevada taking work to fit her for a high-school teacher. Three boys from the Home are among those who helped in the overthrow of the Kaiser in the defense of world freedom.

The quality of work done by these young people compares well with that of their fellows. A good spirit of comradeship prevails, as shown by frequent selection of members of the Home for officers in various student activities.

Some problems of retardation have been handled through the cordial cooperation of school and Home management. These boys and girls are growing into men and women upon whom Nevada will come to depend as staunch and reliable citizens.

The allowance by the Legislature of \$1,500 per year to provide for the training in manual and domestic arts and commercial courses in the Carson City High School as a pro rata for such training of the Home children has been a great benefit to the children, who are getting a practical benefit of the work thus far provided and are applying it in a practical manner on improvements and different classes of work at the Home.

That the State Orphans' Home has been well and economically managed by the Superintendent and Matron is fully set forth in the Superintendent's report, hereto attached, which covers in detail all the different features of the Home management, lists of children, expenses and productions.

The help has been efficient and satisfactory, and a harmonious and thoroughly cooperative spirit is everywhere shown in and about the Home.

The appropriations for maintenance made by the last Legislature of \$40,000 for the years 1917 and 1918 was made on the basis of 90 children in the Home at that time and upon the cost per capita of \$19.02. During

the last two years 117 children have been enrolled, and, considering the extremely high increase in the cost of supplies of all kinds, the cost per capita has been maintained at the low figure of \$19.50, except stock and supplies on hand and permanent improvements, which are considered as assets.

The fact that, owing to the extraordinary high cost of living and the large increase in the number of children enrolled, a deficiency of only \$1,928 was created, may be considered a creditable showing.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Owing to the anticipated increase in the number of children that will be admitted to the Home and the present high costs of living, we would recommend that \$50,000 be appropriated for maintenance, and that all the recommendations made by the Superintendent for the construction of additional buildings to relieve the present overcrowded condition and prepare for future admissions, and for other purposes, be approved.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

To the Honorable Board of Directors of the Nevada State Orphans' Home.

GENTLEMEN: I herewith submit to you the Biennial Report of the Nevada State Orphans' Home for the years 1917-1918.

APPROPRIATIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS

The sum of \$40,000 was appropriated by the last Legislature for the support and maintenance of the Home. Of this, I have expended the entire appropriation together with a deficiency of \$1,928.

The appropriation above mentioned was made on a basis of approximately 90 children, but owing to the increase of $27\frac{3}{10}$ per cent in the population and the greatly increased cost of supplies of every character within the last two years will account for the deficiency.

The sum of \$3,000 was appropriated for repairs and improvements. Of this sum, approximately \$765 was used for repairs, while approximately \$2,100 was used for permanent improvements; namely, an electric auxiliary range and bread ovens; a potato peeler; a large hot-water boiler; cement steps and base for both front entrances, building over and remodeling the potato- and root-cellar, an automobile garage, remodeling dairy barn, and installing sanitary and modern equipment, etc.

An appropriation of \$2,000 was made for the installation of an oil burner in lieu of coal. Of this I have expended \$1,753.56 by installing oil-heating apparatus for the cooking range, steam boiler and heating furnace; placing a 11,000-gallon tank underground on the west side of the main building, laying a five-inch iron pipe to the sidetrack of the Virginia and Truckee Railway to connect with the oil cars, thereby being able to empty a car of oil into our tank by gravity in approximately two hours. I have installed the Fess system, with electric-motor power, together with a Pelton water-power auxiliary.

The sum of \$1,000 was appropriated for installing a cement swimming-pool and playground apparatus. Of this I have used the sum of \$960.35 by installing a cement swimming-pool 4 feet deep by 46 feet in length and 22 feet in width, a tennis court, and various playground apparatus.

Notwithstanding the greatly increased cost of living within this term, the cost of maintenance per child, including maintenance, salaries, education, medical attention of every character, repairs—in fact everything except permanent improvement—deducting supplies on hand, has been $64\frac{1}{8}$ cents per day, or \$19.50 per month.

HEALTH OF THE CHILDREN

Excepting the epidemic of Spanish influenza, which attacked nearly every inmate of this institution, with the loss of two children, the health of the children has been remarkably good, especially under the present existing congested condition of the Home. I would respectfully refer you to the report of Dr. Donald Maclean, whose report is made a part hereof.

SCHOOL CONDITIONS

The education of the children at the Carson City public school is perfectly satisfactory in every particular and I would earnestly recommend its continuance.

POPULATION

At the beginning of the term there were 88 children enrolled. We now have 112 children to care for, with a daily average of $102\frac{3}{10}$ children for the term. The daily average for 1917 was $94\frac{4}{10}$ and for 1918 it was $109\frac{1}{10}$, while for the previous term it was $90\frac{3}{4}$, showing a steady increase. The greatest number enrolled at one time was 117. There were 62 children received and 38 released.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Owing to the gradual increase in the inmates of this Home, some provision for the accommodation of more children will have to be provided for, or else more restrictions placed on the admission of children. The capacity of the Home is about 95, and 100 children crowds it. During the last year we have averaged $109\frac{1}{10}$ children. The District Courts of Washoe County have committed 5 children from Reno and 2 from Sparks that we have been unable to receive until room is provided for them. There are also application from 10 other children that we have had to refuse admission for the same reason. Most of these cases are undoubtedly deserving ones.

The dormitories and dining-room can be enlarged along the lines that I have verbally suggested to you. The cost of same is yet to be determined.

