NOTE.—Except for expenses of the Land Office, and the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, the receipts of Public School and University moneys are not included in the above statement, nor their disbursements in the preceding statement. The receipts from the State Prison, Insane Asylum and Orphans' Home are not given, because only the expense of these institutions, less receipts, is given in the preceding statement.

#### GENERAL FUND.

A detailed statement of the amounts received and disbursed by the several funds for the year 1886, will be found in "Exhibit F" of this report, but particular attention is called to the transactions of the General Fund to show that no reduction of the rates of taxation is yet possible, unless some law can be passed which will result in increasing property assessments. It will be seen too, that this fund, with the additional expense of the Legislature, will have to borrow, probably \$40,000, to enable it to meet the demands that will be made upon it during 1887; but no legislation is required, as its borrowing power under the law of 1881, "an Act authorizing a State law," is not exhausted by \$53,000.

It must not be supposed, however, that the State is getting deeper and deeper in debt because it has been necessary to borrow money occasionally during the past six years to sustain a cash basis, as redemption has traveled hand in hand with the sale of bonds, and the debt, December 31, 1886, was \$62,000 less than on December 31, 1883, and there will probably be a further reduction of \$10,000 by December

31, 1886, even if \$40,000 is borrowed this year; but the present rates of taxation must be maintained in order to meet the requirements of law for the redemption of these bonds.

#### SCHOOL FUNDS.

In the State School Fund there was \$147,632 53, in the State University Fund \$13,104 46, and in the University Fund 90,000-acre grant \$32,743 71 awaiting investment December 31, 1886, and it is hoped that under the amendment of the Constitution adopted at the last general election, providing for the investment of these moneys in the bonds of other States, as well as in the bonds of this State and the United States, better terms can be secured than has been possible heretofore, and that the Legislature will not fail to pass the necessary laws to carry the amendment into effect.

#### INTEREST AND SINKING FUNDS.

In the State Interest and Sinking Fund there was \$23,856, in the Insane Interest and Sinking Fund \$7,457 03, and in the Territorial Interest Fund \$19,523 98, but since December 31, 1886, State bonds to the amount of \$27,000 have been redeemed, and accrued interest paid to the amount of \$11,760 out of these funds, and the amounts at present to their credit (January 5, 1887,) are as follows:

#### INSANE ASYLUM.

Amount expended for improvements and transportation, care and support of insane for 1885-6, \$84,804 47.

Average number of patients, 159 7-10.

Average daily cost per patient, 72¼ cents.

The improvements were quite extensive; notably a hay and cattle barn, a bridge across the Truckee River, and fencing and improving the grounds.

The receipts for the care of pay patients amounted to \$1,039, and for the sale of hay, etc., \$114 94. For statements in detail see Superintendent's report.

#### ORPHANS' HOME.

The appropriation for the support of the Home was \$25,000, all of which was expended, and there are deficiency bills to the amount of \$1,742 74 more, making the total expense for 1885-6, \$26,742 74.

Average number of children, 54 2-5.

Average daily cost per child, 67 ¾-100 cents.

The receipts for the care of pay children amounted to \$475.

#### STATE PRINTING OFFICE AND ARMORY.

The last Legislature appropriated \$5,000 for the purpose of purchasing grounds and the erection thereon of a building to be used for a State printing office, armory, committee rooms, and for storage purposes, and the Board of Capitol Commissioners, as directed, purchased grounds, and caused the erection of a building which for durability, adaptability and beauty is highly creditable to the State and a source of pride to the members of the Board, but the amount appropriated was utterly inadequate, and to complete the work deficiency bills were contracted to the amount of \$7,552 73 which, it is hoped, the Legislature will promptly provide for, as a matter of justice to the men who advanced the money, material and labor, so urgently needed. Appropriation should also be made for painting the roof of the building, erecting a wood-house, fencing the grounds, and for insurance already effected.

