SECRETARY'S REPORT.

RENO, Nevada, February 1, 1890.

To the Honorable State Board of Agriculture:

GENTLEMEN: I respectfully submit the following report for the year 1889:

On the sixteenth of March the Board met and organized by the election of the following named officers, viz.:

The indebtedness of the Society, for the purchase of grounds, erection of buildings and purchase of Pavilion, was provided for by an appropriation by the State of \$15,000, and of \$10,000 by Washoe county, as will be seen by the financial report herewith. We also received, by subscriptions from the people of Reno, about \$1,750, to assist in carrying on a Fair.

The Society saw the necessity of building new stalls, and although not having any funds on hand, were obliged to add fourteen box stalls, at a cost of \$441, and then were short of room for animals on exhibition. The Society should have fifty more stalls built before the next annual meeting.

It was also observed that a judges' stand and timers' stand should be built, and the Board, after considering the matter, determined that they could not afford to erect them during the present year, owing to financial affairs. President Winters, however, came to the rescue, and ordered the two beautiful stands built, at a cost of \$300, and donated the amount to the Society.

In April the deeds for the grounds and Pavilion were received and forwarded to the Secretary of State, and are now on file in that office, having been made in the name of the State.

Repairs were made on the Pavilion building in the way of ceiling

the upper story, painting the same, and adding water closets with proper sewerage, etc., at a cost of about \$600, thus enabling the Society to rent the upper floor for \$30 per month, which, with the rent received from the grounds, will in the future bring a revenue of \$1,380 per year; the grounds having been leased at a yearly rental of \$1,020. It is understood that the lessee of the grounds is to seed it in alfalfa and otherwise improve the same.

In view of the fact that our State has suffered from an unprecedented drouth during the last two years, and particularly during the past year, and of the depression of the markets and business generally, it is conceded that our last Fair was a grand success both financially and socially, never having had a better exhibition or a better attendance, and for the success of the attendance we are greatly under obligation to our worthy Governor, C. C. Stevenson, in ordering an inspection and review of our State militia during the meeting.

Our exhibition of cattle, while not as large as in former years, could not be excelled in any State in the Union. The horses on exhibition were said by many to compare favorably with those of our great sister State, California, at her Fair, and it was even said by some that they were better. This was a great compliment to our State, and particularly to our breeders of fine stock.

The exhibit at the Pavilion was very fine, there being a finer display of fruit and agricultural products than ever before, showing that agriculture is improving in Nevada. An exhibit of apples from Lander county outdid all others in size and beauty.

When we take into consideration the fact that at the beginning of the fiscal year of 1889 we were indebted

Leaving the Society with an indebtedness of \$1986 76, and a Fair to be held, the outlook was certainly discouraging to the Directors, but by judicious management on the part of the President and Directors we pass through a successful meeting and find the Society in debt to the amount of about \$1200. I think this is a good showing indeed.

I cannot refrain from saying something of the attractive exhibit made by Mr. J. Sibbald, of Golconda, Humboldt county, of a herd of West Highland cattle, which attracted so much attention. Mr. Sibbald says: "If they are not adapted for range cattle in a cold climate there are none in the universe." They are bred in the mountains in the north of Scotland and are the only breed of cattle that are allowed to run out and "rustle" their own living in the Winter, and also the only cattle allowed to run with their calves. For milking they are seldom used; they give rich milk, but not large quantities of it. The beef brings more per pound than any other breed. It is also a favorite with the butchers on account of less shrinkage on gross weight, and being thick, solid cutters." Mr. Sibbald has now thirty-three head, calves included. The "West Highland" cattle have been known in the highlands of Scotland and the islands along its western coast as long as those localities have been inhabited. Their hardy, rugged natures will subsist on the poorest of vegetation, yet they are prolific in breeding, and at the age of two or three years are driven. The bulls at the age of four or five years, in ordinary flesh, weigh from 1300 to 1400 pounds, and mature cows about 1000 pounds each. It is surprising that in the multiplicity of breeds imported to the United States the "West Highlands" have attracted so little attention, when we have such extensive ranges of mountain and other elevated pasturage where they can be bred. A few small herds of them are kept in Kansas and Iowa, where they are highly approved in the crosses they make on the common and other breeds. The virtual extinction of the American bison has created a pressing demand for robes in place of those formerly supplied by their skins. For this purpose no domestic cattle are equal to the "West Highlanders." The thick coat of hair which nature has furnished them as a protection against cold weather gives their hides, if slaughtered at the proper season, a value scarcely if at all inferior to those of the bison. With a carcass of the finest quality of beef, and a hide fit for a carriage robe, a well fattened Highland steer should possess an extra value in the market.

The thanks of the Society are due T. K. Hymers, J. J. Becker and C. Lemery, for their energetic and successful soliciting and collecting of subscriptions from the citizens of Reno for the aid of the Society at its Fair.

The thanks of the Society are also due the citizens of Reno for their liberal financial aid, and to the citizens of the State generally for their generous patronage.
