PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

To HIS EXCELLENCY, C. C. STEVENSON, GOVERNOR OF NEVADA:

Dear Sir: In compliance with the provisions of the law creating a State Board of Agriculture, approved March 7, 1885, we have the honor to submit to you, and through you to the Legislature, the following report of the proceedings of the Board for the year 1887. This report has been delayed a few days in hopes that full accounts could be incorporated of the proceedings of Districts Nos. 1, 3 and 5.

At the close of the second annual fair of the Society it was ordered that the fair of 1887 should continue for ten days, and subsequently the Board fixed the date from September 21 to October 1, inclusive. The fairs of 1885 and 1886 were of but one week's duration, and it had been found that while the fair commenced on Monday, the exhibits were seldom in place until Wednesday, and, if perchance, as had been the case, there should be a day or two of bad weather, not only the enjoyment of the people would be materially interfered with, but there would also be great financial loss to the Society, and receipts being lessened to such an extent as to prevent the payment of the premiums and natural expenses—hence the idea was that in a ten days' fair there would be a certainty, rain or shine, of a full week's sport. The result was attained, but at the inconvenience of many exhibitors, and unnecessary labor upon the Directors. A mistake was made in having the first four days of the fair lap on the concluding days of the California State fair, thereby preventing several fast horses and interesting exhibits from being at Reno. With the experience thus gained the Board will hereafter conclude that six days is sufficient time and the week immediately following the fair at Sacramento the best period for holding the Nevada State fair.

The fair of 1887 was a gratifying success. The display of stock in the first department was conceded to be the largest and best ever seen on parade in the State, and furnished abundant proof that the stockmen and farmers of Nevada were making wonderful progress in improving their herds, and in raising thoroughbred animals both for the range and for the farm. The displays made by E. W. Crutcher of Humboldt county, the Vail Brothers of Churchill county, E. C. Hardy of Elko county, Scott & Co. of Elko county, Marsh & Son of Lyon county, C. C. Stevenson of Storey county and S. P. Davis of Ormsby county would have surprised those who have been

led to believe that Nevada produced only gold and silver. In fact the eyes of some of our own people were opened wide with astonishment. Proper credit is due Senator Stanford of California, for ordering a large herd of his famous Holsteins on exhibition at this fair, and to Jesso Harris of Colorado, for his contribution of six magnificent Cleveland bay stallions, both of which added largely to the attractiveness of the stock parades. The display of E. W. Crutcher entitled him to the special and generous premium of \$50, offered by W. O. H. Martin of Reno, for the best exhibit of Nevada live stock. The Pavilion exhibits were numerous and varied, that of the Ladies' Art Society of Carson, being especially imposing and attractive, and resulting in their being awarded the President's gold medal for the best exhibit in any department.

Financially, the receipts did not equal the expenses, and the Society was compelled to avail itself of the generosity of the State, and to draw the sum of \$2,786 23 from the treasury to balance accounts, but of this sum about \$850 were used in liquidating an indebtedness of the fair of 1886, so that with a premium and expense list of three times that of either of the District fairs, the State fair received the benefit of but twice the amount granted to either of the districts. The receipts from all sources, excepting the aid from the State Treasury, aggregated \$9,728 20, while the disbursements for speed ring, premiums, Indian pony races, advertising and printing, balloon ascensions, ladies' tournament, gold and silver medals, rent of track and pay of employes, amounted to \$11,829 84. The receipts were more than \$1,500 greater than in 1885 or 1886, notwithstanding the price of admission at the track was reduced from one dollar to fifty cents. The disbursements were large because of the money necessary for the speed ring, the additional sum added to the premiums, and for incidentals incurred to please visitors. The increasing interest manifested in the State fair and the advantages arising therefrom, fully justify the Board in expending such sums as will induce the people to favor it with their presence and their exhibits.