#### LEGISLATIVE HALLS.

For furnishing fuel and lights, and repairing legislative halls and furniture for the thirteenth session of the Legislature, \$1,000 was appropriated, but new carpets were required, the halls were very dirty and needed calcimining and painting, and it was absolutely necessary to

provide furniture for the new committee rooms, and by order of the Board of Capitol Commissioners, all these things have been accomplished, although at a cost exceeding the appropriation of \$854 51, for which provision is respectfully asked.

#### CAPITOL GROUNDS AND WATER WORKS

The appropriation for 1885-6, for improving and keeping up the Capitol grounds and water works, was \$2,400, and the amount was found to be sufficient, but it is deemed highly important that the appropriation for the ensuing two years be at least \$3,000, as there is considerable cement water pipe which will need renewing, and the iron pipe needs more frequent repairs as it gets older; and it is hoped that the Legislature will give favorable consideration to the matter.

#### FURNITURE AND REPAIRS TO CAPITOL

The appropriation for this purpose should be not less than \$1,500, as the roof of the Capitol needs painting, and there is much other painting, and many repairs needed, as well as some furniture. In private affairs it is considered no economy to let things fall to pieces before making necessary repairs, and believing the same principle should govern in affairs of State, the Legislature is earnestly asked for the means to apply it.

## DEPRECIATION OF VALUES.

The year 1886 shows a depreciation in property valuations to the amount of \$714,411 68 as compared with 1885, and of \$848,421 70 as compared with 1884; and a decrease in the taxable proceeds of mines of \$884,989 57 as compared with 1885, and of \$899,339 71 as compared with 1884; but this result was expected as to the taxable proceeds of the mines, because of the legislation of 1885 making taxable only the actual net proceeds above all costs; and depreciation in property valuations was also expected in some counties, but entirely unlooked for in others where there seems no good reason for it; and these facts again demonstrate the necessity of a State Board of Equalization, with power to determine the value of all property for purposes of taxation, or the appointment of a commission to thoroughly revise our system of assessment and taxation, and the further necessity of exceeding wisdom on the part of the Legislature in maintaining the present and seeking for and opening all possible additional sources of revenue, as with depreciation of property and decrease in the taxable proceeds of the mines, revenue is correspondingly decreased. It need only be instanced that the State tax on the proceeds of mines in 1878 amounted to \$207,413 45, and that there has been a steady decrease until for the year 1886 it was only \$4,989 09, to show the need of serious attention to this matter of revenue that the Ship of State may be kept on an even keel, financially; and the suggestion occurs that as a

## SOURCE OF REVENUE

The great acreage of land, amounting to 282,000 acres, that has been sold by the State under contracts not yet completed, conditioned for partial payment of purchase price upon application to purchase, and the remainder to be paid after a term of years, with annual interest, and for which patents have not yet issued, and the immense acreage that will probably be sold hereafter on similar conditions, should not be overlooked by the Legislature. If the cash value of these lands cannot be assessed to the contractors to purchase, and no reason appears why it cannot, as they control the land against all the world, and bar possible cash sales, then, certainly, their investments under the contracts can, and should be. The amount of these investments is \$241,158 90, and, without doubt, it will rapidly increase in the future.

The State's investment in these deferred payments, at 6 per cent. interest per annum, is not a good one if it exempts the landed security from taxation; neither is taxation equal where A pays taxes on the full valuation of his land because he has perfected his title to it, and B pays no taxes at all on his land because, forsooth, he has only made partial payment to the State for it, and for the amount unpaid is paying six per cent. interest per annum; as A may have his land mortgaged for a sum fully as large as the deferred payment of B, and at a rate of interest surely as high, and be paying taxes at the

same time at the rate of from two to four per cent. on its full valuation. It is discrimination against the cash purchaser, and surely is not in accordance with the spirit of the Constitution wherein it declares that "the Legislature shall provide by law for a uniform and equal rate of assessment and taxation, and shall prescribe such regulations as shall secure a just valuation for taxation of all property, real, personal and possessory," and some provision should certainly be made for taxing these lands sold under contract.

