

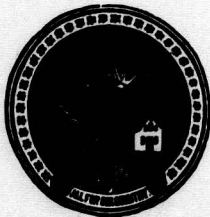

REPORT FOR 1907.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

RENO, NEVADA, February 17, 1908.

To His Excellency, HON. JOHN SPARKS, Governor of Nevada.

DEAR SIR: In compliance with the requirements of the statute governing the official acts of the State Board of Agriculture, I have the honor to herewith present an account of the proceedings of this Board for the year ending December 31, 1907, together with the financial exhibit of receipts and disbursements as compiled by the Secretary.

The State Fair of 1907 was largely attended, much larger than was anticipated by the managing board on account of the late date that a conclusion was reached as to whether or not a fair would be held this year. The question as to the advisability of holding a fair was a subject of much discussion for many days; good argument was advanced supporting the proposition of putting it off for another year, but, nevertheless, the Board finally concluded otherwise and work was immediately commenced.

The fact that six years had elapsed since the holding of our last State Fair created many adverse conditions for the Executive Committee to work against, all of which, however, were overcome and the program, as laid out by them, was carried through to a very successful issue, both socially and financially.

The live-stock exhibition was first class—as good, if not better, than any heretofore given in the State, and equal in quality to anything shown in any other State.

The Pavilion exhibit was fairly good under the circumstances, considering the short space of time given for preparation. In soliciting exhibits for the Pavilion the committee was confronted with much opposition against the proposition, and strong argument was advanced that our Pavilion is not rightly located for exhibition purposes.

It has become a recognized fact among a large majority of the Board of Directors that a serious mistake was made when the Pavilion was moved some years ago from Reno to its present location on the race-track grounds. While located at Reno there was always much interest manifested by all exhibitors to make it an occasion of great attraction for an evening exhibition after the close of the day's program at the fair grounds. As it will be remembered by those who attended in the old-time days, many pleasant evenings were passed in interesting sight-seeing and social enjoyment by a large attendance of spectators during the week. Therefore, it would seem that the matter of moving the Pavilion back to Reno, where evening exhibitions can be given as in times past, should be a question for consideration of the Board at some future meeting.

Much praise is due for the able services of the committee under

whose supervision the repairs at the race track and fair grounds have been conducted. Good work has been done in the construction of the new fence surrounding the entire grounds and repairs on the buildings, and, while not yet finished, it will only require a small amount to complete the essential work. It is our belief that a sufficient amount of money remains out of the \$3,500 appropriation to cover this expense.

In this connection it is my desire to extend meritorious mention to Director Dolph Shane for his personal and financial assistance in aiding the successful promotion of the work as carried out by the Committee on Program. Mr. Shane was obliged to advance a large sum of money to prosecute the work of repairing buildings, constructing the fence, and arranging the program for the Fair and races, before reimbursement from the State fund could be rendered.

Your special attention is called to the Secretary's report, showing a residue of \$1,800.10 after payment of all debts incurred. Liberal premiums have been awarded on all live-stock and Pavilion exhibits, all of which have been fully paid. With a feeling of great satisfaction to the Board, not a word of complaint has been heard pertaining thereto, it having been the aim and purpose of the committee to establish a feeling of confidence and fair treatment among all who have cooperated in our behalf.

It is our belief that now the State Agricultural Association is on a good working basis, with the goodly assistance of all concerned, aided through the prosperous condition of our State, we should, by a careful and economical management, institute a Fair for the year 1908 equal to those of other States. With the elimination of all personal differences and the hearty cooperation of all concerned, there can be but one result predicted, that of success.

REPORT FOR 1908.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

RENO, NEVADA, December 31, 1908.

To His Excellency, HON. D. S. DICKERSON, Governor of Nevada.

DEAR SIR: In compliance with the duty imposed upon me as President of the Nevada State Agricultural Association, I hereby submit for your consideration the Secretary's compiled reports showing the financial exhibit of all receipts and disbursements of the Association for the year 1908, all of which have been passed upon and duly approved by the Executive Board of Directors.

Our State Fair given this year excelled by far that of last year in point of general interest manifested. The live-stock display was much larger, and each exhibitor seemed to display the greatest interest in presenting to visitors all points of merit of their respective exhibits. The absence of the marked indifference heretofore shown at our fairs in previous years was indeed quite conspicuous.

The Pavilion exhibition excelled anything of its kind ever given in the State. The Executive Board secured the use of a building in Reno known as the Aetna skating rink and immediately commenced preparatory work on this structure for the purpose of our State Pavilion exhibition. While the completion of this work was somewhat expensive, it was a great satisfaction to all concerned on account of the grand success of the undertaking. Many beautiful booths were installed and all exhibits were artistically displayed. The Pavilion was thronged with spectators every night during the whole week of the Fair. Nothing but kind words of praise and expressions of general satisfaction very favorable towards our efforts were heard upon all sides. Much credit is due to W. J. Westerfield and the clerks, under whose efficient supervision the Pavilion was managed. The successful outcome of establishing the Pavilion in Reno demonstrates the advisability of taking immediate steps to have our Pavilion building, now located upon our State grounds, removed to some suitable location in Reno.

All premiums and bills of expense have been fully paid. The unfinished portion of the fence surrounding the grounds was completed this year at an expense of about \$500, but there being only \$324.25 remaining from last year out of this particular appropriation, we were obliged to pay the difference from other receipts.

The financial condition of the Association is not as favorable as it was last year, on account of the decrease in attendance and the fact that our operating expenses were greater than last year.

The financial stringency which existed all over the State during that time looked bad for anything like a good attendance. With a view of overcoming as much as possible this condition we went to greater

expense in the way of advertising, which accounts for this bill of expense being somewhat greater than last year. Nevertheless, our gate receipts and other earnings on the whole fell short about \$2,700.

Last year we received from the citizens of Reno about \$2,800 to carry out our racing program. This year it was with considerable difficulty that we raised \$1,597.50, and it required over \$5,000 to pay the racing and special event purses in compliance with our advertisements.

The grand stand and stock and horse buildings on our grounds are in a very dilapidated condition. The grand stand should be enlarged and repaired as soon as possible. It is hoped by our Directors that the next Legislature will be liberal in its appropriations for the purpose of carrying out this work. The general conditions in this State in all branches of enterprise are improving yearly, and to keep pace with these conditions it is the desire and hope of all that such financial assistance will be rendered to the Nevada State Agricultural Association as will enable them to do so.

Thanks are due to Mr. Frank Folsom, Superintendent of the Track, and also to the Board of Directors, for faithful performance of duty and presence at the Society meetings.

In conclusion I beg leave to return my thanks to the Examining Board—the Governor, Attorney-General, and Secretary of State—for their courteous treatment in the examination of our accounts and allowance of the appropriations, and also to the State Printer for executing printed matter promptly and neatly for this Society.