Of the \$10,000 appropriated by the Legislature of 1887 for the purchase and repair of grounds and payment of premiums, \$7,000 have been used in making partial payments on the purchase of eighty acres of land from Russell, Bradley and M. D. Foley, for a new track and grounds, and for the Pavilion in Reno from C. C. Stevenson.

The tract of land in question is part of what is known as the English Mill property, and situated northeast of Reno. It is admirably adapted for the purposes intended. The purchase price was \$14,000, the Board paying \$5,000 on account, and agreeing to pay the remaining \$9,000 in two years, with interest at 8 per cent. per annum. It was found necessary to purchase this property at the time it was negotiated, or forever lose the opportunity of securing as eligible a location. Time will fully justify this act of the Board. The Pavilion was secured for \$6,000, the sum of \$2,000 being paid on account, the other \$4,000 to be paid in two years, with interest at 8 per cent. per annum. The property cost Mr. Stevenson more than

\$8,000. The title to these two properties, to cover the \$7,000, and so far as could be done by the State Board of Agriculture, has been vested in the State of Nevada. The Board will appeal to the Legislature in 1889 to make a sufficient appropriation to pay the balance due on these purchases to the end that the State may become the sole owner.

The Board is without means to make the necessary improvements on the new grounds so that the fair of 1888 might be held there. To place the grounds in condition, together with the construction of a grand stand, judges' stand, stables and sheds, etc., will require an outlay in excess of \$10,000. That the work may be done properly, I recommend that the State and Washoe county, at the session of the Legislature of 1889, make provision, share and share alike, for the money necessary to inaugurate and complete the proposed and essential improvements.

Thanks are due the Directors for their faithful attention to duty, and particularly to Directors Evans and Mulcahy for their labor of love at the Park and Pavilion, respectively. Secretary Stoddard has performed the onerous duties of his position in a manner deserving of the commendation of "Well done, thou good and faithful servant."

In conclusion, I beg leave to return my grateful thanks to you, as Governor, for the continued interest taken in the affairs of the Society, and for your zealously in suggestions of practical importance for its welfare; to the Board of Directors for aid and assistance at all critical moments, and to the Secretary for his courtesy and fidelity at all times. REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

RENO, NEVADA, January 9, 1888.

To the Honorable State Board of Agriculture :

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report for the year 1887.

On the thirteenth of November the Board met and ordered that the State Agricultural Society hold a ten days' fair, beginning September 21, and ending October 1, 1887.

On the sixteenth of March your honorable body met and organized for the year by the election of the following named officers, viz: C. C. Powning, President; C. H. Stoddard, Secretary; C. T. Bender, Treasurer. The following named gentlemen were appointed as an Executive Committee, viz: C. C. Powning, Theo. Winters, L. J. Flint, A. Evans and P. H. Mulcahy. On the twentieth-sixth of March a speed programme and premium list was adopted, and at a meeting of the Board on the thirtieth of April the price of season tickets was fixed at \$10 each, and single admission tickets at fifty cents. On the twenty-seventh of May the President was authorized and empowered to purchase the eighty-acre tract of land, with water, from Russell & Bradley, and the Pavilion and lots from Mr. C. C. Stevenson, the former at a price of \$14,000, and make a payment of \$5,000 cash, and the latter at a price of \$6,000, and make a cash payment of \$2,000, and agree to pay eight per cent. per annum interest on the balance; and on the sixth of August the President reported that he had complied with the orders of the Board.

It is not necessary for me to state that according to the programme the fair was held, and that so far as exhibits and attendance were concerned it was a *success*. The exhibits in all the departments were even *better* than last year, and that is as much as was expected.

I will say here that the sentiments of the people generally are against holding a ten days' fair and charging \$10 for season tickets. It is also thought to be a mistake to hold our fair during the progress of the Sacramento State Fair.

The Ormsby County Agricultural Association, District No. 1, was organized May 23, 1887, and the Humboldt District Agricultural Society was organized July 17, 1887. The reports of the Ormsby County Agricultural Association, District No. 1, and Humboldt County, District No. 3, are herewith submitted. No report has been received from District No. 5.