#### DOG TAX.

"An Act authorizing the taxation of dogs," approved March 7, 1885, provides that there shall be paid an annual tax of one dollar on each dog, and that the tax collected shall be paid into the "General Fund," and it is a question as to what is meant by the "General Fund," whether the General Fund of the State or of the counties. The presumption with this office is that the General Fund of the State was intended, but county officers presume differently, and they have been allowed to pay the tax into the General Fund of the counties. The law should be amended so that there can be no dispute.

#### WAR CLAIMS.

Captain John Mullan, State Agent at Washington for the prosecution of these claims, reported November 20, 1886, that they were being examined by a special board of army officers appointed by the Secretary of War for the purpose, and that some action thereon might be expected soon, and an appropriation by the Congress now in session for any allowance made by said board. These claims, by their magnitude and evident justice, call for the serious attention of our representatives in Congress, and it is hoped that ere long they will be able to secure reimbursement to the State for the amount expended long ago in defense of the Union, when its life was in peril.

#### SALARY OF ADJUTANT-GENERAL AND STATE LIBRARIAN.

The law provides that "the Lieutenant-Governor shall be ex-officio Adjutant-General of the State and ex-officio State Librarian, and for the services he shall render as such and while acting as Governor in the absence of the Governor from the State, he shall receive an annual salary of two thousand seven hundred dollars, to be paid at the same time and in the same manner as other State officers are paid," and it also provides that before entering upon the duties of the office of Adjutant-General he shall give bonds with good and sufficient sureties, to be approved by the Governor, in the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars, conditioned that he shall faithfully perform all the duties of that office enjoined on him by law; and that before entering upon the duties of State Librarian he shall execute an official bond in the sum of one thousand dollars, with sureties to be approved by the Governor, conditioned for the faithful

discharge of his duties in that position, and the delivery over to his successor of all books and other property belonging to the State Library. On September 4, 1885, because of the insufficiency of the bond of Lieutenant-Governor C. E. Laughton as ex-officio State Librarian, Governor Adams declared that position vacant and appointed O. H. Gallup to fill the vacancy, and Mr. Gallup served continuously from the day of his appointment until December 31, 1886, or the remainder of the term. The Lieutenant-Governor retained his position as Adjutant-General and demanded warrants for his full salary as ex-officio Adjutant-General and ex-officio State Librarian from September 1, 1885, the date to which the full salary had been drawn, but his demands were refused on the presumption that the position of State Librarian carried a portion of the salary with it, and that Mr. Gallup was entitled to that portion. This position was sustained by the Supreme Court by its denial of a peremptory writ of mandamus to compel me to draw the warrants. On December 11, 1886, Mr. Gallup presented a claim, approved by the Board of Examiners, for fifteen months' services as State Librarian, from September 5, 1885, to December 5, 1886, at the rate of \$150 a month, amounting to \$2,250, and demanded a warrant on the Treasury for the amount; but his demand was also refused, and the grounds of the refusal were that "the Constitution excepts salaries fixed by law from examination and audit by the Board of Examiners, and although the salary of the State Librarian is not separately fixed by law, *the combined salary of Adjutant-General and State Librarian is so fixed*, and that there is no authority, other than the Legislature, competent to make a division of it, or of the appropriation made for paying it." In this I was also substantially sustained by the Supreme Court by its denial of a peremptory writ to compel the issuance of a warrant on the Treasury. For the reasons stated, no salary warrants were drawn for the incumbent of either position after September 1, 1885, consequently the appropriation of \$5,400 made for the salary of the Lieutenant-Governor as ex-officio Adjutant-General and ex-officio State Librarian for the years 1885-6 was drawn upon for only for eight months salary, from January 1 to August 31, 1885, amounting to \$1,800, and there remains a balance in the appropriation of \$3,600, the salary for the sixteen months from September 1, 1885, to December 31, 1886, to be divided between Lieutenant-Governor Laughton and Mr. Gallup as the Legislature, the only competent authority to make the division, may determine.