I will again respectfully call your attention to the grave necessity of providing hospital or segregation quarters for the children in case of epidemics. Such quarters could be easily provided for in the event of a new building being built for a boy's playroom, bathroom, lavatory, reading- and study-room and a basement for shop and mechanical work. The upper floor to be used for a study- and reading-room but to be used for a hospital or segregation quarters in event of epidemics, this building to take the place of the old frame building now being used for the boys' playroom, etc., which is absolutely obsolete, unsanitary, and inappropriate. The cost of repairing this old building would be so expensive that it would be throwing money after bad, and the same amount applied on a new building such as I have suggested (providing the stonework could be done by the State Prison) would go a long way toward completing the new building.

The swimming-pool which was built in the old tankhouse has proven to be one of the best forms of amusement that could have been provided for the children. Plans have been drawn and the stone cut for a building to be placed over it, providing dressing-rooms and a runway around the pool; the cost of same would be a very nominal figure (providing the stonework could be done by the State Prison), as there is practically enough corrugated iron and lumber in the old building to answer all the requirements. It would be of such a nature as to make it everlasting and one of the best assets of the Home.

In making my recommendations for the ensuing term, I must admit that it is a very hard subject to cover at this time, owing to the unsettled condition of the market and the disposition of the incoming legislature

to make provisions to increase the capacity of the Home, or to restrict the conditions relative to committing children to this Home to say, 100 children.

The average number of children for the past six years was:

1913-1914.....	66 ³ / ₄
1915-1916.....	90 ³ / ₄
1917-1918.....	102 ³ / ₁₀

At the beginning of the term of 1913 there were 48 children enrolled, while at the end of the term of 1918 we have 112, showing a gradual increase all the time. I am satisfied beyond the question of a doubt that the results of the Spanish influenza epidemic is going to make more demands on the State and counties for the care of orphaned children, as it has already presented itself.

I would therefore recommend that not less than \$50,000 be appropriated for the support and maintenance of the Home for the ensuing term.

I have collected from the several counties, for the care of children, and turned into the State Treasury, the sum of \$15,100, and I would earnestly recommend that the rate charged against counties for their share of the care of children committed from their respective counties be made at a uniform rate of \$10 per month per child—just one-half of the actual cost of care of each child per month.

The appropriation for repairs and improvements will have to be determined later and governed according to the aforementioned recommendations.

I would recommend the appropriation of \$3,000 for educational purposes, \$1,800 for salary of physician and surgeon, and \$100 for books and periodicals.

In conclusion, I wish to thank your Honorable Board for your many kind courtesies and considerations, help, and support at all times during my incumbency and for which I am sincerely grateful.

REPORT OF HOME PHYSICIAN

CARSON CITY, December 31, 1918.

To the Honorable Board of Orphans' Home Commissioners.

GENTLEMEN: I have the honor to submit the following report for the two years past:

The general health of the children has been good. We have had several epidemics—one of Duke's disease, resembling measles and scarlatina, and one of measles. There were 65 cases of the first and 62 of the second. There were no deaths and no serious complications from either of these. At the time of these epidemics the Home was not nearly so crowded as at present or the results might not have been so favorable.

We have recently passed through a severe and widespread epidemic of influenza, there being 104 cases including the Matron, Assistant Matron, Fireman, and the Farmer. There were 15 cases of pneumonia, 5 lobar-pneumonias, 10 broncho-pneumonias, with 2 deaths and 1 case of empyema. One death was a two-year old baby who had a lobar-pneumonia and recovered only to develop a broncho-pneumonia and succumb. The other was in an overgrown boy 14 years old and well over 6 feet in height, a typical acromegalic. He developed a broncho-pneumonia almost from the first and seemed to have absolutely no resistance, being from the first extremely unruly and unmanageable, dying on the fourth day. The matron developed empyema, necessitating the resection of two ribs for drainage. She is slowly recovering, although the wound is still draining profusely.

Owing to the extremely overcrowded condition during this epidemic, it was impossible to separate or segregate the children as should have been done. Some of the smaller ones were forced to sleep three in a bed to avoid their being in the dormitories. Your attention is respectfully called to the crying need of more room or less children. Both dormitories are jammed full, and in the event of an epidemic we are almost powerless either to segregate or in any other way prevent its spread. I am fully convinced that it was due to the general care and feeding of the children, the regular hours and discipline, and a certain element of good luck which alone prevented a serious loss of life during the recent epidemic.

The matron being desperately ill with pneumonia, the responsibility fell upon the assistant matron and the superintendent, who were untiring in their efforts. Mr. Cowing sat up night after night to keep the furnace going and the house warm. Mrs. Haines went with two or three hours' sleep for days, although only just convalescent from an attack. We were unable to get nurses, and are under the deepest obligation to four school teachers—Miss Mary L. Jamison, Miss Fleming, Miss Alice Bryant, and Miss Rose Jones. They gave freely and fearlessly of their time and strength, and without them I do not know what we would have done.

There was one death in the Home previous to the epidemic, due to endocarditis, a chronic case which condition was noted on admission,

and the fact that she could never be well and might become a chronic invalid was called to the attention of the board at the time.

Some little difficulty was experienced with war bread, etc., but repeated examinations of the meals failed to reveal any fault with the rations as a whole. The condition of the children speaks for itself.

It is interesting to note how much more rapidly the Home children recover from small ailments than do those in private homes. This is largely due to the plainer food, more regular hours, and discipline.

I desire to express my thanks to the superintendent and matron, the assistant matrons, past and present, and all other employees for their unflinching courtesy and assistance.

To the board I can only say that I have never asked for anything which was for the benefit of any child that has not been cheerfully granted, and I am sure that the excellent general health of the children is due as much, if not more, to their attitude and the care of the superintendent and matron, despite the terrific overcrowding, as to anything else.
