REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

To the Honorable Board of Directors of the Nevada State Orphans' Home.

GENTLEMEN: I herewith submit to you my biennial report of the Nevada State Orphans' Home for the years 1919-1920.

APPROPRIATIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS

The sum of \$50,000 was appropriated by the last legislature for the support and maintenance of the Home. Of this, I have expended \$45,810.86. For detail explanation of the expenditure of this fund, I refer you to Table No. 1. Under the tabulation of Miscellaneous Items, the sum of \$750 was used for the care of children outside of the Home, and about \$150 for telephone service. The sum of \$18,167 was collected from the several counties and paid into the State Treasury for the care of children.

The sum of \$2,500 was appropriated for repairs and improvements. Of this sum I have expended \$2,363.01 and for detail of expenditures I refer you to Table No. 2. Out of this appropriation it was necessary to purchase a new mangle or steam ironer as the old one, "a small electric machine," was burned and worn out and was not advisable to have repaired. The one that we replaced for the old one, is a 12-foot steam mangle and is much more economical and safer and has twice the capacity of the old one, and while it is a second-hand machine it is practically as good as new. The sum of \$633.01 was used in the purchase and installing of this machine.

The sum of \$50,000 was appropriated for the purpose of providing new quarters for the boys, a hospital and operating rooms, wash and dressing-rooms for the girls, remodeling and enlarging the dormitories and dining-room, in order to increase the capacity of the Home 50 per cent, and to enlarge the building and complete the swimming pool, etc.

This work has been carried out and nearly completed and for detail of expenditures I would refer you to Table No. 3.

Owing to the greatly increased cost of supplies, material and labor during the last two years, the cost of maintenance per child has increased from 64 $\frac{1}{4}$ cents per day, or \$19.50 per month, during the preceding term, to 78 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents per day, or \$23.55 per month. This includes every form of expense, except permanent improvements.

POPULATION

At the beginning of the term we had 112 children enrolled and at the end of the term there were 90, or a daily average for the two years of 94 $\frac{3}{4}$. There were 34 children received and 56 released.

From information at hand at this time, I am satisfied that there will be quite an increase in the population.

EDUCATION

The education of the children in the public schools of Carson City is perfectly satisfactory in every particular, and I would earnestly recommend its continuance.

HEALTH OF CHILDREN

The health of the children has been exceptionally good and for detail report in this matter I would refer you to the statement and report of Dr. Donald Maclean, the Home Physician, whose report is made a part hereof.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I would recommend the appropriation of \$49,000 for the support and maintenance of the Home for the ensuing two years.

I would recommend the appropriation of \$2,500 for repairs and upkeep of the building and grounds for the ensuing term.

The gutters and drains on the main building are badly in need of repair. The paint on some of the roofs is almost worn off and should be painted in order to save the shingles. The paint on the fences is practically all worn off and should be given attention. There is a long line of this fencing and it would require quite an expenditure to paint it.

The above mentioned repairs, together with the regular upkeep expenses, will require the sum above mentioned.

At the present we have on hand two old, heavy draft horses to do our farming and general work. The actual working time for using the horses is, comparatively speaking, very short, and at the present high cost of hay they are very expensive to maintain. They are also very slow on account of their size and not adaptable for anything but heavy work. I believe that better results could be obtained, and at less expense, to substitute a light tractor and truck. All of the farm work could be done with these and there would be no expense except when in actual use. The truck would also afford a means of pleasure for the children in the way of outings during the summer. The old mowing machine is entirely worn out and has been repaired as long as such was possible, but has now passed that stage.

I would therefore recommend that the sum of \$2,000 be appropriated to cover this matter.

I would recommend the appropriation of \$3,500 for educational purposes. The amount actually required is \$3,000, but owing to the fact that the last quarterly payment was not made, the sum of \$500 out of last term reverted, and will have to be paid out of this term's appropriation.

In conclusion I wish to thank your honorable board for kind consideration, help, advice and assistance and which, I assure, is deeply appreciated.

REPORT OF PHYSICIAN

CARSON CITY, NEVADA, January 2, 1921.

To the Honorable Board of Directors of the Nevada State Orphans' Home.

GENTLEMEN: I have the honor to submit the following report for the past two years:

During the whole two-year period we have had no serious outbreak or epidemic of disease. During the early months of 1919 we had a few cases of influenza, all mild in type and without complications or deaths. In the spring of 1920 and running into the summer we had an apparent epidemic of gastro-enteritis which yielded to active treatment in all cases and left no ill effects. It did affect all the children, or at least 90% of them, and no definite cause was ever discovered and it is probable that the water supply was primarily responsible.

The better general health and the nonappearance of epidemics is probably due to the addition authorized by the last Legislature, which has done away with the overcrowding to which your attention was called in the last report.

We had a number of broken arms, all of which have been successfully handled without deformity, the last one being the Superintendent himself, who fell while dismantling the Christmas tree, and sustained a fracture of the right wrist, which will, I hope, result as satisfactorily as have the others, despite his greater age.

On the last day of the year 1920 we had the only serious accident during the whole period—a little, seven-year-old boy, while playing with a piece of tin on a string making a buzzer, a very common toy, the string broke and the tin disk cut his right eye out completely so that it had to be enucleated at once, and this was done by Dr. D. L. Shaw of Reno. The youngster made an uneventful recovery without the slightest reaction, but has lost completely and irrevocably his right eye.

With the extra room and the new operating-room completed we are prepared to handle any epidemic that might arise or any emergency of a surgical nature. As nearly all of the children committed to the Home are committed as neglected or dependent children, or both, it naturally follows that these children have not had the care that other children have, and we find that in most instances they are in need of minor operations, such as removal of tonsils and adenoids, which we are quite able to handle, but they also need eye examinations and in many instances special dental work, and I would respectfully recommend that a special appropriation be made for this purpose. If this were done a trained and experienced oculist could be employed once every two or three months to come to Carson City and go over the eyes of all the children, prescribing such glasses as might be needed, and further giving the needed instructions as to eye exercises in special cases. This has been done in all cases where the eye defect was marked, but no general practitioner has the experience necessary to diagnose all of these cases. As to the teeth they are all taken care of in

the ordinary way, but many of the children who have had tonsils and adenoids have deformities of the jaws therefrom, and these can be corrected only by an orthodontist and the average dentist has neither the time nor the ability to handle this class of cases, whereas if an appropriation were made for this purpose the dentist who does the work could easily say how much of this special work there was to do and suggest some orthodontic specialist who, for a reasonable fee, would be willing to come to Carson City once or twice a year and do the work.

Despite objections from the outside and some of the children I still contend that the food is ample for all their needs. Possibly a little greater variety at certain times might be of advantage, but this is rather a hard thing to regulate in an institution of this size.

I have to thank the Superintendent and Matron and all of the employees for unfailing courtesy and assistance as well as absolute willingness to carry out any and all medical orders or instructions. Also the Board for unfailing support and willingness to do anything and everything suggested for the welfare or health of the inmates.
