REPORT.

To His Excellency,

JEWETT W. ADAMS,

Governor of the State of Nevada.

Sir: In requirement of an Act in relation to creating a "State Board of Agriculture," approved March 7, 1885, we have the honor to make the following report:

The following gentlemen were appointed by Your Excellency as Directors to constitute said Board: G. W. Huffaker, C. C. Powning, B. F. Leete, Alvaro Evans, A. A. Longley, Theo. Winters, C. C. Stevenson, Fred. Dangberg, Albert White, W. S. Bailey, John P. Sweeney and Joseph Marzen. Subsequently Mr. Huffaker resigned and Mr. L. J. Flint was appointed to fill the vacancy.

On April 18, 1885, the Directors met and fully organized. On May 9 the Board met and organized the "Nevada State Agricultural Society," and adopted a Constitution and rules for its government. Thus the machinery of the State Agricultural Society was put in motion. Funds were subscribed by the citizens of Reno to insure a State Fair. Let us hope it will be fostered and encouraged by the State as one of our State institutions. We have reason to be proud of the encouragement and success attending the first State Fair under the auspices of the State. People came from distant counties and brought their exhibits and entered them for honorable competition. The interest daily increasing in stock raising was manifested by the exhibition of seven different breeds of cattle. Comparisons and experience in the best breeds adapted to the wants of our State will be of lasting benefit to our people. Cattle were shown that never fed on grain, and were as fat from feeding on our nutritious grasses as the best corn-fed from Illinois. Of horses there were shown as fine ones as are raised in any State or country. The exhibition in stock parade and speed ring was a credit to the breeders of these noble animals. Truly the State has wealth in the grasses grown here that in a few years will give our people prosperity, with comfortable and happy homes.

The mining outlook on the Comstock is not as encouraging as in years past. The heavy discount on silver alone has greatly injured this in-

dustry, and threatens to paralyze it altogether. But, in the face of discouragement, the hunt for precious metals goes on. Other districts are being looked after; other occupations are being sought and filled. The mining and agricultural interests are becoming more united and blended together in one common industry. Let us encourage the search for artesian water for our lands, for we have shown that water, soil and seed, thrown together, will produce something where nothing grew before.

For a full and detailed statement I refer you to the able reports of our Secretary and Treasurer.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

RENO, NEVADA, November 20, 1885.

TO THE HONORABLE STATE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE—

Gentlemen: I have the honor to submit the following report for the year 1885.

On the second of May they again met, and adopted a Constitution and By-laws, a premium list, and issued the following address to the people of the State :

OFFICE OF STATE AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY OF NEVADA,
RENO, NEVADA, May 1, 1885. }

To the People of the State of Nevada—

We are one of thirty-eight States in the Union, thirty-seven of whom have State Agricultural Societies, and hold fairs annually, to the material and beneficial interest and progress of the State.

These State Fairs, where the whole industrial and progressive representative people of the State annually meet and exhibit the results of their varying industries in productions of field and forest, soil and mine, and manufacture, together with the implements and appliances used in such production and manufacture, as evidenced by the exhibits made,

have, with our people, become a great school in practical life, alike useful and beneficial to all.

It has become a well-settled principle with our people that whatever tends to disseminate knowledge and make generally known and understood the best methods of improving our breeds of domestic animals, or skill in mining, mechanic arts or manufactures, or successful cultivation and bountiful productions from our soils, tends to make food cheaper and living cheaper, and is directly beneficial and interesting to every person in the State. Whatever makes these things prosperous makes the State prosperous.

The last Legislature enacted a law making the State Agricultural Society a State institution, and creating a State Board of Agriculture, and endowing and charging the Board with the management and control of the State Agricultural Society as a State institution, and directing them to hold annual Fairs.

There is no nation in the world that holds as many fairs as we do, nor is there nor has there been a nation whose people have become so generally skilled in agriculture and mechanic arts, mining and manufactures as ours. It is equally true that our desert State, naturally poor in agriculture, presents more obstacles to agricultural progress, and newer and more difficult problems in successful agriculture than the majority of the States in the Nation, and hence calls for new and varied inventions adapted to our wants, and a general dissemination of such knowledge and experience as is adapted to the immediate and successful development of our natural resources.

