PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

RENO, NEVADA, January 14, 1889.

To HIS EXCELLENCY, C. C. STEVENSON, GOVERNOR OF NEVADA:

Sir: In accordance with the provisions of an Act of the Legislature, creating a State Board of Agriculture, we have the honor to submit briefly the following reports:

At the organization of the Board, in 1888, the prospect for a Fair that year, upon the new grounds, was very discouraging, the former appropriation being exhausted and the Treasury depleted. But the assistance of the enterprising citizens of Reno—who generously donated about \$2,700, and the liberal advances of the Directors, amounting to \$7,500 more, these advances, together with the invaluable assistance of Alvaro Evans, who devoted his whole time and energy to the preparing of the track and erecting suitable buildings for holding the exhibitions—made it possible to hold a fair upon the new grounds, instead of leasing, as had been the custom heretofore.

The entries of stock at the Fair-Grounds were fairly up to the expectations of the management, and were especially meritorious.

Speed contests were conducted without jar or friction by W. R. Chamberlain, who filled the responsible position with an upright firmness, and quick perception, that gives him rank above any other Judge who has occupied the Stand. Had I not had the assurance of his valuable assistance, I should have been very unwilling to accept the position of executive officer.

The exhibits at the Pavilion were commendable, especially the Fruit Department.

We have not the assurance to claim for the Fair a decided success, but those in attendance seemed well pleased, and by reference to the Secretary's report it will appear that, financially, the Fair of 1888 compares favorably with those of former years.

To the Directors who lent pecuniary aid and labored earnestly for the success of the Fair, we are under obligations.

Our grateful acknowledgments are due to the Virginia and Truckee Railroad, Nevada and California Railroad, and the Central Pacific Railroad companies, for their cordial co-operation.

Thanks are due Mr. H. M. Yerington for timely financial assistance.

For a full and complete statement, in detail, of the transactions of the Society, we refer you to the clear and able reports of the Secretary and Treasurer.

RESOLUTION.

At a meeting held by the Board (this day), the following resolution was unanimously adopted :

Resolved, That the State Board of Agriculture, referring to the reports of the President, Secretary, and Treasurer, submitted for the year 1888, hereby respectfully calls the attention of the Governor, and through him the Legislature, now in session, to the actual necessity of an immediate appropriation of \$25,000, for the purpose of liquidating the entire indebtedness of the State Agricultural Society, to the end that the purchases of land and Pavilion made in 1887, together with the improvements of 1888, may be surrendered to the State of Nevada, clear and unincumbered, knowing full well that, thereby, the State will have property actually worth more than its original cost.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

RENO, NEVADA, January 2, 1889.

To the Honorable State Board of Agriculture :

GENTLEMEN—I herewith submit a report for the year 1888 :

On the 11th of February the Board met and organized by the election of the following officers, viz :

On the 20th of February the Executive Committee appointed a committee of four members, consisting of Messrs. Mulcahy, Evans, Flint and Powning, to ascertain the cost of establishing a track and the erection of grand stand, stables, etc., upon the grounds belonging to the State. On the 10th of March they reported that the probable cost would be about \$10,000, and the Executive Committee were authorized by your honorable body to proceed with the work and erect buildings necessary, and build a race track. Messrs. Winters, Bailey, Marzen, Dangberg and Powning having guaranteed the money, on the 31st of March bids were received for material and accepted, and on the 17th day of June contracts were let to the lowest bidders for the erection of a grand stand, stalls and cattle sheds, and all other work pertaining to the grounds, and the work was then started, and by the 15th of September all the necessary buildings and track were ready for use; there being 83 box stalls for racing stock, 62 box stalls for show horses, 80 cattle stalls, and 20 hog and sheep sheds, and a fine grand stand 150 feet long with a seating capacity of 1,000, a Judges' stand attached; also kitchen, dining-room, bar-room, store-rooms and offices, all of which, including a fine pair of mules, a good wagon and harness, 1,075 feet $\frac{3}{4}$ inch, 2,068 feet 1 inch, 150 feet 4 inch, 50 feet 3 inch, 50 feet 2 inch, 30 feet $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch, and 70 feet $1\frac{1}{4}$ inch water pipes, laid to water tank, grand stand and stalls, cost the Society \$12,795 58. The annual Fair was held as advertised and was a success, the disbursements being only \$549 51 in excess of the receipts.

It will be observed by these figures that it will require \$25,000 to place the property on its feet, financially. It was said by visitors during the last Fair that it would eventually be the finest piece of property in the State. The ground has nearly all been ploughed and is ready for cultivation. Trees should be planted this coming Spring and grass sown also.

In view of the fact that each Fair held outrivals the previous one in attendance and exhibits, it will be necessary to build more stalls for animals and more room should be made in the Pavilion. Notwithstanding there were 225 stalls for animals, there were not enough, as exhibitors had to take their stock to the town for want of accommodation at the grounds. There is no doubt, in my mind, but that the premium list for cattle, horses, agriculture, horticulture and mechanics should be doubled—it would give a new life to all the departments.
