## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

To the Honorable State Board of Agriculture:

GENTLEMEN: I respectfully submit the following report for the year ending February 1, 1892.

The Board met January 31, 1891, and elected officers for the ensuing year as follows, viz:

W. H. Gould	-----	President

The grounds were leased to Russell, Bradley & Co. for the sum of \$500 per annum. The date of the Seventh Annual Fair was selected, September 21 to 26, inclusive. On May 9, 1891, the fol-

lowing communication was received from His Excellency, Governor R. K. Colcord.

CARSON CITY, May 4, 1891.

*President State Board of Agriculture, Reno, Nevada:*

DEAR SIR: I desire to call your attention to the present condition of the pavilion building at Reno, which is the property of the State, and in the custody and under the control of the State Board of Agriculture. It is considerably out of repair and very much in need of paint. It also appears to have been a dumping ground for rubbish of all sorts. This should be cleaned out at once in order to avoid the liability of its taking fire. On the upper balconies outside there is a quantity of dry brush, paper, dirt, etc., which is dangerous to the building and the town. I understand it is bringing in some rentals which should be applied, I think, to these necessary repairs. I trust the Board will not regard me as being extra officious in calling their attention to the matter, for my only desire (which I consider my duty) is to properly protect the State property. Your Board have ample power under the statute to expend any part of the appropriation in repairing the buildings, and I think it should be done, as it is a case of protecting the property of the State against great loss, which will surely occur if it remains untouched for two years more. The next Legislature will surely recognize the importance of this expenditure, and will provide for it in case your appropriation should be exhausted. Very respectfully,

In compliance with the above recommendation bids for the painting and repairs of the Pavilion were advertised for, and on the 18th of May the contract was let and Director Foley authorized to superintend the work. The repairs, consisting of renewing a portion of the foundation, ceiling the sides of the lower story, placing water-closets therein and connecting the same with the sewers, all of which cost \$1,152 90, which sum of money was borrowed from the First National Bank and the Bank of Nevada, \$576 45 each, with interest at 10 per cent. per annum.

All necessary preparations were made for holding the Annual Fair in September, and notwithstanding the exceedingly dull times for which the past year has been noted, the exhibitions in each of the departments were excellent, and the receipts were in excess of the expectations of the Directors.

A right of way has been secured on the west and north side of the grounds and the space now occupied by the road on the east will be closed and utilized in improving the grounds.

It will be seen by the financial report, hereunto attached, that the Society cleared \$847 60 over and above the expenses of the last Annual Fair, and that the debt of \$1,924 22 has been reduced

to \$1,076 62. This certainly is a good showing, considering the extremely dull year just past.