It will, therefore, be the policy of the State Board of Agriculture to interest every citizen of the State in the State Agricultural Society, looking to making the interest of every person in this State in the success and prosperity of the Agricultural Society co-extensive with and equal to their interest in the State Government, and to that end we desire, as far as possible, that each person or family shall have an annual ticket, or interest in the benefits and exhibitions of the productions, manufactures and minerals of the State, and at least as many persons as possibly can shall attend the Annual Fairs, and each bring something to exhibit and present the Board of Agriculture with a technical statement of the processes pursued and methods and appliances used in the particular production or manufacture of the article or thing shown.

The State Government has made no provision for funds for conducting the exhibitions, leaving it to the citizens in a popular movement to individually interest themselves in the support of the Society and success and direction of its objects.

The present population of our State is about 62,000, and we need to organize and conduct our fair this year about \$5,000—a sum equal to about eight cents per capita of our population.

There are fourteen counties in our State. If each county would raise and contribute its just proportion, that would give the required amount.

If 1,000 season tickets could be sold at \$5 each, or 2,000 at \$2 50 each; that would furnish the requisite means. And, while we throw out these suggestions, we wish the people of the State to take hold of it and become members of the Society, interested in it and its fairs.

Hold meetings in every camp and town, and raise the means necessary to carry on the fair; come and bring something, and become an exhibitor.

Finally, to the people of that portion of California whose territorial limits lie east of the great Sierra Nevada Mountains, and whose travel and transportation is over railroads through our State, whose pursuits,

interests, soil, climatic surroundings and natural resources are identical with ours, we especially extend an invitation to join with us and participate in our fairs as members and exhibitors on equal terms and enjoy all its privileges and benefits, and to that end we refer particularly to the counties of Grant and Lake, in Oregon, and Modoc, Plumas, Lassen, Sierra, Mono and Inyo, and, generally, we invite all Californians.

The citizens of Reno subscribed nearly \$800 in cash, and this gave the Directors enough to begin with, and a Committee on Track and Grounds were appointed and instructed to begin work at once and place the same in repair for the Fall meeting. The grounds, having lain idle for several years, were very much out of repair, new fences had to be built, and the grand and judges' stands repaired, all of which required a heavy expense. Mr. Bowman, through his agent, Mr. A. H. Manning, kindly gave the Society the use of the same free of charge. A speed programme was arranged, and a catalogue of premiums prepared and distributed throughout the State. The success of the Fair was now assured; words of encouragement were being received from all parts of the State, and also from the counties in California which are included in this District.

The Fair was held October 12th to 17th, inclusive, and the exhibition was a decided success.

A splendid show of horses, cattle, hogs, sheep, goats, and poultry were exhibited. The improvement in horses, cattle, hogs, and agricultural products in the last few years is wonderful to behold, and the same may be said of the Horticultural Department, wherein a finer exhibit was never had in the State, although the late date of holding the Fair interfered somewhat with the display of peaches and other earlier fruits. Inyo county's exhibit was excellent, and shows that in a few years more we will not have to depend upon the western side of the mountains for fruits of any kind, but that all will be supplied from *this side*.

In the Ladies' Department there was the finest display exhibited ever shown in this State, or any other, I dare say. It would have been a credit to any country, and I desire to say that this was greatly due to the "Women's Art and Industrial Association of Carson."

Judging from the interest taken in the Fair this year, and the free expressions of satisfaction made by *exhibitors* as well as *visitors*, it is safe to expect better patronage, more exhibitions, and better exhibits (if possible) next year than we had this year.

Arrangements were made with the Central Pacific, Virginia and Truckee, Carson and Colorado, and the Nevada and California Railroad Companies, whereby all articles and animals for exhibition were transported free of charge, and fares were reduced to less than one half regular rates.

The Virginia and Truckee Railroad run a special train from Virginia to Reno during the week, and greatly reduced the fare from all points on the road. This was a great accommodation to the public, and was duly appreciated by the Directors as well.

The following shows the total moneys received and disbursed during the year. You will observe that there are \$435 99 cash on hand, and \$555 due the Society, from which there is yet to be paid about \$220 for medals and engraving same. This will leave a balance on hand (if all moneys due the Society are paid) of about \$770.
