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## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

The annual Fair was held September 22d to 27th, inclusive. The people of Reno again came to our aid with a liberal subscription of \$888 25, and the Society is under obligations to Messrs. Lemery, Julien and Grant for the collection of the same, as our last report shows the Society was indebted to the Treasurer for overdraft \$1,262 78 at the beginning of the year.

In view of the fact that the years 1888 and 1889 had been such extraordinary dry years, the people never having known or experienced such a droughth, and the severe winter of 1889 and 1890 having also been unprecedented, the loss of cattle and other stock making, as was expected, unusually hard times throughout the State, the managers and others thought that the patronage of the Fair of 1890 would be far short of previous Fairs, and while it did fall short, the Directors were agreeably surprised at their success, both by attendance and exhibits, which were beyond their expectations. While the exhibits of cattle and horses were somewhat limited in numbers, they were excellent and gave perfect satisfaction to the spectators, and it was generally conceded that the racing department was never better, a better class of race horses never having met before on a track in this State.

The exhibition of agriculture, horticulture and manufactures at the Pavilion were, notwithstanding the great depression in business circles, the loss of stock and partial failure of crops, etc., equally as good, if not better than in former years, and each department was a source of surprise and satisfaction to all who visited the Pavilion. The Board have certainly demonstrated the fact that a Fair is certainly a benefit to the State, and it should receive the support of the State, financially. If the present Legislature will appropriate, say, \$3,000 per annum for the support of an annual Fair, and only one or two Fairs are held during the year it will be much more beneficial.

The meeting of the farmers and stockmen once or twice each year would be much better than have them meet at home, in each county in the State. They should meet together from all parts of the State and exchange ideas, etc., and by increasing the premiums of the State Fair with an appropriation each year it would be an inducement for them to get together annually.

During the past two years the State has appropriated for purses and premiums at the different County Fairs in the State, \$9,500, divided as follows: Ormsby, \$4,500; Lyon, \$2,000; Humboldt, \$2,000; Nye, \$2,000. The State Fair has received no aid from the State for this purpose, and has paid annually about \$7,500.

The State has paid for the property, land, water and improvements, and has a deed for the property, valued at about \$35,000. With an appropriation of about \$3,000 per annum the State Fair could be made the second best Fair on the Pacific Coast.

The system adopted by the Board of Directors in permitting persons and families, from a distance, to camp upon the grounds during Fair week, is very favorably spoken of, and I am sure will be well

patronized hereafter by our distant visitors who attend with their families.

The stock interests of this State are rapidly improving, the principal interest being the production of beef and mutton, although the dairying business in some counties is being improved. The beef interest predominating, has naturally tended to stock the country with beef-producing breeds, of which I believe the short-horn Durham is in the lead, though a number of our stockmen are introducing Polled Angus cattle.

There are several localities throughout the State which are beginning to turn their attention towards creameries, butter and cheese making, and in that event it will tend to breed butter and beef-making stock more than ever. The Jerseys are the best butter cows; the Ayrshires stand second with the Jerseys for butter, with little difference between the two. Ayrshires are very fine cheese cows, while Holsteins are the largest milkers. Ayrshires are also first-class market cows. Jerseys for the milk market do not meet with ready sale, neither are they as hardy as Ayrshires. At a recent trial of Ayrshire cows one made nineteen and one-half pounds of butter in a week. It takes twenty-two pounds of milk, on an average, to make one pound of butter. A cow that will give 6,000 pounds of milk will pay. It will not pay to keep a cow that will not make a pound of butter from twenty-five pounds of milk. I do not know of any Ayrshires in the State; none have ever been on exhibition at our Fairs. It is a settled fact that all business tends towards a center, and it is so with butter and cheese making. Seventy-five different farmers will make as *many different grades*. One creamery will make but *one grade* and that would outsell, and be better, as a whole, than the individual dairy butter, and the same rule applies to cheese.

In Brattleboro, Vermont, a creamery was built two years ago and the people of the town took most of the stock. Some was taken by the farmers, and what has been the result? They have raised the price of butter from 12 and 14 cents per pound to 22 cents. Would not creameries established in each of the hay-producing localities throughout the State be of great benefit to our farmers, and add another great industry to the State?

The Board of Directors are under many obligations to Gen. C. C. Powning for gratuitous advertising. Whole columns of State Fair advertisements have been inserted in his paper for months each year, for several years, and he has generously declined to accept remuneration for the same, thereby greatly aiding the Society in its financial struggle.

I herewith submit a statement showing the entire receipts and disbursements for the year, also a report from Ormsby County Agricultural District, No. 1. No reports have been received from other districts.
