REPORT.

To His Excellency,

J. W. ADAMS,

Governor of the State of Nevada :

Sir—In requirement of an Act in relation to creating a State Board of Agriculture, approved March 7, 1885, we have the honor to make the following report :

The First Annual Fair held under the law of the State was at Reno, October 12th to 17th, 1885. A full and detailed report was made for that year as required by law. The Second Annual Fair was held at Reno, October 4th to 9th, 1886. The first four days the attendance was large, and the outlook encouraging for a successful meeting, but the last two days the weather became inclement, and the gentle " Washoe zephyr " became a gale, bringing a storm that made it so disagreeable that the attendance was small the last two days, which are usually the best days at a Fair. The result was, the society failed to take in money enough to pay current expenses and premiums.

At a meeting of Directors, held to close up the business of the fair, it was decided to borrow money and pay all bills and claims against the Society. To secure this loan the Directors gave their joint note. I earnestly recommend the encouragement of the State and District Fairs with the hope the Legislature will make suitable appropriations for their success. The interest manifested by our people to compete for premiums shows that we may well afford to tax ourselves to encourage these State institutions in their infancy. The small amounts so expended will in my opinion be returned to the State ten-fold by the increased value of our stock and such products of our State as are shown at our exhibitions. Our people become interested, and will attend our fairs for the purpose of learning the best breeds of horses, cattle, sheep, goats, hogs and poultry adapted to the soil and climate of our State. It is a means of advertising our products at home and abroad. It gives us a week of relaxation and pleasure congenial to most people, by coming together in social intercourse to better our own and our neighbor's condition.

Let us hope our people will take the same zealous interest in these

matters as the Board of Directors have done for the past two years. They have shirked no responsibility, and have done their duty faithfully and well, spending their time and money in order to make the State Agricultural Society one of the proud and lasting institutions of the State. I trust they will receive the thanks of those they have tried so hard to benefit.

The pioneers that crossed the plains twenty-five and thirty years ago will be surprised to learn that over forty thousand head of cattle, sixteen hundred and twenty horses and sixteen thousand four hundred sheep were exported by railroad during the year 1885. Large numbers were driven out of the State on foot, of which no accurate account can be given. Of wheat, three million four hundred and sixty-eight thousand pounds, of barley, nearly three million pounds. Potatoes over one thousand tons were sent to market out of the State in the last eight months.

Nevada wheat, barley and potatoes took first premium at the New Orleans Exposition. The mining outlook in the State shows brighter than last year and looks more encouraging. The price of silver is advancing and our people feel more hopeful for the future. The farmer receives a better price for the produce he sells than last year, and anticipates more acreage for the coming season.

Let us encourage every industry that will benefit our people by giving employment to all that seek to build homes among us. I cannot close without referring to Director A. A. Longley, who died in October last. In his death the Society lost a valuable member, who took great interest in its affairs. To him the duty was one of pleasure congenial to his taste, for he was a practical and successful farmer and stock breeder. The Society will miss his counsel and advice.

For a full and detailed report of premiums paid, money received and paid out, I refer you to the able reports of the Secretary and Treasurer.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

RENO, NEVADA, December 30, 1886.

To the Honorable State Board of Agriculture—

GENTLEMEN : I have the honor to submit the following report for the year 1886 :

On the 12th of February the Board convened and held their annual election of officers, which resulted in the re-election of the following named gentlemen :

C. C. Stevenson.....President.
C. H. Stoddard.....Secretary.
C. T. Bender.....Treasurer.

A speed programme and premium list were adopted, and all necessary arrangements were outlined. The time of holding the Fair was announced for October 4th to the 9th inclusive.

The citizens of Reno were not called upon this year for the usual subscriptions, it being the intention of the Board to make it self-sustaining if possible.

On Monday, October 4th, the exhibits began to pour in, and by Wednesday the pavilion was well filled, and at the grounds every stall was occupied, notwithstanding forty additional ones had been built by the Society. The stock exhibition was far superior to any we had previously held, and in the history of the State there never was gathered together such a *number* of fine race horses—trotting, pacing and running. The people were never better pleased with the trials of speed on this track than on this occasion. On the last two days one of our “ Washoe zephyrs ” visited us, and played sad havoc with the splendid attendance we were having ; consequently, instead of paying expenses, we find ourselves about \$300 delinquent.

The expenses were greater this year than last, owing to the fact that we had to erect forty new stalls, and the proprietor of the grounds, Mr. S. W. Bowman, inflicted a rental of \$500 upon us for the use of the same.

We had the misfortune to be deprived by death of one of the most earnest workers of the Board—Mr. A. A. Longley—who died in November. Mr. P. H. Mulcahy was appointed by the Governor to supply the vacancy caused by Mr. Longley's death.

In consideration of the fact that the purses and premiums offered were so *inadequate*, it was a matter of universal surprise that so many exhibits from a distance, and such a number of blooded animals should be in attendance from adjoining States, respectively, California, Oregon, Idaho and Utah.

That the Society should have substantial aid from the State in order to perpetuate its existence was voiced by all who thought the matter worthy of their consideration.