#### INSURANCE.

The law requires no annual statements to this department from insurance companies, consequently no report can be made further than this: During the year ending Dec. 31, 1886, twenty-two fire insurance companies of the United States, nineteen fire insurance companies of foreign countries, and four life and accident insurance companies of the United States, were authorized to transact insurance business in this State, and as no great conflagrations occurred, and

there was no unusual loss of life, the presumption is that the companies did fairly well. A higher average rate of premium for insurance against fire is imposed upon this State than upon any other State or Territory of the Union, but this is not deemed sufficient by the insurance companies doing business in the State, and they impose an additional tax of 5 per cent. on premiums, presumably to offset the license tax imposed by the State, and of this we most complain. When the fact is considered that our insurance law was formulated, and its passage secured by an insurance man, and that it is more liberal in its provisions, and less onerous in taxation prescribed for insurance companies than the insurance law of any other State or Territory, it is hard to conceive the justice of this additional and unusual tax, and we hope to bring the insurance companies to see that there is injustice in it. I have no suggestions to offer in reference to legislation. In fact I believe that legislation is too apt to be, not only inimical to insurance companies, but to the best interests of the people of the State as well, and I believe it advisable to make haste slowly in revising insurance laws.

#### LEGISLATION.

That authority may be unquestioned it should be plainly enacted that the Controller may at any time examine the books and papers of any County Auditor or County Assessor, and of any officer charged with the collection and receipt of State money, and if he believes from such examination, or for any other reason, that any officer has been guilty of defrauding the State of revenue, or has neglected or refused to perform any duty relating to the revenue, he must direct the Attorney General, District Attorney or other counsel to prosecute the delinquent. Such legislation will greatly assist the Controller when called upon to state an account against a delinquent, as he is required by law to do, and, it is believed, will secure prompt performance of prescribed duties.

#### COURT FINES.

Through misunderstanding of the present criminal laws it frequently occurs that costs are deducted from the fine imposed for a public offense, and often but little is left after that process to be paid into the State Treasury. Legislation should make it plain beyond possible misunderstanding that the full amount of all fines imposed and collected under and for violation of any penal law of this State must be paid into the State Treasury, and that costs can in no case be deducted from the fine fixed by law, but must be taxed against the defendant in addition to the fine and separately stated. The Constitution will thereby be complied with, and the State School Fund will receive its own.

#### BOARD OF CAPITOL COMMISSIONERS.

There should be a law creating a Board of Capitol Commissioners

and defining its duties, instead of the present ephemeral creation existing only as an incident of the biennial appropriation bill, and expiring with it, as there should at all times be authority vested somewhere to secure proper care for State property. The duties of the board should be to take charge of and keep in repair the Capitol building and furniture, the Capitol grounds, the State water works, and the State Printing Office building and grounds, and to have the appointment and discharge, at pleasure, of all help needed for these purposes, and to direct the expenditure of such appropriations as the Legislature may authorize.

#### DEVELOPMENT AND PROCLAMATION OF RESOURCES.

Two years ago I ventured to assert that the croakers who were continually decrying our State and predicting direful disaster would surely die and that Nevada would live, and I am now happy to proclaim that the voice of disparagement is less frequently heard, and the dawn of a brighter day is breaking over the land, swiftly followed by the sun of prosperity already tinging the mountain peaks with its approaching glory. The "old timer," like the old war horse as he smells the battle, again prances to the front, full of the fire of ambition which in his youth sent him forth to blaze the trail for civilization and to found an empire, and, although lacking the vigor of his young manhood, he is yet a host within himself for the accomplishment of his high mission, and the Legislature should see to it that on this auspicious dawn every proper assistance is extended to him, and the younger man who has linked his fortune with him in developing and proclaiming to the world the wonderful mineral, agricultural, horticultural, pomological and various other resources latent in the mountains and valleys of this broad domain, that the State may thrive in population and wealth in accordance with its great deserts.

#### CONCLUSION.

In conclusion it is hoped that the Legislature will heed the suggestions herein made, and that such measures will be enacted as will promote the welfare of the people and the settlement of an enterprising and desirable population within our borders.
