REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

RENO, Nevada, Dec. 1, 1893.

To the Honorable State Board of Agriculture :

GENTLEMEN: I have the honor to submit the following report for the fiscal year ending December 1, 1893:

The Board of Directors met February 1st, and selected the following officers for the ensuing term :

W. O. H. Martin	-----	President.
C. H. Stoddard	-----	Secretary.
R. R. Osborn	-----	Treasurer.

Director W. D. Phillips was appointed Superintendent of the pavilion and Director W. H. Gould Superintendent of the grounds.

The following named Directors were appointed as the Executive Committee: Theo. Winters, C. C. Powning, W. H. Gould, W. O. H. Martin, M. D. Foley and H. M. Yerington.

The date of the Ninth Annual Fair was set for September 18th to 23d inclusive.

At a meeting of the Board held September 5th, President Martin announced the death of Director W. H. Gould, who was one of our best and most enterprising members.

Mr. Gould served as President of the Board for two years and was always active in the interests of the society. He devoted his time and money unselfishly to advance its interests, and in his death the Board of Directors, the citizens of the State and particularly of Washoe county, lost an able, honest, upright and enterprising friend and fellow citizen.

Mr. Gould was loved and respected by all who knew him. He built and owned the Reno Creamery, one of the most beneficial industries in Washoe county, and an institution which in all probability will stand as a monument of his enterprise and industry.

Mr. T. K. Hymers was appointed by the Governor to fill the vacancy in the Board.

As the time approached for the holding of the Ninth Annual Fair, all necessary arrangements were made, yet the Directors met with much discouragement on account of the great depression of the financial condition of the country, and at this time many cattle were dying from an unknown disease in the vicinity of Reno, and it was generally conceded by the Directors that our exhibit in this department would be far below that of any preceding year, and it proved that they were correct in their surmises.

However, the exhibit of horses was as fine as were ever paraded on the grounds, and notwithstanding the hard times the exhibits in the pavilion were very fine and numerous, many claiming that there never was a better display in that department. The attendance, however, was a falling off of about fifty per cent.

It will be seen by the financial statement herewith that the receipts at the gate and for privileges are nearly one-half less than that of last year, thereby causing a deficiency of \$1,491 73 for the fiscal year ending December 1st

In compliance with a request of Governor R. K. Colcord and a number of prominent citizens, the Board of Directors held a meeting, at which the Governor was present and urged the necessity of having the State of Nevada make an exhibit of its products and resources at the coming California Midwinter International Exhibition, and requested the Board of Directors to take charge of the matter and appoint managers to secure and take charge of an exhibit, and in compliance with this request Director P. H. Mulcahy and your Secretary were appointed as such managers.

The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the boards of County Commissioners and ask their co-operation, and request them to appoint committees to act in conjunction with the managers in securing exhibits for the respective counties.

I have complied with these instructions, and beg to state that the counties of Ormsby, Douglas, Lyon, Storey and Washoe have com-

plied with the request and are now working to that end. It is expected that the other counties will take action next Monday.

On November 18th another meeting was held, and in response to an invitation a number of citizens, together with the Governor, were present. At this meeting a committee consisting of R. K. Colcord, E. Williams, C. C. Powning and W. E. Sharon were appointed to proceed to San Francisco to make the best possible arrangements for space for the Nevada exhibit, and also to induce the Southern Pacific Railroad Company to re-arrange their rates of fare from all parts of the State, giving a one-rate fare for the round trip, with a thirty-day limit.

This committee have reported that they could not induce the managers of the Midwinter Fair to modify their rules in regard to space, but insisted on charging \$1 50 per square foot, and that they had secured the refusal of 5,000 square feet of ground from S. P. Davis for \$500. At a subsequent meeting of the Board this proposition was accepted and Directors Martin, Foley, Bradley and Winters and Governor R. K. Colcord subscribed the amount of \$100 each to secure the same.

They also reported that the railroad company had taken the matter of fares under consideration, with a promise of granting the request if possible.

The President and Secretary were instructed to solicit subscriptions from the citizens of the State to pay the expenses of the Nevada exhibit, with the understanding that the amount so contributed should be refunded when the Legislature should appropriate an amount for that purpose.

The State Board of Agriculture, through its officers and the Governor, were also requested to solicit from J. P. Jones, D. O. Mills, J. G. Fair, the estate of W. S. Hobart, James L. Flood, William M. Stewart, Francis G. Newlands and the Virginia and Truckee Railroad Company and the Southern Pacific Railroad Company the sum of \$1000 each for the Nevada exhibit. Up to the present time we have received responses from James G. Fair, who respectfully declines to give any assistance in the matter.

No reports have been received from District Agricultural Associations.

I herewith submit a statement showing the entire receipts and disbursements during the year just ended; also, a complete list of the speed contests and purses awarded, and a list of articles and names of persons who were awarded premiums.
